## Do You Have Enough Faith?

"having been buried with him in baptism, wherein ye were also raised with him through faith in the working God, who raised him from the dead" (Colossians 2:12).

Often, in discussions on baptism, the subject of faith seems far removed. Many, in varying religions, have concluded that baptism is unnecessary for man's salvation from sin, that it is far removed from the saving blood of Jesus, from saving faith, and that he who trusts in baptism for salvation is relying "works" instead of "faith."

However, consider carefully the above verse. Paul was an inspired apostle of Christ, who teaches that true baptism is an act of faith "in the working of God" that raised Jesus from the dead. In baptism the sinner responds by faith to be both "buried" and "raised" spiritually with Christ, becoming "united with him in the likeness of his death" and "…also in the likeness of his resurrection" (Romans 6:5). Scripture affirms that it is at the point of baptism, this uniting spiritually in Jesus' death, burial and resurrection, that one enters "in Christ" (Romans 6:3-4; Galatians 3:27). "In Christ" describes the spiritual relationship that they who are saved from their sins have with Jesus. To be "in Christ" portrays the spiritual life wherein "every spiritual blessing" of God's grace for man is found (forgiveness, fellowship, peace, joy, contentment, love, hope, security, strength, etc., Ephesians 1:3). These blessings do not precede baptism but come after it.

Man's opposition to baptism for salvation isn't because the Bible is ambiguous in its teaching on the subject. Scripture is just as clear and understandable on the necessity of baptism as it is on the fact of Jesus' resurrection from the dead! Jesus commanded His disciples to preach to everyone the gospel of faith and baptism for salvation (Mark 16:15-16). Scripture clearly teaches baptism is "unto (for) the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38), that it washes away sins (Acts 22:16), and that it saves sinners (1 Peter 3:21). And frankly, it doesn't matter how many degrees a person has from universities and/or seminaries, if he doesn't accept the clarity of


Bible truth on this subject. Honestly, to miss the truth on baptism, one needs "help" provided by the arrogance in man's unbelief. Worldly wisdom will always count the truth of God as "foolishness" (1 Corinthians 1:18-25), and it will, no doubt, continue to censure the necessity of water baptism for salvation, declaring it as trusting in water instead of God for salvation, or condemning it was "salvation by works" instead of by God's grace. Such attacks, however, does not change what God's word teaches.

From Colossians 2:12, we learn that baptism is a matter of saving faith. Whatever one's view of baptism, it reflects the nature of his faith, or lack of it. It becomes down to whether or not we have enough faith to take God at His Word, to believe God is able/powerful to do what He says He will do, and that God is righteous in His character to make good on His promises to us. What it really comes down to is this: do you have enough faith in God to be baptized into Christ for the forgiveness of your sins?

"And without faith it is impossible to be well-pleasing unto him; for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that he is the rewarder of them that seek after Him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Faith is "a firm persuasion, a conviction based upon hearing" (W.E. Vine). It basically means to trust, and in the New Testament, to trust in God and Jesus Christ. Like Peter, who trusted in the Lord to get out of the boat and walk on water because Jesus told him to (Matthew 14:28-29). And, like Abraham, who in his old age and the barrenness of his wife Sarah, trusted in God's promise that they would have a son (Romans 4:17-21). Faith is not merely a mental consent that God exists, but trusting in what God says. We must believe "God is", but we must "come" and "seek" Him obediently. This is the faith God has always required of man.

# A Christian Prays! Do You?

A Christian prays — and prays — and prays. But many church members scarcely know the meaning of the word once they leave the church building and the stilted "audience conscious" phrases that pass for prayer there. "Pray without ceasing;" (1 Thessalonians 5:17) makes no apparent impression.

It is a tragedy that God is considered so inaccessible. To many He is far away, locked in an inner office; with an alert guard of clergymen, forms and format to protect Him from the "ordinary" caller. The idea is wholly foreign to the truth.

"Enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly" (Matthew 6:6). Thus Jesus describes the close intimate relation that exists between the petitioner and his Creator. This does not negate public prayer (the contrast is with hypocritical show-offs); in fact this touches the vitals of all acceptable prayer. When intimate communion with God is missing, public prayer becomes a farce.

Prayer is a Christian's privilege; made real and earnest — meaningful — because a Christian (and only a Christian) truly appreciates such characteristics of God as the following.

God Is Near! He is "not far from every one of us; for in Him we live, and move, and have our being" (Acts 17:27-28) A Christian lives close to God. His Maker is ever-present, all-about; ready to be contacted upon a moment's notice. This nearness comforts the Christian -- "in the valley of the shadow..thou art with me."

God Cares! The Christian casts all his cares upon God, "for He careth for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Our Father is concerned – His interest is genuine. He who takes note of the sparrow's fall, watched over all His children.

God Hears! His eyes "are over the righteous, and His ears are open to their prayers" (1 Peter 3:12) "All things are naked and opened unto the eyes of Him with whom we have to do" (Hebrews 4:13b) And hearing, He understands our frailties — "the feeling of our infirmities" (Hebrews 4:15-16) so we may come boldly to the throne of grace for mercy.

And God Gives! "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you" (Matthew 7:7-f) **Ask! Seek! Knock!** These are imperatives, in the Greek present tense. They say, "Ask" and keep on asking; "seek" and continue to seek; "knock" again and again. The thought is akin to Matthew 6:33 — "seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

A Christian believes that God is near, that God cares, that God hears, and that God gives. He is conscious of his dependence upon God, and leans upon Him without hesitation. So he prays; when he awakes — as he goes to work — when he partakes of God's rich blessings — when he feels the weight of sorrow and cares — as he lays him down to sleep. A Christian prays; and what about you?
