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# The Relevancy of the Bible To Modern Man

The relevancy of the Bible to modern man is constantly being called into question by doubters in each generation, especially in the "enlightened" age in which we live. Thus we find religion in it's many forms today seeking relevance in a largely materialistic society. Many such attempts are designed to do so by accommodating the fleshly, materialistic side of man. The interest here is upon man's social concerns, his worldly values and human wisdom. Not only will such an effort ultimately fail but will do much damage in the process. On the other hand if by "relevancy" we mean meeting man's real needs and deep concerns of the soul; the Bible is indeed relevant and vital to modern man. The Lord invites, "Come unto me all ye who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:38).

Our greatest need may be broadly defined as happiness, both here and hereafter. Although different labels may be used to try to identify and define it, ultimately it is all related to a deep longing to be happy or to live "the good life". Mankind has long sought the secret or key to happiness. This search has taken many different forms and led in many directions. Sadly, relatively few look for it in the only place it can be found. 1 Peter 3:10-12 reveals that "loving life and seeing good days" is contingent upon our closely guarding our tongues, genuinely seeking peace and turning away from evil and doing good. God is the only one who can make that kind of happiness happen for us, for indeed "His eyes are over the righteous and His ears are open unto their prayers, but the face of the Lord is against them that do evil."

Psychologist, as well as common sense, tell us that our happiness is most affected by the following things:

- 1. A sense of security physically and financially (Matthew 6:19-33).
- 2. A sense of love and belonging (note John 3:16; 1 John 4:1).

- 3. A sense of self-worth (note: Gen. 1:26, 27; Acts 17:28, 29).
- 4. A sense of peace and freedom from guilt (note John 8:32, Phil. 4:6,7; John 16:33).
- 5. Deep concerns about the future (note 2 Corinthians 5:1-7; Titus 1:1, 2; Romans 8:28).

Since our well-being and happiness hinge upon these things, in order for the Bible to be relevant it must address these areas of concern for God's people. Indeed it does! Each of the above passages clearly make the point that we can find help in our loving Father and answers to our questions in His all-sufficient word.

The Bible provides sound solutions for the many problems plaguing our society today such as in marriage and family (Matthew 19:5-9; Ephesians 5; Titus 2:1-4), hopelessness and despair (Hebrews 6:18,19; Romans 8:24,25), morality and ethical conduct (Matthew 7:12; Philppians 4:8; Ephesians 4:31, 32) and a host of others. Of course the greatest need that we all have is forgiveness and hope of heaven through the blood of God's own Son on our behalf!

The Bible deals forthrightly with the issue of good and evil as well as suffering and death and the purpose and meaning of life itself (Ecclesiastes 12:13; Matthew 16:26; Romans 8:18). The final outcome of the faithful child of God is assured (1 John 5:4; Revelation 21 & 22). The Bible is indeed an amazingly relevant book for the ages being inspired by the very God who created man and knows his every need (2 Timothy 3;16, 17). It will work in our lives to bring happiness if we will faithfully apply it to our needs. Jesus said to His disciples, "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them" (1 John 13:17). For Christians the Bible is "a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path." Let us resolve to constantly seek its light and walk therein (1 John 1:7).

# Applying It To Our Lives

A common phrase heard in our prayers is that we should listen to the sermon and "apply it to our lives." This is a sensible exhortation, for the ultimate objective of the Christian is to live the precepts of God, to conform to His standards, to pattern ourselves after His image and character.

The relationship between faith and knowledge is symbiotic. True faith is produced by exposure to and instruction by the revelation of God (Romans 10:17). That faith generated by knowledge drives us back to God's word over and over again as the source of life, wisdom and solace. And thus the cycle continues: knowledge breeds faith that seeks for more knowledge.

Knowledge of God's word does involve the acquisition of data: learning names, places, dates, book content, historical flow, etc. These comprise the skeleton to which will be attached the organs, vessels and skin of inner character. Too many people have fallen for cheap knowledge: they are "religious" but know very little factual detail about the Bible.

But Christianity is not merely an intellectual pursuit. We cannot content ourselves with the belief that we either possess the truth or are exposed regularly to the truth by preaching. The most important element follows. We must ask: What does this knowledge mean to me in my daily activities? What are the implications as I face life's triumphs and tragedies?

Peter had been honored with the "keys of the kingdom," opening the door first to the Jews (Acts 2) and then to the Gentiles (Acts 10). Yet, when a threatening situation arose which demanded the proper application of the principles he had espoused, Peter failed to put them into practice (Galatians 2:11-13). Paul rebuked him publicly for neglecting to "apply it to his life." Paul said to the Thessalonians that "you received the word of God which you heard from us, you welcomed it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God" (1 Thessalonians 2:13). But what result came from such "hearing" and "welcoming"? "... Which also effectively works in you who believe. For you, brethren, became imitators of the churches of God which are in Judea in Christ Jesus. For you also suffered the same things

from your own countrymen, just as they did from the Jews" (2:14). The Thessalonians "applied it to their lives" – and paid for it.

What does it take to apply spiritual lessons to our lives? How do we get the sermon or the Bible study lesson into our hearts?

First, there must be a recognition that we are incomplete. Our character is constantly under construction. We must be searching for lessons and insight to incorporate into our thinking so that we may be making the transformation into Christ (2 Corinthians 3:18).

Second, we must be honest. When the preacher steps on our toes or a caring brother confronts us with a legitimate concern, we must put our pride aside and ask, "Do they have a point?"

Third, there must be thought, reflection, contemplation. Frankly, we have become a people too busy for meaningful meditation upon the deeper things of life. Overcommitted schedules take us from one activity to another; we react to the appointments of the day until, exhausted, we fall into bed. The next day, we do it all over again.

Take this article and "apply it to your life."
