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Can We Be United?

Often, in the religious world, people will lament the fact that there is so much division. The division is often excused by people saying that the Bible cannot be understood alike, but such an attitude eliminates any hope of true biblical unity. In seeing the need for unity and Christ's desire for it (1 Corinthians 1:10; John 17:20-21), religious groups believing entirely different things will gather together, agree not to discuss the points of division and will have a so-called "unity meeting". The question is, "If this is not unity (which it is not) can Biblical unity be achieved?" The Bible teaches that we can be and are expected to be united and the Bible can be understood alike (Ephesians 4:3; 5:17).

The religious division that exists today is a result of men following what men say through their creeds, confessions of faith, disciplines, manuals, etc. rather than what the word of God has said. The truth is determined in many cases, by what conventions and synods proclaim as truth, rather than what the Scriptures say. Biblical unity is impossible to obtain while there are denominational bodies which teach conflicting doctrines from the various creed books, but claim to be followers of Christ. Jesus, in His prayer to the Father for unity among the believers said, "Sanctify them with thy truth, thy word is truth" (John 17:17). As Jesus continues His prayer, we see the result of this was so all the believers would be united. "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me" (John 17:20-21). Christ prayed that His disciples and those that are taught by the word, would be one. The unity Christ prayed for was for those in the first century, as well as those today. This unity which Christ prayed for is commanded of those that follow Christ. Paul exhorted the Corinthians to be of the "same mind and the same judgment" (1 Corinthians 1:10) and he further told the Philippians, "Let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing" (Philippians 3:16).

In order to achieve the unity of which Paul was speaking of and that Christ prayed for, we must all use the same standard as our authority in religious matters. We recognize this with regard to other facets of this life. If a man goes to build a house, would he not use the proper standard of measurement? If a lady was cooking a recipe, would she not follow the standard of measurement specified? The answer to the previous two questions is yes, of course. Those in the first century were united because they "continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine" (Acts 2:42). They used the only standard of authority for the things that they practiced in religion. The unity that existed among the Christians in the first century was the result of their being taught by the apostles to be of the same mind and judgment, and their understanding Christ's desire for those who would believe through the inspired word of God. Why then do we not use the only divine rule? The answer is that many do not have the proper attitude toward the word of God. Numerous examples are written for our admonition concerning those who thought they could change things to what they desired instead of following the teaching of God. Examples include Nadab and Abihu (Leviticus 10), Uzzah (2 Samual 6), the children of Israel wanting a king instead of Judges to rule over them (1 Samuel 8), Naaman (2 Kings 5), etc. These examples resulted in divisions, death, pain, and hardships. Let us determine that we are not going to allow our attitude toward what the word of God teaches be altered by popularity, family relationships, preconceived ideas, or allurement to the things of this world.

Yes, we can have unity! And we can have the kind of unity that God desires us to have. God's word is very important because it teaches us the truth and we will be be judged according to it (John 17:17; 12:48). Let us be keenly aware that the Bible is God's inspired revelation to man, and it teaches us what we should do to be pleasing and faithful to God in order to receive the crown of life. (2 Timothy 3:16-17; Titus 2:15; Revelation 2:10; 2 Timothy 4:7,8). The apostle Paul made it clear to the Galatians that they should be able to understand the gospel that was taught and be able to recognize error when it was taught (Galatians 1:6-9). To be able to recognize error, we all should heed the exhortation of Paul to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15). Let us recognize that when the divine rule is followed, there can be the kind of unity God desires.

The Stone of Help

God's answer to their fervent cry came in the form of an absolute rout of the Philistine force. To insure this event would serve as a perpetual reminder to Israel in the future, Samuel erected a stone between Mizpeh and Shen and named the place Ebenezer, saying "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us" (1 Samuel 7:5-12). The narrative of this Old Testament event serves to this present day as a reminder to the Lord's faithful people of God's succor of those who are obedient to Him. Christ is that help.

Life upon this earth is fraught with many difficulties and predicaments; none as great as man's separation from God by sin. The danger of this separation may not be felt by many while life on this earth continues. Men and women wholly estranged from God enjoy their earthly lives, succeed in business and live in quite solitude with their fellowman. Such people may in old age have little regret. Yet, may I ask, what of the future? The real peril of mankind is facing God without an advocate, without atonement for sin, without hope. Rightly, this is mankind's greatest fear. It is here Christ, our stone of Help, benefits us the most. The apostle John reminded first century Christians, "My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin, we have an advocate with

the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (1 John 2:1). Jesus Christ is our salvation from the oppressive hand of satanic tyranny — sin.

There is no more important enterprise than the preaching and teaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Jesus in His last personal appointment to the chosen apostles said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Why is preaching the word of God such an important work for Christians? Because it was to the Lord. Because the souls of men are in danger of being damned for eternity (Mark 16:16). The desire of the Lord's people should be to be faithful to our commission.

Multiplied thousands are wondering aimlessly through life, living life as they please by their own rules. This was Israel's condition before Samuel, a dedicated servant, turned the people back to God. The chosen people of God had rejected God's will, the religious leaders of their day were corrupt and tolerant of sin. God had rejected them and allowed their enemies to overcome them. The ark of God had been taken by wicked hands into battle, and Israel suffered Jehovah's vengeance for their evil. Only then did they realize from whence their help in days past had come. And, by turning back to God, repenting of the evils which they had committed and obeying God's will, He became their Stone of Help. Likewise, He can be ours. But, it's up to us. Will we not then share this lesson of truth with our friends and neighbors?

Our prayer is this will be our aim. All we ask is for receptive hearts and an open Bible.
