Two Ways You Can Encourage Others

We are first introduced to Philemon in the small letter written by Paul. He opens the letter by referring to Philemon as a beloved brother and fellow worker of the Lord. His family was busy in the kingdom. Philemon and his wife, Apphia, opened their home to the local congregation for worship. His son, Archippus was most likely an evangelist in Colosse as Paul mentions him in Colossians 4:17. God has chosen not to reveal to us Philemon's age, work or the time and circumstances of his death. Tradition tells us that he and his wife were stoned for the cause of Jesus during the reign of the Roman emperor Nero. While we do not have every detail of his life, we have what is important and necessary: Philemon and his family were godly and did their best to love the Lord and encourage others.

In verse seven, Paul writes: For I have come to have much joy and comfort in your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, brother. By the usage of the word "refreshed," we know that Philemon spent his life ministering to the needs of those around him. This is the meaning of the term, and it is used by Paul throughout the New Testament. "Refresh" is used in 1 Corinthians 16:18, 2 Corinthians 7:13, and 2 Timothy 1:16.

Think of how we are encouraged or refreshed spiritually when someone takes the time to send a card our way, helps us with a home project, invites us to dinner, or just gives us a hug. We can be encouraged and uplifted just by being present at worship and Bible study! Since we know these things help us, we should be ready to return the favor to others. In fact, we have a responsibility to carry through with this as Christians. Each day we are presented with opportunities to encourage others. For example:

We can encourage others by praying for them. Paul specifically solicited prayers from other Christians, Romans 15:30-31. He urged them to pray for his work and success in spreading the gospel. Praying for our evangelistic efforts to succeed and for one another must become a top

priority. Use the weekly prayer list! Use the email to solicit prayers through the week. We can pray for those who may be changing jobs; young Christians, our Bible classes and teachers, those who are sick, young married couples, or widows and widowers, the elderly, those who are spiritually sick, and those who are burdened by cares and troubles.

Think for a moment how the prayers of those around you has helped you deal with the problems you face. It is wonderful to know that others are praying for you! Paul wrote, Devote yourselves to prayer, keeping alert in it with an attitude of thanksgiving, Colossians 4:2.

We can encourage others by being optimistic. In the book of Numbers, we read of how the Israelites were faced with a great problem--taking the land of Canaan. Unfortunately, the majority of people were pessimistic in their approach and did not believe they could accomplish the task. Caleb's attitude stands in great contrast to those around him. Numbers 13:30 says, Then Caleb quieted the people before Moses and said, "We should by all means go up and take possession of it, for we will surely overcome it." Caleb's optimism was fueled by his great trust in God! How strong is our faith? It is our faith that produces optimism! Remember, we walk by faith not by sight, 2 Corinthians 5:7. It is faith that trusts that God is at work in (us), both to will and to work for His good pleasure, Philippians 2:13. God is at work in us. When sight says something is impossible, faith says we will overcome with the help of God!

As we think about Philemon, I believe we can see that he would have been someone who would have refreshed others by praying for them and being optimistic. It would have been seen in his actions, his love, and his attitude. Can it be said of us that we are refreshing? Encouraging? Uplifting? Let us do our best to possess these kind of qualities in our spiritual lives. Let all things be done for edification, 1 Corinthians 14:26.

For What Are We Preparing?

This country is full of people who are busy providing and preparing for something, but what is it? In the process of this preparation for something in the future, they are losing their souls. Money plays a vital role in the building of new barns in which to bestow their goods for the future. That makes money the most important commodity sought after, and most people are after as much of it as they can get. There is very little importance to how they get it, just so they can get more and more. Several high ranking political figures have recently been toppled from their positions of power because of their greed for money. Even the ones who brought their downfall are guilty of the same things.

Jesus taught a lesson in the form of a parable, recorded in Luke 12:16-21, in which he pictures a man who gives all his talents and time to preparing for this life by way of wealth. He gave no thought to the life which is to come. When he reached the point in preparations for this life, when he thought he was secure, he said to himself: "Soul, thou has much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry." This, I think, is the goal of most preparation today. Men will work hard to build a house in which to live. They will provide comfortable surroundings for their families and themselves. They will accumulate estates for later life and put their trust in that which is laid up for a "rainy day." All of it for this life of a few short years, and when this is done they think they are safe and all is well. But suddenly they face death and eternity. There is no real lasting security in earthly things, yet these are the objectives of the great majority of people on earth today. All here is vanity and vexation of spirit.

To what does the average person look forward in eternity? After the man in the parable had assured himself that he could now enjoy life because he has been successful in preparing for his life here, God said to him, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided?" What a terrifying realization! All his work for nothing. He had spent all his effort in providing for this life, and when he was ready to enjoy the fruits of his labors, his life is about to end. What would happen to all this work? What good was all the preparation for this life now that he was going to die?

How many millions are now in the same situation as this poor man.

As a conclusion to this parable, and the lesson which the Lord wants men to get: "So is he that layeth up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God." Every man and woman who emphasizes preparation for comforts and pleasures for this life and ignores preparation for eternity is in the class with this man who lost all. The day will come, and it may be sooner than you think, when your life will be required. Then what will happen to all those things which you prepared for this life? More importantly, what will you do about the failure to prepare for the judgment and for eternity?

It is right to provide for those things we need in this life, but it is wrong to push into second or third place the things of the Spirit. The most important preparation before us now is not the needs for the present, but for the time when we shall all appear before the Lord to account for the lives we have spend on the earth. When you put "making a living" before "serving the Lord" you are preparing for the present and not for eternity. No argument can change that. Then you put "having a good time" before "obeying God" you are making provisions for this life, and are not rich toward God.

Preparation for eternal life requires a faithful and constant study of God's word, an obedient life of worship and work for the Lord, and a faithful and regular attendance to all opportunities for public worship and edifying. Do not be a fool, as Jesus said this man was, but make you preparation for eternal life.

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Amethyst, Thou Art A Jewel

Amethyst is a beautiful violet-colored variety of quartz. The Greeks believed it could protect its owner from drunkenness, thus they called the stone "Amethyst, which comes from the Greek "amethystos," meaning "not intoxicating."

Aristotle told the story of the word's mythological history. He asserted the Amethyst was a beautiful nymph

who invoked the aid of the goddess Artemis to protect her from Dionysus, the god of wine. Artemis did this by turning her into a precious gem, and Dionysus, in honor of his love for Amethyst, gave the stone its color and quality of preserving its wearers from the influence of wine. Wearing the stone supposedly guarded one from drunkenness.

Though the stone is never referred to in scripture, Christians recognize the Greek term "Amethyst." It is the word "methuo" joined with the Greek prefix "a." Bible students remember the accusation of the Jews on Pentecost, "These men are full of new wine" (Acts 2:13). Peter rejoined, "For these are not drunken (methuo,mwm) as you suppose" (v.15). The Greek prefix "a" is much akin to the Latin "in" or our English "un." It makes the word to which it is prefixed profoundly negative. Combined with the prefix "a" "methuo" is given a negative sense, hence "not drunk." Surely, amethyst is a jewel in every faithful Christian's character.
