"More Blessed To Give"

There are only three occasions that are recorded in scripture of Paul making a direct quote from Jesus. One of the quotes is found as Paul is concluding his remarks to the Ephesians as he says, "remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive'" (Acts 20:35). We would do well to live by the principle set forth in this passage.

We have no way of knowing when Jesus spoke these words or how Paul knew the quote, but we know that he reminded the Ephesian elders of these words and they were recorded by inspiration for our use and instruction. Let us notice what we learn from these words:

Exalted Teaching of Jesus

These words remind us of the exalted character and teachings of Jesus. This line of thinking is diametrically opposed to the thinking of the world. The world says "receiving or getting is better than giving." Jesus said that giving was "more blessed". The word "more" carries an idea of something higher, deeper and fuller than just mere happiness. The point is that in giving, there is a more lasting satisfaction that comes to the one who gives than the one who receives. Jesus' own life taught and practiced the great blessing that comes from giving (Matthew 20:28; Acts 10:38).

The Unselfishness In Life

The greatest hinderance in an individual giving is that of selfishness. "It is mine" philosophy. Jesus, however, did not see life in that way. He saw life as a transitory thing to the exaltation and glory of what was after this life. Paul is reminding the brethren on this occasion that the Lord taught that giving was the better thing. While Paul was on this third journey, he was collecting benevolent help for the poor saints in Jerusalem. He wrote to the church at Corinth and he told them how the churches of Macedonia, even in deep poverty, had abounded in their giving. Not only had these brethren abounded in the financial help of the needy saints, "but first gave their own selves to the Lord" (2 Corinthians 8:5). Indeed, giving can be monetary, but we must also understand the blessedness of non monetary giving; the giving of one's self to God and His cause (Galatians 2:20; Philippians 1:21).

The Principles of Life: Gain or Service

In this life there are two principle views of life: gain or service.

Gain can be used in a good way if one uses the blessing to give more to the work of the Lord and to help others. But in many cases, gain is the acquisition of things one wants, and not because of need. Gain in this mind-set caused Jesus to warn "a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (Luke 12:15). It is this view of gain that Paul reminded Timothy that "godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out" (1 Timothy 6:6-7). If we have the right attitude toward gain it will cause one to view life more as service.

Service is the way we would definitely describe the life of Christ. Jesus said of His life that He, "came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). As Paul was speaking to the Ephesian elders, he was wanting to encourage them to follow the example of Christ in serving others. Paul had lived his life in emulating the example of Christ and he encouraged others to do the same (cf. 1 Corinthians 11:1). As we all strive for our life to be one of service let us remember the words of an old hymn...

> "Are you dwelling in the sunlight? Is your path with roses strewn? Do you walk with buoyant gladness In the steps that you have hewn? Have you reached the top of Pisgah, Climbling always firm and true? Don't forget that in the valley There is some one needing you."

May we ever learn that seeking selfish gain will never equal the thrilling joy and peace of mind that comes from giving and serving. May we ever remember the words of the Lord "It is more blessed to give than receive."

"As We Forgive Our Debtors"

As he spoke of a wrong suffered many years before, the brother began to tremble and his eyes blazed with sudden fire. The anger and bitterness in his heart poured out of him, his voice growing louder with each syllable. His decades – old hurt had clearly grown with each passing year. Forgiving someone for sinning against us may be the hardest thing we'll ever do. Especially if we have left the anger inside to fester for a long time.

Why do some people - even some Christians - seem to be unable to forgive those who have sinned against them? A psychologist would probably give several learned and intricate replies to that question. From a biblical point of view, things are probably not so complex.

Unresolved Anger

Before we think about that, though, we need to examine something else. There are several solid reasons for letting go of our anger.

First, we need to move on for the sake of our mental and physical health. Unresolved anger can eat us alive. Doctor Steven Stosny talks about how "anger can even shorten a person's life span if not resolved. It can also lead to heart disease, stroke, cancer, hypertension, depression, anxiety, alcoholism, drug-addition and other compulsive behavior." Clearly, it is wise from both an emotional and physical standpoint to rid ourselves of pent-up anger.

Second, may I add that such entrenched rancor can also harm, if not destroy, our relationships with family and friends. Even if the malice is not directed at them, they suffer from the toxic fall-out. And poison is poison even if it comes from someone we love.

Third, and worst of all for Christians, harbored animosity has a deadly spiritual effect; it destroys our relationship with God. He is a forgiving God, who requires that we emulate Him. "Let all bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor, and evil speaking be put away from you, with all malice. And be kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you" (Ephesians 4:31-32). How critical is this issue? Listen to Jesus: "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, but it you do not forgive others their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:14-15).

Pride

Now back to the Bible reason for merciless hearts. In a word, it is pride. The proud man is his own god. The psalmist caught the essence of his thinking: "The wicked in his proud countenance does not see God; God is in none of his thoughts" (Psalm 10:4). The proud mouth declares, "With our tongue we will prevail; our lips are our own; who is Lord over us?" (Psalm 12:3). The proud man is the center of his universe; everyone else is merely a satellite. Such an exalted self-image is fertile ground for contempt of every kind. "A proud and haughty man - 'Scoffer' is his name; he acts with arrogant pride" (Proverbs 21:24). What does this contemptuous egomaniac look like?

- * He can never be wrong. In any conflict, the proud man alone is in the right. Every discussion becomes a competition, and he intends to win at all costs. Lying, personal attacks anything goes.
- * He cannot be ill-used. He is much too important for that. And whether the mistreatment is real or imagined is immaterial; it is real to him so watch out...
- * He cannot lose face. Even kings become slaves to peer pressure. John the Baptist might have been spared if Herod's court had not heard his vow (Matthew 14:9).
- * He cannot forgive. He is obliged to no one. Why should he forgive; it is the other man who owes the apology.

Jesus taught us to pray, "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors" (Matthew 6:12). The proud, unforgiving man cannot pray that prayer - not sincerely, at least, not without being a hypocrite. Amen.
