Have You Ever Wondered Why?

A Readers Digest article titled: "Ever Wonder why?" contained some interesting facts. For instance, have you ever wondered why: "Men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's are on the left? It's easier for right-handed people, the majority, to push buttons on the right through holes on the left, and so men's buttons are on the right. When first used, buttons were expensive and worn primarily by the well-to-do. Women in that class were usually dressed by servants. Since a maid would face the woman she was dressing, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right the woman's left where they've remained."

The same is true in religion. Today churches of men have adopted practices based on their personal convenience and on the decisions of men in the past rather than in the scriptures. Few ask the important question: "Why do we do that?" Jesus said in Matthew 15:8-9: "These people draw near to Me with their mouth, And honor Me with their lips, But their heart is far from Me. And in vain they worship Me, Teaching as doctrines the commandments of men."

Please do not think that mindless service to God will do any good. Consider a few questions to ask today:

1. Why do men sprinkle babies today and call it baptism? (Rom. 6:3-4)
2. Why do churches not take the Lord's Supper on the first day of every week? (Acts 20:7).
3. Why do churches have church creeds and conventions to tell their members what to believe? (2 Timothy 3:16-17; Colossians 2:18-22)

If we call Jesus Lord then should we not show it by keeping His word over what men desire? (Luke 6:46) You may be surprised at the vicious opposition you will receive when you question the long held traditions of men. Paul warns each of us to choose the cross of Christ over the favor of men. Consider how Paul answered these questions:

1. Who is a real servant of Christ? "For do I now persuade men, or God? Or do I seek to please men? For if I still pleased men, I would

- not be a bondservant of Christ” (Galatians 1:10).
2. What if I give in to men for the sake of “peace?” “As many as desire to make a good showing in the flesh, these would compel you to be circumcised, only that they may not suffer persecution for the cross of Christ” (Galatians 6:12).
 3. If I really know Jesus, will I allow the demands of this world to take priority over the sacrifices Christ expects of me? “But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world” (Galatians 6:14).

Let each of us go beyond “wondering why” we do things in service to God and begin today to search the scriptures and know why! Be ready for the surprise of learning that many things that are commonly accepted by the masses are not found in God’s word. Also be ready to stand against the intimidating pressures of men. God will bless you richly, only if you are willing to follow Him (Luke 14:33).

Out of Focus

A severely out of focus picture is not worth the paper it is printed on. An out of focus life is not much better.

Actually, it is rarely the case that a photograph is totally out of focus. Usually, you can find parts of the picture that are clear and sharp. But it’s not the part of the scene you planned to capture.

Why did it happen? The focus mechanism of the camera will bring into focus the part of the scene at which the view finder is pointed. If you’re trying to take a picture of your four-year old sitting in a chair and he suddenly moves, you’ll probably get a nice, sharp picture of the wall behind him. Your four-year old, meanwhile, will be a blur.

Christianity can be like that. We mean to focus on the Lord, but instead of the Lord moving, we move the view finder of our life. There He is, in all His glory,

filling up the frame. But right behind him is a shiny, dark blue BMW Z4 and, ever so subtly, we turn the lens toward the car and the focus follows.

John calls this problem the lust of the eyes in 1 John 2:16. In this case, the lust of the eyes may be motivated by another class of sin he mentions, the boastful pride of life. “Wouldn’t people think I’m something special if they saw me driving this car,” we may catch ourselves thinking. All of this may lead to a third category of sin that John mentions, the lust of the flesh. Our appetite for recognition and our hunger for the fleshly exhilaration of owning such an automobile may lead to covetousness and greed and all kinds of binding lusts. Peter said, “for by what a man is overcome, by this he is enslaved” (2 Peter 2:19).

All that because of a hunk of metal. What a bargain, eh? Meanwhile, Jesus is a just a blur in our life, hardly recognizable to us anymore. He has been replaced. Individuals do this, churches do this, we all are susceptible to doing it. We forget why we are here.

Unfortunately for those caught in this web, the film of life will be developed one day and “we’ll get the picture.” At judgment, when Jesus stands before us as our Judge, He will be the only one we see and He will be in terrifying focus. If we should hear those words, “depart from me, you worker of iniquity, I never knew you” we’ll know why. It’ll be because we couldn’t keep Jesus in our sight and maintain our focus on the only thing that really matters after all.

The Mistakes of Jesus

Luke tells us that after Jesus spent all night in prayer, He chose His twelve apostles (Luke 6:11-12). Today, Christians look at these men and marvel at their dedication to the Lord. The apostles were giants of faith! Yet, during the time Jesus selected them they must have looked like mistakes. Let us emphasize this idea by considering some examples.

Simon Peter had some wonderful leadership qualities. Once Jesus asked who the disciples thought He was. Peter quickly responded, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). What a wonderful confession of faith. At other times, Peter blurted out ideas that were not well thought out. He could be a "loose cannon." On the Mountain of Transfiguration, Simon awoke from sleep and suggested the building of three tabernacles for Jesus, Elijah and Moses. He said this "because he did not know what to say, for they were greatly afraid" (Mark 9:6). We all remember his bold proclamation that he would never forsake Christ. Then later he denied our Lord three times. Why would Jesus call Peter to be an apostle?

How could Matthew be an apostle? He was a publican or tax collector. Publicans were Jews who gathered taxes for the Roman government. Many used dishonest methods in extracting these funds. The Jews despised publicans. Jesus, however, called Matthew to be one of His closest disciples. This did not set well with the Pharisees. They asked Jesus' disciples, "Why does your Teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?" (Matthew 9:11). Jesus explained that the sinners were the ones that needed Him the most. Still, Matthew looks to be a strange pick as an apostle.

Another Simon became an apostle: Simon the Zealot. What was a zealot? Zealots were a small but militant group that believed they must throw off Roman rule by force of arms. Pharisees and scribes hated Roman domination, but they took a more diplomatic approach toward them. Can you imagine how Simon the Zealot and Matthew the Publican lived in peace? Why were both of these men selected to be close followers of our Lord?

Even the selection of James and John, the sons of

Zebedee, cause us to question Jesus' judgment. Once they asked Jesus if they could burn up a Samaritan village. He rebuked them and said they were to be of a different spirit (Luke 9:51-56).

How could Jesus make so many errors in judgment? They weren't errors. These men were imperfect and needed much spiritual growth. But they loved Jesus! And they were willing to correct their mistakes and to go on to maturity. This should encourage the rest of us who love and sincerely follow our Lord Jesus Christ.
