## Sojourners & Pilgrims

Peter urges saints to regard themselves as sojourners and pilgrims. A sojourner is one who lives among aliens. Pilgrims live in a strange place, away from one's own people. Hostility is injected into this alien, strange place by the phrase, which war against the soul (1 Peter 2:11). He says the present dwelling place of Christians is in a strange, hostile land; a land where danger lurks in the form of fleshly lusts.

I know Americans who live abroad. They are literally sojourners. They are living in a country of which they are not native. The customs there are different from their homeland. Most of them live in relative safety from governmental persecution, but some do not. There is actual danger of deportation or threat of harassment while they live there. A remarkable thing about these people: they volunteered to live in this environment because they believe their being there would be helpful to the cause of Jesus. Living there is generally more rigorous and less comfortable than living in the USA. They have not forgotten their homeland and look forward to the time they can return.

Christians are living in a land which is not theirs and which is inhabited by people and influences which are foreign to them. How easy it is to forget that we are just pilgrims passing through. We are like Abraham who dwelled in tents (only a temporary home) while he traveled in search of the city which hath foundations (Hebrews 11:9-10). He was incessantly looking for this permanent dwelling place.

The world is out to make us citizens. Its efforts, sometimes subtle, sometimes bold, are to make us feel at home here. We need to slip into something more comfortable. Since we are going to be here for a while we ought to at least enjoy being here. Don't be so uptight.

I'm afraid many saints are vulnerable to this persuasive song the world sings. Some have concentrated so hard on the here and now that the there and then have all but been forgotten. We are surrounded with the gadgets of culture which dazzle and amaze our eyes and minds. The

popular media praise modern paganism and denounce Christians with convictions as right-wing fanatics and bigots. Surely we do not want to be either fanatics or bigots. The only way to be relieved of those names is to cease opposition to the world's agenda, be silent and lay down our arms.

Dear brethren, when we become sophisticated and are comfortable in our surroundings, the enemy has won. Our lips will be silenced in opposition to wrong and closed for use to convert others. Our numbers will dwindle, our influence lessen, until we are gone. Vanished! Unless we remain conscious to the designations of sojourners and pilgrims and act consistently with the meaning of those terms.

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## Following The Bible

Our claim to a unique position in the religious world is our determination to follow the Bible. But when this claim is made, the usual response is "All churches follow the Bible." This raises an obvious question: "If all churches follow the Bible, why the variety of doctrines and practices?"

#### **Unacceptable Explanations**

Some say the Bible cannot be understood sufficiently well to allow for unity. This questions God's wisdom, for God intended for us to understand. "Be ye not foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is" (Ephesians 3:17). Was God incapable of providing a book that men could understand?

Others insist that the Bible actually teaches many different things. Denominationalists have been claiming this for years. More recently, we even heard a preacher among churches of Christ say that the Bible can be used to justify different kinds of church government. Sometimes it is said, "You can prove anything by the Bible." This questions God's integrity. It is insulting to say of a man: "You can prove anything by him." How much worse to say this of a book given to us by God! It

contains one consistent message and to make it support contradictory positions requires an abuse of its message.

#### The Real Problem

The problem is not with the Bible, nor with its source. The problem is the varying approaches to following the Bible. Some believe in a careful adherence to what the Bible says. Others believe in a rather casual following "not of the letter, but of the Spirit," as they put it, adopting the words but not the sense of 2 Corinthians 3:6. Stated another way, some construe the Scriptures strictly, believing that we must do in religion only what the Scriptures authorize. Others construe the Scriptures loosely, believing that we may practice anything not plainly forbidden.

These two views formed a clear issue between the two great reformers of Germany and Switzerland, Luther and Zwingli. In A History of the Christian Church, Lars Qualben explains: "One of the great differences between Zwingli and Luther was: Luther used the Bible as corrective, retaining those rites and ceremonies of the Medieval church which were not positively antiscriptural. Hence he retained images, altars, ornaments of the churches, organs, church bells, and the like. Zwingli used the Bible as a code of laws, rejecting everything not expressly enjoined in the Scriptures" (p. 255).

#### Following Recipes and Directions

If a teacher gives a student a recipe for making a cake, what does she expect? If the girl adds ingredients not found in the recipe, will the teacher credit her with following the recipe? Obviously, the student was following the recipe as long as she was using what the recipe required. But when she added other ingredients, she ceased following the recipe and began following her own way.

If a person is given directions for finding a location, what is involved in following those directions? As long as he is making the turns authorized, he is following directions. But when he begins making turns not called for, he has ceased following directions.

Are people actually following the Bible as they follow recipes or directions? The majority of ingredients in modern religion are nowhere authorized in Scripture. They are the products of human wisdom. And it is these additional ingredients, these unauthorized changes of directions that account for the differences that exist in religion.

## The Successful Man

Being a success is the "American dream." We instill in our young men that they must prepare themselves to "climb the ladder" and make their fortunes. The accumulation of prestige and material goods is a goal to which all must strive. Because of such materialistic concepts that we instill in our youth, many have become failures even though they may have attained position and wealth. We have our false concepts about what success is, but no man is a success until he can attain what God wants him to be. Because so many have not reached this goal, they are failures. Most of the success stories we point our youth to show them how to make a million dollars but don't teach them how to live. Can we truthfully say that Howard Hughes was a success? He amassed fortunes but died a miserable and lonely man.

Study some of the success stories of the Bible. In Luke 12 we read of the successful farmer who had to erect more barns to store his goods, he had security for years to come. But he dies that night and had not one thing to carry into eternity. The rich man in Luke 16 fared sumptuously with purple and fine linen. But in death he lifted up his eyes from torment and would have given all earthly goods for relief. The poor beggar, the failure, rested in Abraham's bosom. Which of the two would you rather have been?

And then there is the rich man who ran to Jesus asking what he might do to have eternal life. He was told to "keep the commandments," to which he replied, "This I have done, what lack I yet?" The answer came, "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give it to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow me. "When the young man heard it he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions. Was not this man a success by man's standards? He was a rich ruler. How many mothers pointed to him as a standard for their sons? How many young women would have loved to have him for their husband? Yet from heaven's view he was a failure because he did not have treasures in heaven.

The book of Ecclesiastes destroys the concept that in earthly attainment there is success. Whatever man accomplishes for this world he can only use for a moment, and only a day at a time. Death takes us all and we leave it behind, if we do not lose it before we go. "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man." This is all that counts, all that man can use after he leaves this life. "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"

Parents: you do your children a great injustice by filling their heads with false concepts of success. So many have sent unprepared young people to state schools because they wanted them to be a "success." They were taught how to attain but lost their souls as their weak faith was destroyed by skeptics. We put more worth on worldly attainments than on eternal security.
