Why Does Evil Exist?

Epicurus, an ancient Greek philosopher who lived about 300 B.C., said, "Is God willing to prevent evil, but not able? Then he is not omnipotent. Is he able and not willing? Then he is malevolent. Is he both able and willing? Then whence cometh evil? Is he neither able nor willing? Then why call him God?" Others have asked these same questions for the 2300 years since. However, in their seeming wisdom, they merely demonstrate how philosophers, enamored with their own wisdom cannot see the flaws in their own reasoning.

Epicurus and his philosophical offspring over the millennia have created a false dilemma. That is, they have developed a set of choices and acted like the choices they have listed are the only ones available when they are not.

Epicurus believed a God who is able to eradicate evil but doesn't do so must be malevolent. So, there are but two choices. Either God is not able to do anything about evil or God is evil Himself. It didn't occur to Epicurus that there is a third option. It never occurred to him that God might actually be wiser than him and have a **better** alternative.

Is it possible God sees a good end that can come from the evil and suffering that goes on in the world even today? Is it possible God allows evil because in His infinite wisdom He can actually use it in a way that benefits men if we will let it?

I suggest God who is able to eradicate all evil is unwilling to do so not because He is malevolent but because He loves us too much to do so.

First, His love is demonstrated by granting us the free will to choose between good and evil. He loves us too much to force us to be good like Him. He lets us pursue our own course.

Second, He loves us enough to allow evil so that we may grow and learn to rely on Him, which leads to salvation (cf. 2 Corinthians 12:7 -10; Romans 5:3-5). Without evil in the world, we would have no notion

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More Than Simply Hearing

Paul said, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek" (Romans 1:16). This is one of the most greatly admired statements the Paul ever uttered. His conviction is clear and understandable. We cannot help but be amazed when we view the changes, affected by the gospel, in the lives of ourselves and other, who "...once walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air...fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind" (Ephesians 2:2-3). No other power could have been the catalyst for such a transformation than the power of God's saving gospel. It is no great wonder then, why Paul and others, seemed so intent on spreading the gospel to the whole world.

There is nothing in life that is as supremely important as giving heed to the gospel of Christ. It is much more important than any of the daily concerns and cares of life. There was once an occasion when a very just and honorable woman, named Martha, was visited by Jesus. Understandably, Martha wanted her honored guest, and His companions, to be comfortable and attended to, so she busied herself with serving them. Her sister, Mary, chose rather to sit at Jesus' feet and listen to Him. Martha, left alone to see after her guest, complains to Jesus about Mary's choice, even directing Jesus to order Mary to help her. Jesus' reply is very telling. He says. "Martha, Martha, you are worried and troubled about many things. But one thing is needed, and Mary has chosen that good part, which will not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:38-42). Likewise, much too often we are distracted from honestly investigating what God has to say because of undue concern for the cares of life.

Be warned, however, simply hearing is not enough. While "...faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17), "...faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead" (James 2:17). Obedience is a very necessary part of our salvation. The gospel is God's power to save, but in obedience we yield to that power. The Hebrew writer reminds us, "...without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that he is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). Even here we see that simply believing is not sufficient; God will only be pleased by those who diligently seek after Him. Earlier, in this same letter, we are told Jesus is "...the author of eternal salvation to all who obey Him" (Hebrews 5:8-9).

The only faith that pleases God is an obedient faith. Will you not obey, from the heart, that same form of doctrine that disciples of old obeyed to be delivered from their sins (Romans 6:17)?

God's Valuable Gospel

If your house is on fire so that you must escape immediately what item would you retrieve first on your way out the door? That will tell you something about what you value the most. Jesus promises that one day our world will be incinerated. What will be most precious to us as we leave the physical realm? Our Savior quickly answers that for us. "For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26) Friends, when we obey the gospel it profoundly changes us in several ways.

We look at our fellowman as a friend and not a rival. Jesus reaches out to everyone as he walked life's pathway. Yes, he taught the Jews (Matthew 5:7) but He also conversed with a sinful Samaritan woman (John 4) and marveled at a centurion's faith (Matthew 8:5-10). The gospel vastly changed its first converts. Persecution scatters the Jerusalem saints who went everywhere speaking His word (Acts 8:4), Philip teaches his Jewish adversaries in Samaria (Acts 8:5-8), and Cornelius, the first gentile, obeys Peter's preaching (Acts 10). Those who really love Christ's gospel can't stop talking about it (Acts 17:16).

The value we place on Jesus' gospel displays itself in our attitude toward supporting the preaching and teaching of it. God's word lays out His design for an organized, functional church. Our Lord designates special leaders, evangelists and elders, to call the lost to salvation and oversee their maturing in each local congregation (Ephesians 4:11-16). Ideally when they do their work well God's people are to honor and respect them (Philippians 2:25-30 and 1 Timothy 5:17-18). There's hardly anything more discouraging than the Lord's leaders failing to get positive feedback from the saints they serve (1 Timothy 4:16-17). There's another aspect to supporting God's ministers, financial. Paul states, "Even so the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should live from the gospel" (1 Corinthians 9:14). Why would any Christian hesitate to verbally and financially support gospel ministers? Paul states the some "so called" Christians worked to discourage him motivated by their envy and

strife (Philippians 1:14-16). Also, he reprimands the Corinthian church by writing them, "I robbed other churches, taking wages from them to minister to you" (2 Corinthians 11:8). Faithful saints must encourage those who serve them through the gospel.

God's truth causes us to see our eternal spirit rather than viewing ourselves as only a physical, finite being. The gospel is a double edged sword. One side cuts hearts so that they repent and are baptized unto the forgiveness of their sins (Acts 2:36-38). The other causes the trembling of Felix (Acts 24:24-25) and the anger of Stephen's Jerusalem audience (Acts 7). Which side of this do you represent? How much do you value the gospel of Jesus Christ? Only the gospel will usher people into heaven (Romans 1:16).
