...But He Never Enlisted

He served in the Army but... "he isn't a soldier." We believe there is a lesson in the following Associated Press Report:

"An Army spokesperson said Friday that 15 year old Walter Lee Martin is not recognized as a soldier - despite two periods of serving in Vietnam, because he did not enlist, was not drafted and did not enter the Army through any regular means.

"He was not officially in, did not officially enlist or enter through any normal means," Barrante said. "He was, in fact, not a soldier. He isn't a soldier."

Two periods of service in Vietnam, twice wounded in action; yet no purple hearts, no honorable discharge, no veteran's benefits; he did not legally enlist.

This reminds us of a host of men and women whom we have observed serving among the soldiers in the army of the Lord. They serve faithfully and even sacrificially. They reject the sins of the flesh and live a pure life. They attend services regularly, give liberally of their money, are ready unto every good work. They often study the Scriptures, defend the truth and attack error. Often they are outstanding in their performance as soldiers, except that they have never enlisted.

The "Captain of our salvation" knew in advance there would be such individuals. He warned in advance of the fate they may expect – "Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:22-23). What a pity to spend a lifetime enduring "hardships as a good soldier" only to miss the veteran's benefits because of a failure to enlist.

There was no way that the young man described above could have legally enlisted, he was ineligible. but anyone who is a sinner can enlist in the army of the Lord if he is willing to leave his sins. The conditions are simple: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

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Bitterness

We are commanded to put away bitterness (Ephesians 4:31). To be bitter is to be "sharp and resentful" in our outlook in life. When applied to our relationships, it means to be "intensely unfriendly" and unkind. A bitter person is someone filled with anger toward others, blaming them for their problems, and is overcome with fault-finding and resentment. It happens especially among Christians who quit in their relationship with God and look for excuses to justify their sin. More often than not, they turn to their relationship with the people at church and take their frustrations out on them. "They never call or visit me, and could care less that I am suffering. I will never step foot in that building again!" is what they tell their family and friends. But, in reality, they have reached this level of bitterness because they have failed in their relationship with God and are wanting to blame others for their condition. They have become "headstrong, haughty, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God" (2 Timothy 3:4), but are too bitter to admit it. From their perspective, they are the victims and those still going to church and keeping God first are the enemy. They do not see their sin because of the cloud of darkness that has over taken them. By emphasizing the world over godliness, they have lost their righteous judgment and have unwittingly fulfilled the very thing God warns against: "looking carefully least anyone falls short of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up cause trouble, and by this many become defiled" (Hebrews 12:15).

By contrast, there are Christians facing the same

problems in life who manage to keep their faith with an optimistic spirit. They too have health problems that limit them from day to day and that keep them from attending all of the services, but when they are able they are back at church or listening to the radio program because they see the value of worship. Some will even use a cane, wheelchair, or scooter to get there. Others also have financial and family problems like the saints overcome with bitterness, except they have chosen to trust God's word when it says to "count it all joy when you fall into various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience" (James 1:2-3). They could take the path of resentment and blame, but they see no value in being a defeatist. And whether these saints realize it or not, by keeping their faith they are preaching to the world that bitterness can be avoided. By adding to their faith virtue, and to virtue knowledge, and to knowledge the rest of the spiritual attributes of a growing faith (2 Peter 1:5-8), these saints are being diligent to make their "call and election sure" (v.10), while letting their light shine. They don't know what specific obstacles still await them; they just know they will give their all to stay near to God because "all things work together for good to those who love God" (Romans 8:28). Bitterness is not an option for them.

Life is such a beautiful gift that God loans us for only a moment. He never intended for it to be our final rest, but to only serve as a door to even greater joy. Bitterness blinds us to these truths and keeps us from walking through that door. We must get rid of it to find eternal life with God.

When we come to this place, we can know based upon "the wisdom that descends from above [which] is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and full of good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy" (James 3:17-18).
