flowery beds of ease. It does not work that way. Our brothers in the world have fought to win the prize and sailed through bloody seas. Ours may be more subtle battles within, and come in less physically threatening ways, but the spiritual threats of subtlety are always constant. Resist him brethren!

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### A Fork In The Road

Life is full of choices. Just take a moment and think about how many different decisions you made today. What time to get up? What to wear? What to eat? Each day we are confronted with choices. Some of the choices we make on a daily basis have very little impact on our lives, such as what and where to eat? Other choices can significantly change the course of our lives. Do we get married? Do we have children? Which career path will I choose?

Of all the choices that we make, the most critical of all is our decision about God and His kingdom. That is the ultimate choice that determines our eternal destiny. All the other important decisions in life hinge on that choice. It is a decision that Jesus calls on us to make. Jesus said, "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few" (Matthew 7:13-14). In our lives we quickly come to a fork in the road of life. We will be standing at the crossroads where two signs, one pointing to Jesus and eternal life and the other pointing toward a path of destruction. Each of us will have to make our own choice. As we stand at the fork in the road, what will we choose?

As we stand at the crossroads we are confronted by two gates:

#### The Wide Gate:

This gate is wide and easy to enter. Many people will be making the decision to travel this way in life. It is attractive, indulgent, and self-serving. It is tolerant, non-judgmental, and non-offensive. To step through

this gate and walk on the easy road requires few, if any, restrictions or requirement. You can be your own boss, be your own Lord for that matter. Entering this gate will allow you to carry any baggage you want with you. Sin is tolerated. Doctrine is avoided. There is little emphasis on morality and commitment. Those who enter this gate will ridicule those who are squeezing through the other gate. What scares me about the wide gate is that it leads to hell, the sentence of eternal damnation away from God in a burning lake of fire.

#### The Narrow Gate:

This gate is narrow and hard to enter. It is not a popular choice to make. This gate is so narrow that you have to go through it alone. You cannot take anyone else with you. Your husband, your wife, your children, your relatives and friends cannot enter hanging on to your leg. If they would enter, they must do so on the basis of their own choice. This gate is also so narrow that you cannot bring your baggage with you. Your sins cannot enter with you. Your pride cannot enter with you. All of your self-accomplishments, influence of money--all of it must be left behind if you are to enter the narrow gate. The rich young ruler discovered this when he wanted to become a disciple of Jesus. He was very wealthy and Jesus told him that before he could enter he had to give some of his possessions to the poor. The young man went away sorrowful (Matthew 19:16 -22). The gate was too narrow for him and his wealth. Choosing to leave everything behind and entering through the narrow gate has tremendous blessings but it is hard. It takes commitment, sacrifice, and devotion to stay on the narrow road. However, this road leads to eternal life. Those who squeeze through this narrow gate will enjoy being in the presence of God for eternity.

Life is all about choices and life is about the freedom to make those choices. God loved us enough to allow us to choose which gate we will enter. When you stand at the fork in the road of life, which gate will you enter?

# Procrastinating Godliness

It had been 16 years since the Jews returned from captivity, yet they still had not completed the rebuilding of the temple--a project God used to return them to Judah (Ezra 1:1-5). They promised to do this noble work, in honor of their Savior, but had become distracted with their own interest. Haggai the prophet was sent in to issue this reminder: "Thus speaks the LORD of host, saying: 'This people says, The time has not come, the time that the Lord's house should be built.' Then the word of the LORD came by Haggai the prophet, saying, 'Is it time for you yourselves to dwell in your paneled houses, and this temple to lie in ruins?'" (Haggai 1:2-4).

Their problem was not a fear of doing a poor job on the temple; they had enough skill and resources to panel their houses! Their problem was what we struggle with even today: procrastination. "The time has not come" is what they told themselves in putting off the Lord's work. The reality was, the right time was not coming as long as they cared more for their own houses than they did the Lord's.

We slowly poison our lives with the lies of procrastination. We convince ourselves that we will do more for the Lord when the time comes, but deep down inside we have as much intention in making those changes as the Jews had in finishing the temple. "One day, I'll apply myself to be the leader my family needs." "One day, I'll have more brethren into my home." But, one day never comes. Before we know it, 16 years have passed and we still haven't sent the first card or made the first call. Meanwhile, we enjoy all the luxuries we can in our paneled houses. As long as the satellite bill is paid and the pantry is full, we have all that we want out of life.

This is not to say it is wrong to enjoy the blessings of life (1 Timothy 6:17), or the portion God gives us under the sun. The question is are we putting forth the same effort in the work of God as we are in filling our lives with luxury? Are we as concerned about telling His gospel to a dying world as we are about earthly appearances? If we haven't done those good deeds yet, when will we? At what point will we teach that Bible class, lead that public prayer, or talk to our

family about God? When will we become a more skillful worker for the Lord? "The lazy man is wiser in his own eyes than seven men who can answer sensibly" (Proverbs 26:16). A procrastinator will always find ways to justify himself.

We only get one life to exercise faith in God and to make a difference in this world for Him--for "there is no work or device or knowledge or wisdom in the grave where you are going" (Ecclesiastes 9:10). The earth and its works, including your home, will burn up one day, but the work of God is eternal. Are you still going about your Father's business in seeking first the kingdom of heaven?
