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Where Did God Authorize This?

Near The close of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said:

"Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father who is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy by thy name, and by thy name cast out demons, and by thy name do many mighty works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:21-23).

This passage teaches a great fundamental truths--the emptiness and presumptuousness of doing anything the Lord has not authorized. Every ingredient of faithfulness to God and His Son is contained in this sweeping principle. One who has his heart set on doing "all in the name of the Lord" (Colossians 3:17) will be faithful in all things.

The Lord's statement clearly demonstrates that God requires more than mere faith, sincerity, human effort, and/or "religious" acts if one is to be saved. Unless one is engaged in behavior God has authorized (i.e., doing "the will of my Father"), one's efforts are all in vain.

What God does not authorize, He does not recognize.

It is not enough that we like something, something attracts large crowds, a "big" congregation somewhere is doing this or that, or some "great name" preacher supports, endorses, or teaches it. All that matters is "where does God authorize this?"

Merely to call Jesus' name over what we do is no sign of His approval (Acts 19:14-16). Faithful men in modern times operate on the premise of book, chapter, and verse--explicit or implicit--and we must seek scriptural authority for every word and deed.

We must never forget this tremendous fact. So much preaching and practice nowadays has no more authority for it than John Calvin, ancient

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Our Aim As A Church Family

Scripture's overriding message is reconciliation. God seeks to reconcile man to a proper relationship with Himself by providing forgiveness for our sins; this great purpose has been accomplished in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ at Calvary (2 Corinthians 5:16-21). As men and women reconciled to the Father, we are to join ourselves together as a spiritual family of Christians, even as we read in the New Testament (Romans 12:4-5). These independent church families, existing throughout the world, are to function within the parameters of God's written word – the Bible. That is our aim here at Stonegate.

But no local church family is perfect, inasmuch as humans are imperfect. We must always try to grow closer and closer to the model of scripture as we come to understand the Bible more clearly. This, too, must be our aim at Stonegate. This pursuit of reconciliation, sometimes called restoration, is a noble calling, and one in which we invite other to participate.

Every local church – regardless of what name is on its building – should recognize the necessity of reconciling its practices to what we read in God's word. Unfortunately, many churches exist for the purpose of extending the borders of man-made denominations, even though the concept of denominationalism is antithetical to the teaching of Jesus Christ. His desire is that believers be united, not hopelessly divided into competing sects. (John 17:20-21).

And even in local churches with no denominational affiliation, as is increasingly common today, the emphasis is often not upon pleasing God, but man. In fact, many modern churches have been started by polling the community as to what it "wants in a church" and then catering to those wants. The result will always be a church that's entertaining and fun, but not necessarily pleasing to God. And that's what many people just don't get: that what pleases man is not necessarily what pleases God! What God truly wants from people is spelled out in His word.

"All scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). Many people do not believe in the inspiration of scripture. others pay lip-service to the concept of inspiration but, frankly, don't like what these verses mean. Many religious people object to anything that might restrict their freedom to do exactly as they please. But Paul clearly says that God's inspired word is designed to offer us reproof and correction. Aye, there's the rub. People don't like reproof and correction. Reproof is another them for rebuke, and who likes to be rebuked? And correction refers to one being restored to a right way of doing things. Well again, who wants to be told he's wrong? We would much rather have approval and affirmation of what we do religiously, regardless of how unbiblical it might be. Today's religious world has little appreciation for Bible authority; it's all about pleasing people and drawing a crowd.

We Christians who meet at Stonegate (Market Street, DAC) make no claim of perfection; there will

always be ways for God's people to improve ourselves and our practices. Our aim is to follow the Bible in the way we worship, the work that we pursue, our methods of evangelizing, what we teach, and how we live our lives as individual disciples of Jesus Christ. We want to be able to turn to scripture to demonstrate our authority for doing what we do – and to tell the truth – we think it's fair to expect the same from others. no, we don't claim to know everything about the Bible. We don't have all the answers, but part of discipleship is determining to keep looking in God's word for answers (2 Timothy 2:15; 2 Peter 3:18).

Our plea to you is a simple one: let's get back to the Bible! Too much of true Christianity has been obscured by modern "churchianity." Instead of pointing to a "thus saith the Lord" in determining right and wrong, too many are asking "what do the people want?" As Paul once wrote, "If I were still trying to please man, I would not be a servant of Christ" (Galatians 1:10). Our aim is to reconcile all we do with the word of God. Won't you make it your aim, too?

Contentment enables us to put "things" in their proper perspective, and whether we "abound or suffer need" we can say, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Anxiety and worry are enemies of the joy given to us in Christ. contentment is that virtue that qualifies concern, turns to God, and continues a walk of faith regardless of the current distress.
