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My Body Is My God's Temple

"My body is mine, and I'll do with it as I please!" So goes the argument we often hear from feminist who believe that abortion-on-demand should be every woman's rightful option. "I don't care what anyone else thinks about the clothing I put on my body, it's my business to dress how I please!" That's another wrong conclusion from an independent spirit who believes that God surely doesn't care about such trivial matters. "Recreational drug use is a matter of personal choice. It's up to me what I put into my body." In response to such outlandish statements, we would encourage a careful study and consideration of 1 Corinthians 6:19-20.

Paul's entire message in 1 Corinthians 6 was designed to cause believers to understand that their lives are radically different, now that they belong to Christ. For example, he chastises them for suing fellow believers at law, vv. 1-8. Ordinarily disputes and legal controversies would be appropriately settled in the Gentile courts. Even Christians might occasionally find themselves hauled into worldly courts by an unbeliever. But among the saints, disagreements should not be settled before the unbelievers. Furthering his theme, Paul next enjoined caution upon Corinthians. Christians concerning their personal appetites and behaviors. Reminding them that they had been cleansed, sanctified, and justified by the Spirit of God (v.11) he taught them that several sins directly involving the body should now be scrupulously avoided. Fornication, adultery, homosexual acts, sodomy and drunkenness were specifically labeled as "bodily" sins which bar the sinner from the inheritance God wants to give His children, vv.9-10. Saved people are careful with their bodies. Although not inherently sinful, the body faces its own peculiar temptations, which if indulged, defile the spirit residing within the flesh. Verse 18 commands, "Flee sexual immorality." Every sin that a man does is outside the body, but he who commits sexual immorality sins against his own body."

But why is sexual immorality (and other sins of the flesh) described as a "sin against the body?" This is answered in verses 19 and 20. Paul wrote, "Or do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your

own? For you were bought at a price; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God"s." That is a statement of important principle. It speaks directly to what happens to sinners redeemed (bought back, repurchased) by the blood of Christ. Corinthians saints had been washed, sanctified and justified by the Spirit of God (v.11). Now, Paul says, their very bodies are considered to be habitations of the Holy Spirit (v.19). It is as if the Holy Spirit of God had purchased a decrepit, dirty, disheveled old house that He intended to become His residence after a thorough remodel and "sprucing up." Now, we must not be alarmed or frightened by this language. Christians need to accept the fact that the Holy Spirit indwells them. We need not allow modern-day charismatic false teaching to rob us of this eminently scriptural language! A Charismatic believes that the Holy Spirit dwells personally in our bodies, leading us to think, feel and act apart from our own will by the nudging of the Holy Spirit. Some sincere brethren, who are not charismatic, also believe in a personal indwelling of the Holy Spirit, but they do not believe that He leads us apart from the teaching of the Word. This writer is content to let Scripture interpret Scripture in this matter. The question, "How does the Holy Spirit (the third person of the Godhead) indwell us?" is answered in my mind by Paul's statement in Ephesians 3:17. There, Jesus Christ (the second person of the Godhead) is said to "dwell in your hearts through faith." To me, Ephesians 3:17 seems to explain the process of indwelling mentioned in I Corinthians 6:19.

Because the Holy Spirit, through our faith and obedience to God's Word, has made our bodies His "temple," we must be careful what we do with our bodies. The White House in Washington, D.C. is the dwelling of the President of the United States. Great care is taken to preserve, protect, maintain, and glorify this house because of who lives there. Christians were "bought with a price" i.e., the precious blood of Jesus Christ. Because of our expensive purchase price and the Spirit who is the "guarantee of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession" (Ephesians 1:14) we must be careful with both body and spirit. Scripture teaches that both are "the Lord's" (1 Corinthians 6:20) and that we must therefore "glorify God" with our entire being, which includes the tabernacle of flesh called "the body."

It matters to God if we abuse the body, since the Spirit is in residence. It matters to God if we carelessly and immodestly adorn the body, because this sends the wrong message about who lives within. Every Christian needs to give these truths careful, prayerful consideration.

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Covering Sin

The Bible says, "He who covers his sins will not prosper, but whoever confesses and forsakes them will have mercy" (Proverbs 28:13). Elsewhere it adds, "Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven, and whose sins are covered" (Romans 4:7). Evidently, there is a right way and a wrong way to cover sin.

The wrong way to cover sin is to remain in it while trying to conceal it from others. Jesus rebuked this attitude when He told the Pharisees, "Even so you also outwardly appear righteous to men, but inwardly you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness" (Matthew 23:28). We can expect the same verdict whenever we live in sin and try to appear godly at the same time. Eventually, our need to be approved of men will outweigh our need for God's approval, and we will concoct ways to keep our sins hidden from others. This never works. Sooner or later, our sins will be exposed and our hypocrisy will become evident. Nobody can keep their sin hidden indefinitely, nor will it go away with time, by moving away, or by doing additional good works. The only way to respond to sin is to humbly confess and forsake it. To stubbornly continue in it, convincing ourselves that we will never get caught, is the path that leads to misery and shame. Pride always leads to a fall - without fail. And ultimately, "God will bring every work into judgment, including every secret thing, whether good or evil" (Ecclesiastes 12:14). There will be no secret sins on Judgment Day. Whatever we hid from men will eventually be exposed by God, who will condemn us for our deceit and pride. It will be as Paul foretold, "Some men's sins are clearly evident, preceding them to judgment, but those of some men follow later" (1 Timothy 5:24). No one can keep their un-repented sins hidden forever.

The only way to rightfully cover sin is to be forgiven of it by God. This is what Paul meant when he said, "Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven, and whose sins are covered." The person doing the covering in these instances is God, because His righteous requirements for forgiveness have been met. For a non-Christian, this requires obedience to the gospel, which is God's power to save men from sin (Romans 1:16; Acts 2:38). For a Christian, it means to "Repent therefore of this your wickedness, and pray God if perhaps the thought of your heart may be forgiven you" (Acts 8:22). God also expects the Christian to confess his sin in prayer (1 John1:9) and before those who are aware of it (James 5:16). God will not show mercy to the person who tries to cover his sin in any other way.

Once a person's sins have been forgiven by God, we are to cover them as well by no longer holding them against that person. For, "He who covers a transgression seeks love, but he who repeats a matter separates friends" (Proverbs 17:9). We do this because of our love for their soul, our desire to help them rise above their mistakes, and because of the mercy God has shown us (cf., Ephesians 4:32). If we refuse to forgive that person and continually refer to them as sinners (to harm and shame them), we can know that "neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Matthew 6:15). We must willingly cover another's (forgiven) sin before God will cover ours.

Parents, if you are not bringing your children to the services of the church; if you are not teaching them God's word; if you are not instilling in their hearts faith in God and submission to His will, you are failing as parents, no matter what you may be giving your children materially.

Note: The mention of a "typewriter" illustrates the obvious age of this article. Rather than a typewriter, a child today might expect a computer with internet access, though having unsupervised access to one is far more dangerous spiritually.
