Labored In Vain

One of Paul’s concerns for Christians was whether or not they would remain faithful unto death. The doctrine of “Eternal Security” or “Once Saved Always Saved” was foreign to the inspired author. A Christian is very much capable of missing out on eternal life with God by losing their faith in Him, which is why we must “take heed” lest we fall (1 Corinthians 10:12; Hebrews 3:12-19).

The way in which Paul appealed to his brethren to not lose their faith was to let them know how much of a “waste” it would have been for them to be a Christian and not make heaven. He told the Thessalonians, “I sent to know your faith, lest by some means the tempter had tempted you, **and our labor might be in vain**” (1 Thessalonians 3:5). If they quit their walk with God because of its persecution, Paul’s labor in converting them would have been an absolute waste. All the sacrifices he made in bringing them the gospel and all the time he spent in patiently teaching them would have been in vain “if” they gave up as Christians. For in doing so, the Thessalonians would have ended their faith in the same condition they were in before Christianity: separated from God in their sins. It would be equivalent to a farmer spending months in the field working a crop only to have a storm come through near the time of harvest and wipe it out. All that labor “down the drain” because he was unable to reap the benefit of his hard work.

Christian friend, if you lose your faith before you die, you will have experienced the greatest loss of all humanity. It is one thing to never have known the way of God and face judgment. It is an even greater calamity to have known the truth, surrender to it, then abandon it at the last. Not only will you face a stricter judgment (Luke 12:48), you will have wasted a lifetime of sacrifice and good judgment. Every kind deed, every forgiving word, every sacrifice for peace, every denial of immorality, every service attended, every moment you defended God’s word will have all been in vain IF you lose your faith as a Christian. Like Lot’s wife, who went through the trouble of fleeing Sodom only to meet the same judgment as

the heathens because she looked back, so are Christians who do not love and trust the Lord till the end. The crown of life is not given to those who enter the race, but to those who finish it (James 1:12). Anything less than that, is a wasted life.

“Enthusiasm”

How enthusiastic are you no, not someone else-YOU, about the growth of the church?

Enthusiasm means, “intense or eager interest; zeal; fervor.” It sometimes appears as if this is one of the greatest failing of the people of God. Too many, including preachers, have the attitude of doing as little as possible or just enough to “get by.”

However, fervency and zeal are the elements of growth and warmth in any combined effort. They are especially essential in the Lord’s work. The church is to be made up of those who ought to be “zealous of good works” (Titus 2:14). Words like fervent, zeal and excited should describe our lives in the service to our Lord.

Fervent in Love

Peter wrote, “Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto the unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently.” (1 Peter 1:22) “And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves for charity shall cover the multitude of sins.” (1 Peter 4:8) Fervent love “covers” the flaws and imperfections in the lives of others. Fervent love does not unmercifully expose a flaw in another. Fault finders are not fervent lovers.

Albert Barnes on this verse: “True love to another makes us kind to his imperfections, charitable toward his faults, and often blind even to the existence of faults.” Nothing can cover sins in the sense of forgiveness but compliance with God’s law, but we may cover one

another’s faults by dealing with one another in such a way as to lead one to comply with God’s law.”

Fervent in Spirit.

The apostle Paul wrote, “Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord” (Romans 12:11). “Spirit” in this verse is the human spirit in each of us. We are to be deeply excited about our responsibilities, It is our duty to do what has been commanded by the Lord (Luke 17:10). The commands of the Lord are not “greivous” (1 John 5:3).

The church can and will grow in proportion to the love and spirit with which we go about fulfilling our individual duties as Christians. Thus we can ask ourselves if we are as fervent and zealous about our personal work on non-Christians as we should be.

What about our fervency and zeal in visiting the sick and needy? How fervent in spirit are we in giving of our means to do the Lord’s work? How fervent and zealous is our attendance and many, many more questions.

An English writer, Joseph Addison, once wrote “There is no greater sign of a general decay of virtue in a nation, than a want of zeal in its inhabitants for the good of their country.” Modifying that statement without altering the thought, “There is no greater sign of a general decay of virtue in the church than a want of zeal in its members for the good of the church.”

Expendable

During World War II, when British troops were facing Dunkirk; when our boys were pushed from Bataan; someone applied the term “expendable” to forces left to cover the withdrawal. They were considered certainly lost-- given to the enemy—their death or capture, the price paid for what was hoped to be some greater gain. There were examples of men accepting, even choosing this role, because they too believed in the greater end. One must believe in and greatly love his country to freely make such a sacrifice.

How many soldiers of the Cross are willing to consider themselves (their pride, their comforts, not to mention their life) expendable in order that the greater purpose of His kingdom might be achieved?

Do we dare consider that “giving ourselves” to Christ means just this? The Apostle Paul could ask others to pray that Christ be magnified, whether by his life or his death. (Philippians 1:19-f.) He considered himself expendable. He had long ago “died with Christ” (Romans 6:6-11), so that his own life, his earthly desires and appetites, were “hid with Christ in God,” (Colossians 3:2-3). The greater end, service to his Master and the eternal reward, so dominated his thinking that no demands were too great. He was not his own (1Corinthians 6:19; 7:22-23), but was, and urged others to be “a living sacrifice.” (Romans 12:1-f.)

Had you rather suffer wrong than see Christ’s cause suffer? Will you swallow your pride rather than see the greater work damaged? That's what it takes when one is expendable. But this is no easy role to accept. We find ourselves reasoning that others get by without making the sacrifice-- why me? “If any provide not for his own--” is always good for rejecting the financial pinch; and we “live to fight tomorrow” in the more important battles-- which somehow never come.

To us “expendable” says “worthless” but to Christ it was the way to find one’s life, (Matthew 10:39). He “died for the people, that the whole nation perish not.” (John 11:50-51; 12:32).

Full service to Christ begins the day we see ourselves as “expendable.”
