

Two Misconceptions About God's Mercy

While preaching a sermon on God's grace, my grandfather told this story about driving in Pell City, Alabama.

I stopped at several intersections; but as I approached another intersection, a parked car obscured my view of a stop sign. I ran the stop sign. I explained my failure to the policeman who pulled me over. He told me to go on and didn't write a ticket. Did the law save me? No, grace. But the policeman's grace did not grant me license to run future stop signs, nor to call those who conscientiously stop at stop signs "legalists."

My grandfather's simple story illustrates two dangerous errors regarding God's grace and mercy.

Error #1. Belittling the seriousness of disobedience. Does emphasizing God's grace and mercy give us the authority to imply that obedience is not required? Does it allow us to participate in what we know to be presumptuous and unauthorized? Do we have the right to tell others that they are saved even when they haven't obeyed God's conditions of pardon?

I've taught my two daughters and number of others how to drive. I tell them they must obey traffic laws! I might tell them of occasions of when policemen have been merciful to me as they were to my grandfather, but that should not diminish their effort to obey traffic laws. Our God is great in mercy and that fact about His character should fill us with gratitude. But that shouldn't diminish our desire to carefully follow His word, speak as the oracles of God and avoid going beyond what He has authorized. We strive to do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, even as we thank Him for his mercy. That doesn't make us "legalists," but rather loving and respectful children.

Error #2. Overlooking the fact that God sometimes extends His clemency to those who have grievously erred. We must constantly teach the importance of obedience (John 14:15; 15:14; Romans 1:5; 2 John 1:6) and that punishment is linked with disobedience (Romans 6:23; Mt. 25:46; Galatians 6:7). But we must also preach the texts that show that God often extends His mercy and doesn't give us the punishment that we

deserve! He did not demand that Cain or David die (Genesis 4:15; 2 Samuel 12:13) even though that was what His law prescribed for committing murder (Genesis 9:5-6). He did not punish Jews from the Northern tribes who presumptuously ate of the Passover without going through the required cleansing requirements(2 Chronicles 30:18-19).


- "For as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is His mercy toward those who fear Him" (Psalm 103:11 NKJV).
- "If You, Lord, should mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand?" (Psalm 130:3)
- "Through the Lord's mercies we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not" (Lamentations.3:22)

Some disciples overlook this essential Bible teaching about God's mercy and are always harsh with any who disagree with them, as if there were no such thing as clemency.

We are not that way with our children. We constantly warn them of the dangers of disobedience and that obedience is necessary for all living in our home. However, we are also merciful with them, giving them time to mature. We don't kick them out of the house every time they stumble. Such drastic action is reserved as a last resort for older children who persist in rebellion. Though we are that way with our children, we sometimes have difficulty accepting that our heavenly Father has revealed Himself to be that way in the scriptures. "For judgment is without mercy to the one who has shown no mercy. Mercy triumphs over judgment" (James 2:13).

I'm thankful for my grandfather's simple story, but especially for the truth it illustrates--Deep gratitude for God's mercy and emphasis on its prominence in scripture, though essential for sound teaching, do not give license to belittle the importance of obedience!

In Mustard Seed Mode

Do you ever find yourself thinking, "If only I could have seen Jesus heal the lepers; if only I could have seen the parting of the Red Sea; if only I could have been at the tomb when Lazarus came forth! - What a fully convinced, on-fire-for-the-Lord Christian I would be!" Do we realize in Scripture how seldom God went about His work by means of awe-inspiring miracles? There are only three great epochs of miracles in the entire biblical record: (1) the ongoing saga of deliverance from Egypt to conquering of Canaan; (2) the days of Elijah and Elisha; (3) Jesus and His apostles. The service of the vast majority of God's people has been rendered without being eye-witnesses of His miracles, signs, and wonders. Even in the ministries of Elijah-Elisha and the Apostles, most Israelites and Gentiles were not privileged to see the miracles performed by them. To use a statement from the book of 1 Kings—"the LORD was not in the wind, nor the earthquake, nor the fire."

The text (1 Kings 19:11) says the wind tore into Mount Sinai shattering some of it into pieces. I suspect the same type of power was manifested in the earthquake and the fire. But all three times it says the LORD was not in their awe-inspiring deeds. Rather He was announced by a quiet, low whisper of a voice. I know the Hebrew word can be rendered "sound," but it is the "word of the LORD" that takes center stage.

God works through His word. The power to change the hearts of sinful man is inherent in its seed planted in the mind (cf. James 1:21; 1 Peter 1:23-25). It is the kingdom of God in its mustard-seed mode. God comes in the awe-full-inspiring means of His word for most of His servants. We should be moved by it, as we would be by the effects of wind, earthquake, and fire; but, alas, He knows of what poor stuff we are made. We are more impressed with miracles than with His words. I take it that God restrained Himself in the Elijah incident-for Elijah's sake. If wind can blast mountain to pieces, what would it do to flesh? He whispers faintly (Elijah heard it [v.13]) and Elijah wrapped his face to go meet the LORD. We would do well to mentally prepare ourselves with the background of this text each time we open the Bible and read. If we think miracles are more important than words, we would do well to

remember how many Israelites witnessed the mighty deliverance from Egypt and how few of them entered the promised land!

"Speak LORD, thy servant heareth. Command and I will obey" (1 Samuel 3:9).
