Do We Really Believe We Are Forgiven?

The Bible is full of passages that tell us that we can be forgiven by God as well as how. For the Christian the action is simple; namely, repent of your sin and pray to God asking Him to forgive you (Acts 8:42). The question to meditate on is, "Do we really believe that we are forgiven?"

The obvious answer would be resounding, "Yes!" The confidence level is very high that God has forgiven us when we are willing to follow His commands. But do our actions convey to the world what our mouth says and our hearts feel? Do we really believe it?

If we ask the question, "How could God ever forgive me?" Do we really believe He has forgiven us? Inherent in this question is some degree of doubt. If we really believe, then why would we have any doubt?

If we really believe that God has forgiven us, then why are we unwilling to forgive ourselves? We should be as forgiving of ourselves as God is willing to forgive us. We need to have the confidence in God that He has "really forgiven us" and dismiss the action from our mind and thinking. We should not be constantly rehearsing the event in our mind.

If we really believe that God has forgiven us, then there is no need for us to tell other people of our sins, especially those that happened years and decades ago. If is readily understood that we must confess our sins to one another, for that is what the Bible teaches. But five, ten, twenty or more years later and we are still telling everyone about it? The question is, why? Why be rehearsing something that far back?

If we really believe that God has forgiven us, then we need to "move on." We need to forget about the event and act as if it never happened. It is understood that some sins have consequences which never can be forgotten. For example, the conception of a child by a couple who are not married to each other is a constant reminder of their sin, but do they have to focus on the sin? A person may have been killed or seriously

injured in an automobile accident because a driver had just enough to drink so that it impaired their thinking. Does the driver need to focus on the sin or the fact that they have been forgiven?

When we have been forgiven by God we need to understand that we have been restored to the relationship we had with God before we committed the sin. We are as "clean" after being forgiven as we were before we committed the transgression of God's law which brought "blood" upon our heads. We need to feel that He is not holding that sin against us any longer and that we are back in His "good graces."

When we really believe that God has forgiven us, it should bring happiness to us. Our hearts should be rejoicing because we have been forgiven. A tremendous relief should be felt because we are no longer "in debt" to God for our sinful actions.

The very thought that the Creator of the world is willing to forgive us is nearly overwhelming and truly amazing. If we truly believe that we have been forgiven by God, then our lives should be much happier and less stressful. Do you really believe that God has forgiven you? If you do not, then I hope that one day you will. If you do, then your actions will help others to believe.

Paul prayed that all would grasp "the exceeding greatness of His (God's) power toward us who believe, according to the working of His mighty power which He worked in Christ when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality and power and might and dominion, and every name that is named" (Ephesians 1:19-20).

Christ's triumph over death has cosmic implications. According to the text there is nothing which Christ is not now over. This means His dominion includes all beings spiritual and physical, good and evil.

This is good news. Christians are not at the mercy of Satan or evil men, but guarded by God who works all things according to the counsel of His will (Ephesians 1:11). In this capacity as Head over all, Christ leads His servants to victory over the world. Now thanks be to God who always leads us in triumph in Christ, (2 Corinthians 2:14). We are now more than conquerors through Christ and should live with the expectation that our Lord will crush Satan under our feet (Romans 16:20), that His kingdom will outlast and crush all the kingdoms of men (Daniel 2:44), and that when all other enemies are subdued death itself will be destroyed (1 Corinthians 15:26).

In the meantime, we are soldiers of the Cross. We make known the Christ as the true and living way for all men to be reconciled to God. We use the sword of the spirit to pierce the hearts, souls and minds of men until they love him with their hearts, souls and minds. We suffer the world's hatred and endure bitter persecutions. Nevertheless, our triumph over the world is secured by faith in Jesus (1 John 5:4-5). Which brings me to the point.

Christians today are largely characterized by an inferiority complex. We cower before the world like beggars. We mimic the world to appease it. We absorb its culture rather than transform it. We clamor for its approval and long for its acceptance. We try to be "relevant" to the world till any distinction between us and the world is imperceptible. We assume that the world is the center of all things, while viewing Christ and the

church as marginal characters in the great play of life.

This is faithless disobedience. Repentance requires that we assume the biblical truth of the centrality of Christ. Only by getting the fact right, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth," will we get our act right, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations."
