A Threat and A Prayer

Hezekiah was one of the good kings of Judah. His father, Ahaz, was an evil king. Ahaz had turned to follow the gods of the nations that defeated him (concluding that they were stronger than Jehovah). He closed the doors of the Temple, had its furnishings fashioned into idols, erected alters on every corner in Jerusalem, and even sacrificed his sons to pagan gods.

When Hezekiah first became king, he occupied himself with the work of reforming the errors of his father. However, a much greater crisis soon arose that consumed the energy and attention of his reign: the threat of Assyria. Assyrians took the Northern Kingdom away into captivity in 722 BC, then turned their attention to Judah.

At one point during this conflict, Sennacherib, king of Assyria, realized that he could not afford a long battle against Judah. So, in an effort to hasten Judah's surrender, he sent an intimidating letter to king Hezekiah. In this letter, Sennacherib reminded Hezekiah that none of the gods of the other nations had been able to deliver them from his hand, and that the God of Judah would prove to be equally impotent:

"Thus you shall speak to Hezekiah, king of Judah saying: 'Do not let your God in whom you trust deceive you, saying, Jerusalem shall not be given into the hand of the king of Assyria.' Look! You have heard what the kings of Assyria have done to all lands by utterly destroying them; and shall you be delivered?" (2 Kings 19:10-11).

Hezekiah took the letter to the house of the Lord, spread it out before the Lord, and prayed unto God. Surprisingly, the king did not pray for God to defend the nation as much as he prayed for God to act in defense of His own honor and glory:

"Now therefore, O LORD our God, I pray, save us from his hand, that all the kingdoms of the earth may know that You are the LORD God. You alone" (vs. 19).

The Lord answered Hezekiah's prayer by sending his angel to kill

185,000 soldiers within the camp of the Assyrians. Sennacherib, who had boasted so confidently against the true and living God, returned to Nineveh in stunned defeat. Later, he was assassinated by his own sons while he was worshipping in the temple of his god (vs. 35-37). It turned out that Judah's God was powerful enough to defend them, while Sennacherib's god could not defend him.

Hezekiah protected his nation from their enemy, not by his might, nor by his military strategy, nor by his ability to form powerful alliances with other nations, but by his trust in God and his reliance upon prayer (vs. 20). Likewise, our "victories" are not the result of our might, abilities or wisdom. They are the result of our prayers of faith (James 1:6-8). Like Hezekiah, let us always be willing to take the things that trouble us and "spread them out" before the Lord in prayer.

"Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time, casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:6-7).

The Lamb's Book of Life

This register or list of the saved, thus designated because of the sacrifice of the Lamb making it possible and the life secured thereby (2 Timothy 1:10; John 14:6; 2 Peter 1:19), comprehends all redeemed from all covenants, because the sacrifice of Jesus Christ was designed to effect the redemption of faithful saints under all economies (Hebrews 9:15; 11:39-40). A similar book of remembrance was mentioned by the prophet in connection with God's people in whom He

delighted (Malachi 3:16-17). An examination of this register reveals the following features:

- **1. Select:** Christians have their name entered in the Book of Life (Philippians 4:3; Hebrews 12:23). None others have such a promise.
- 2. Restrictive: Some are definitely and specifically excluded from this list (Revelation 13:8). One would expect this in that the promise of salvation is received upon conditions established in the gospel of Christ, not unconditionally, universally, or automatically.
- **3. Promising:** Those whose names have been entered in this register enjoy the promise of entering heaven and enjoying eternal life (Revelation 21:27).
- 4. Changeable: This list of names is subject to change (Revelation 3:5; 22:19). In the first passage those who are victorious in Christ receive the assurance that their names will not be removed, while the latter passage says that those tampering with the revelation from God by subtracting something there from will have their names removed. People can fall from divine grace (Galatians 5:4).
- 5. Final: The Bible also teaches that God's list of redeemed is the final list (Revelation 20:12, 15). Judgment will be based on what is written in the books, and those without their names in the Book of Life will enter into the lake of fire, which is the second death (Revelation 21:8). No one will be able to gainsay what the Book of Life reflects.

Friend, now that you know about the Book of Life, why not submit to the will of Christ so you can benefit from the sacrifice of the Lamb slain for the sins of all? You can enjoy the promise of eternal life.

Those "Other" Sinners

"And John answered and said, 'Master, we saw one casting out devils in thy name; and we forbade him, because he followeth not with us" (Luke 9:49).

Answered what? The word may mean, "began to speak", but Vine says always "where something has preceded, either statement or act, to which the remarks refer." The Harper-Bagster Lexicon says, "In N. T. to respond to certain present circumstances." What "brought on" John's remarks about the man he had "forbidden"?

The preceding verses show that the Disciples had been disputing about who among them should be greatest, and Jesus had rebuked them for their pride (See Mark 9:33-37). John is not named specifically, but other passages say James and John accompanied their mother when she asked Jesus to seat them in high positions in His kingdom (Matthew 20:20f). Was the woman alone in her desire for greatness? I believe the sons must share the blame and that John (perhaps James, also) was enough involved in the arguments about greatness that Jesus' rebuke carried a special "sting."

Is it not a well established trait of human nature that when the sermon fits, we try to change the subject? Our personal defense is to launch our own attack upon someone else. If, in this new battle, we can make our former critic an ally, perhaps he will forget all about the fault he saw in us. The shoe fits - so we try to find a different shoe, for someone else.

When John felt the sting of the Lord's rebuke to pride, he "answered" by saying, in effect, "Master, we (James also?) saw this 'outsider' doing wrongly, and we really jumped on him. We let him have it.!"

Even if John's judgment was right and his actions respecting the second man was justified, this would not remove John's fault. How embarrassing to discover he was again wrong. Jesus said, "Forbid him not..."

Will we never learn - a second error does not correct the first - we cannot grow by causing others to appear smaller - and, final judgment is on an individual basis, by One who sees and knows our very thoughts.
