What God Thinks Of The Church Of Christ

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He thinks of saved individuals (Acts 20:28). When men think of the church of Christ they think of parties, either a broad conglomeration of alliances such as the "one cup Church of Christ," "liberal Church of Christ," "conservative Church of Christ," etc., or one these parties individually.

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He thinks of a number of individuals unknown to men (2 Timothy 2:19). When men think of the Church of Christ, they think of a loose association of local churches whose numbers can be approximated, for example 1,260,838 in the United States according to Mac Lynn's 1994 directory. Perhaps they will focus more on the numbers given for a more narrow association of churches, "non-institutional," "one cup," "no class," etc., or one of these parties individually.

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He sees an individual body composed of individuals with different levels of spiritual growth (1 Corinthians 1:13; 2 Peter 3:18; Revelation 2, 3). When men think of the Church of Christ, they think of a group of local churches that has divided through the years over issues such as instrumental music, premillennialism and institutionalism. They say that the "next thing that will divide the church" (the conservative alliance, or a collection of churches) will be on the marriage, divorce and remarriage issue.

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He thinks of those growing in Him with obedient hearts in spite of imperfection (John 17:6). When men think of the Church of Christ, they think of those who conform to unwritten creeds, composed of doctrines the "leaders" have declared to be essential.

When God thinks of the Savior of the Church, He thinks only of His Son, Jesus Christ. When men think of the Church of Christ, they think of an alliance of local churches that David Lipscomb "saved" from the Missionary Society, Foy Wallace "saved from premillennialism" and other "leaders" have saved from other dangers. When God thinks of where to find the church of Christ, He thinks of the hearts of men (1 Samuel 16:7). When men think of where to find the Church of Christ, they think of church directories.

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He thinks of those who have responded to the spiritual attraction for those who are of good ground – the gospel of Jesus Christ (Romans 1:16; 1 Corinthians 2:2). When men think of the Church of Christ, they think of an alliance or movement that itself is the primary attraction to those who are of good ground.

When God thinks of the church of Christ, He thinks of a glorious body of saved individuals who are allowing themselves to be transformed into the image of His Son, in spite of the wrangling and political maneuvering of men (Ephesians 5:25, 26; 2 Corinthians 3:18). When men think of the Church of Christ, they either think o a religious movement that has fragmented itself into dozens of warring factions, each claiming to "have" the truth on dozens of difficult issues, or they think of one of those factions.

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My Church

There is no subject taught in Scripture upon which "believers" are united. I have placed quotation marks around the word believers to indicate I am using the word in a special way. I use it to include everyone who "believes" the Bible. There is not even unanimity among "believers" about the inspiration and authority of Scripture.

This lack of unanimity is neither surprising nor discouraging. There was a variety of reactions to the person and work of Jesus. Some were devoted followers (Mark 1:16-20) while others sought to kill Him (Mark 14:1-2). I expect many were between these two extremes. Jesus provoked many responses, but this did not stop Him from teaching truth.

Toward the completion of His earthly work, He briefly mentions His church (Matthew 16:18, 18:17). He introduces a new word to describe a new relationship. His usual designation is "kingdom" or "kingdom of heaven (God)" (Matthew 16:19).

Jesus uses this word in two senses, primary and secondary. When He promises to build His church (Matthew 16:18), He speaks about the universal community of saved believers. Later references suggest this relationship transcends time; all those saved by Jesus throughout all time (Hebrews 12:23) are included. There was no power, even that of the Hadean world, which would be able to stop the plan Jesus had set in motion.

This universal community of saved people is called "the church, which is His body" (Ephesians 1:22-23). Men and women responding by faith, are "baptized into Christ: (Galatians 3:27). It is evident from these verses that obedient believers become a part of the body of Christ upon baptism. They are saved by the blood of Christ (Ephesians 1:7), and consequently are added to His body. This is a community (body) of saved people. They are not added to His body, then saved; but they are saved, then added. Scripture does not suggest any other way to enter this relationship of the saved and Christ.

The secondary use of the word church is congregational. This relationship is smaller than the universal body of the saved. Jesus implies this in Matthew 18:17, "tell it to the church." It is physically impossible to do this in the primary usage of the word church. No one can gather it and no one can speak for it. Thus Jesus recognized and approved of the congregational aspect of the word. The epistles frequently use the word in this way (Colossians 4:16). Christians can enter this relationship by "trying to associate with the disciples" (Acts 9:26). This local community does not contain all Christians (Colossians 4:16), but only some of them. The association is controlled by men (Acts 9:26-28), and thus is subject to error and mistake (3 John 9-10). Sometimes those who are included should be excluded (1 Corinthians 5:13), and some are excluded who should be included (3 John 10). This relationship is not entered by baptism, but upon the request of one already baptized and the acceptance of the congregation (Acts 9:26-28).

Realizing the primary and secondary uses of the word church in the New Testament will help us avoid a sectarian concept. Carefully examining the context will assist us in making a distinction between the worldwide (universal) and congregational (local) use of this word.

Many people have not learned to make such a distinction. Multitudes believe the universal church is made up of man-made denominations of all kinds. The language of many "believers" reflects this basic misunderstanding. The universal body of Jesus is not made up of churches (denominations), it is made up of people. Sometimes confusion occurs even among Christians. Some believe the universal church is made up of congregations; the same mistake our denominational friends make, only in a different sense. The universal body of Christ is composed of saints and Christ. Our speech and practice should illustrate this distinction.

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Hebrews 11

Hebrews is written to Jewish Christians whose faith in Jesus is wavering. They are about to apostatize (Hebrews 3:12; 4:1; 10:23, 35-36). They desperately needed a "faith lift," a Christ-centered "faith to the preserving of the soul" (Hebrews 10:39; 12:2). Hebrews 11 is the uplifting summit of the power of faith in God. Enshrined here is the transcendent power of thrilling, faithful examples who "gained approval" from God (Hebrews 11:2, 39). None of us may be famous before men, but any of us can be famous by faith in God!

Faith Defined:

There are three distinct aspects of wholesome, dynamic faith defined here. "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen... without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (vv.1, 6).
