Our Authority In Religion

Why do you do what you do in religion? Many may say, "Because mother and daddy did it." Others may say, "My preacher said it was this way." Even others may reply, "Because I just like it this way." It is not an unknown fact that there are many differences in the religious practices of our world today. Often in discussing these differences with individuals, the above answers or a similar type of answer is given. What should be our authority in religion?

Authority Is From God

Authority simply means "the power or right to command, make decisions, enforce obedience." Who has this authority? Who has the right to give commands, make decisions and enforce obedience? Clearly, the answer is our creator, God. All authority extends from Him. God's order of authority is seen when Paul writes "the head of every man is Christ; and the head of he woman is the man; and the head of Christ is God" (1 Corinthians 11:3). God ultimately has the authority, but has delegated all authority to Christ (Matthew 16:18). In the affairs of men, God ordained that there be governments, but their authority is only good as long as it does not violate the teaching of God. In Acts 4, this is illustrated when Peter and John were commanded "not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus. But Peter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:18-20). Later, they were threatened again for continuing to teach about Jesus, "But Peter and John answered and said unto them, 'Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye." Clearly, Peter and John understood that the ultimate authority in all things is God.

The Necessity of Authority

Throughout the scriptures, we see the need for practicing in religion only that which we have authority from God to do. The sacrifice of Cain in Genesis 4, when he offered a sacrifice of the fruit of the ground, is one example. The Lord was not pleased because that was not what He had authorized. In Leviticus 10, Nadab and Abihu offered "strange fire that the Lord"

commanded them not. And there went out fire from the Lord, and devoured them, and they died before the Lord (Leviticus 10:1-2).

We continue to see this need for authority stressed in the New Testament. In the sermon on the mount, Jesus mentioned on the day of judgment there would be those that would have practiced many things in their religion calling Him Lord. But Jesus said, "Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:22-23). Jesus points out that even though they were practicing and doing many things in the name of God, they were doing these things without the proper authority. Notice Jesus said that they were "workers of iniquity" or "lawlessness." We see that in the matters of religious faith and practice, that proper authority for what we do is necessary.

What This Means To Me

Understanding that Jesus is the one who has all authority and that authority is necessary for what we do in the faith and practice, what must we do? We must look into God's word and see what it teaches about the Lord's will. The Lord has given us all things that "pertain unto life and godliness" (1 Peter 1:3). This means that as we go through life, we can look to the word of God and find all that God wants us to do. As we then seek to please Him, we do what the scriptures teach us. We do not rely on what others say, or what our parents believed, but we act upon our own faith that comes from the word of God (Romans 10:17). We do what God authorizes us to do in the way He would have us to do it. In doing this, we are then practicing things by the authority of God; the proper authority for us.

Seeing The Lord

John discusses three attempts at seeing The Lord: Peter and the other disciple, Mary Magdalene, and Thomas, called Didymus (John 20). Each case involves viewing the resurrected Jesus. But why was it so difficult to "see" the risen Lord? Jesus repeatedly told them he would die and rise again (Mark 9:9-10; 30-31). The old prophets also clearly point to this eventuality (Psalm 16:10). Let's briefly review each case and find the answer to this question.

When Peter and the other disciple (probably John) hear of Jesus' tomb being empty, they eagerly raced to His grave to see the truthfulness of this story. John first arrives and finds the stone rolled away from the mouth of the tomb. He peers into the burial cave and notes the linen clothes lying there, but no body. Peter then appears on the scene, and true to his character, immediately enters the tomb. Both disciples ponder the meaning of the folded garments and absence of Jesus' body. As John enters the tomb, he takes further inventory of the situation and then "believes" (John 20:7-8). Now he "sees" that the grave could not hold his Lord (Acts 2:23-24).

After Peter and John's departure, Mary stood weeping in front of the empty grave. Looking into the tomb she sees two angels who ask her why she is crying. She simply responds, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid Him" (John 20:13). Turning around, Mary sees a man she supposes to be the gardener. He asks her the same question and she gives Him a similar response. Then Jesus reveals Himself by saying, "Mary!" She sees Jesus and cries out, "Teacher!" (John 20:15-16). Mary immediately arises out of tearful hopelessness into the joy of "seeing" again her Savior and friend.

Later, Christ showed Himself to all of His apostles, all except Thomas who was absent. Thomas, for reasons unknown, misses their gathering, and in doing so fails to "see" his resurrected Lord. When Thomas' brethren joyously proclaim Jesus' personal revelation to them, he declares he will only believe when he can feel the "print of the nails" in Jesus' hands and "put his hand in His side" (John 20:24-25). Eight days later Jesus again appears to the twelve, including Thomas. The Lord invites

Thomas to do what he claims he must do to believe. He answers, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus concludes by telling Thomas, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed" (John 20:29).

Why did they not see? Several reasons could be offered: misconceptions as to Jesus' true nature, difficulty in accepting His resurrection, or their failure to meditate on the Messianic prophecies (John 20:9). The real problem seems to be their blindness through doubt and disbelief. Saints often struggle with this. They profess their undying, unwavering faith and then question many truths taught in the scripture. They want to be a disciple without making Jesus the center of their lives. This is impossible (Matthew 10:34-39). They don't see the Lord even though the evidence abounds (John 20:31-31). Jesus teaches one's ability to "see Him" is based upon a genuine love and desire to know Him by knowing and understanding His words (Matthew 13:16).
