Doing Things Exactly Right

The scene is the small village of Kiriath Jearim about 8.5 miles west of Jerusalem. It is the time of David (1Chronicles 13:1-10). The ark of the covenant was taken by the Philistines more than 50 years earlier but they didn't keep it long. God's severe judgment upon them led them to send the ark back to Israel where it ended up in the house of Abinadab. David determined to transport the ark to Jerusalem. It was a time of great celebration. He placed the ark upon Abinadab's new cart, driven by Uzza and Ahio but something went terribly wrong. The oxen upset the cart and the ark was about to fall when Uzza stretched out his hand to steady it. In His burning anger, God struck Uzza "because he put out his hand to the ark; and he died before the Lord" (1 Chronicles 13:10).

Why was God angry with Uzza? Why did he die? Because Uzza (and David) ignored clear instruction from God relative to transporting the ark (cf. Exodus 25:9, 12-15; Numbers 4:5,15). Aaron and his sons were to cover the ark and the sons of Kohath carry it. Specific warning was given: If you touch the holy objects, you will die! Uzza did. God is serious about men listening to His word and carrying out His instructions. We can never be too impressed with the need to do things exactly right.

What God Has Always Wanted

God has always wanted men to obey His will exactly and completely. He instructed Noah to build the ark of gopher wood, 300 cubits long, 50 cubits wide, and 30 cubits high. It was to have a window, a door, and three levels within. "Thus Noah did; according to all that God commanded him, so he did" (Genesis 6:22). Noah built the ark exactly as God instructed him. By doing so, he saved his house (Hebrews 11:7).

Moses told Israel, "You shall not add to the word which I am commanding you, nor take from it, that you may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you" (Deuteronomy 4:2). The Lord said to Joshua, "be careful to do according to all the law which Moses My servant commanded you; do not turn from it to the right or

to the left..." (Joshua 1:7). Man has never been left to his own devices, to find his own way, or to serve God on his own terms (Jeremiah 10:23; Proverbs 14:12). God has spoken! And when He speaks, we need to listen and heed!

God will not tolerate additions to His word. "Anyone who goes too far and does not abide in the teaching of Christ, does not have God; the one who abides in the teaching, he has both the Father and the Son" (2 John 9).

God wants us to do all that He asks. King Saul made the mistake of sparing Agag, the Amalekite king, after God instructed him, "...go and strike Amalek and utterly destroy all that he has, and do not spare him..." (1 Samuel 15:3). Samuel's commentary on Saul's actions was clear, "Has the Lord as much delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, And to heed than the fat of rams" (1 Samuel 15:22). Because of his disobedience, Saul lost his kingdom (1 Samuel 15:22).

God does not give us the prerogative to substitute what we want for what He says. The sons of Aaron, Nadab and Abihu, "offered strange fire before the Lord, which He had not commanded them" (Leviticus 10:1-2) and perished for their disobedience.

Where Do We Apply These Lessons?

We can require neither more nor less in the plan of salvation than what God requires. The Bible teaches that the alien sinner must believe (Mark 16:16; Acts 16:31), repent of his sins (Acts 2:38; 17:30), confess Jesus to be God's Son (Romans 10:9,10; Acts 8:36-37), and be baptized for the remission of his sins (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 22:16). I cannot assure folks they can be saved by doing anything less. I cannot tell people that they are forgiven at the point of faith. Faith is not all that God requires. Neither can I choose to add to God's conditions of pardon.

We should neither preach or practice more nor less concerning the worship of the church than what God sets forth. In the New Testament, when God's people assembled to worship on the first day of the week they partook of the Lord's Supper (Acts 20:7), there was preaching (Acts 20:7), prayer (Acts 2:42), singing (1 Corinthians 14:15; Colossians 3:16; Ephesian 5:19), and they gave to support the church's work (1 Corinthians 16:1-2). We dare not do less (omit prayer?). We cannot do more (add instrumental music?). We must obey God exactly.

We should preach or practice neither more nor less concerning the work of the church than what God sets forth (evangelism, edification, benevolence). Dare we omit the work of evangelism (hmm!)? There is a growing need for benevolence in our country and across the world, dare we say "no?" Should we burden the church with other work (recreation, entertainment, etc.) while these needs go unmet?

As with David and Uzza, we have clear instruction from God which will "equip us for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). We would be well advised to heed it.

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Self-Justification

The New Testament is constantly up to date. It has proven time and again that the nature and attitudes of mankind simply have not changed. Consider the account of Luke 10:25-29. A lawyer asked the question, "Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus turned the question back to the man so that the lawyer might be "enlightened." When the lawyer said that the man should love God and his neighbor, the Lord answered him, "This do and you shall live." The insincerity of the man's question was revealed in the following verse: "But he, wishing to justify himself, said unto Jesus, and who is my neighbor?"

This incident vividly portrays the attitude of so many in regard to divine instruction. Let a man be faced with duties and responsibilities imposed on him by God and excuses and attempts at self-justification often abound. We must understand that "seeking to justify himself" is merely a polite way of expressing one's self-condemnation.

If we would devote as much thought toward spiritual service as we devote to self-justification and the manufacturing of excuses, our potential would be limitless. Yet, rather than recognizing the task before us and getting about the business of accomplishing it, we

vainly try to make allowances for our deficit thinking and performance. Often, one spends more time in the attempt to justify himself for failure to perform a task than would have been required to do it, and do it well.

In the religious realm, man often attempts to justify himself for not having obeyed the Lord by pointing an accusing finger at the supposed "hypocrisy" of some who are members. Others point to the lack of spirituality of their father or mother, grandparents, (or anyone else in their genealogy who will suit the purpose) and excuse their own rebellion because of the "profound" influence these had upon him. However, when you tear away the sham and pretense, the reason for their disobedience is obvious: They simply do not want to obey, yet they do desire to absolve the guilt of their conscience "wishing to justify" a lust for prominence, power, and praise, a man may speak of his profound intellect and broad experience. Oh, he may never do so in boisterous terms or ambitious claims. Instead, the words are subtle and with an air of seeming embarrassment. The naive are deceived. God Almighty and the spiritually mature have seen this ploy before and are not impressed. The thirst to dominate is a very repulsive thing. Its fruit is dissension. Its end is disappointment, both for the protagonist who must live with his unrequited and ungodly lust, and his followers who inevitably become disillusioned with the unceasing tension and turmoil.

"Wishing to justify himself," a man may claim that he would love to aid the work but is just "too busy" to accept any further responsibility. Yes, he is too busy if that is the case. I realize we have a host of secular obligations which must be fulfilled. Yet, if our priorities are not properly aligned, if Christ has been relegated to the back seat of our lives, and if our influence for good is destroyed by materialistic ambition, then we must suffer spiritually as does the church of which we are members.

A family "wishing to justify" themselves explained to me that they just can't attend services, for their children don't seem to be interested in religion. What is the source of this disinterest? Does it not spring from a lethargic, indifferent, and callous attitude observed in their parents? Let's be consistent in the matter. A child in the second grade comes home from school and announces he is no longer interested in education. Will the parents take this in stride, announce this as fine, and that the entire family will now follow a course of

secular ignorance? Spare me, please.

A careful analysis discloses that one of the fundamental differences between the sincere child of God and the hypocrite is the attitude manifested toward faults and shortcomings. The hypocrite is always ready with an excuse in an attempt to "justify himself," failing to realize that rationalization will never obtain justification. The Christian, on the other hand, recognizes his fault, confesses, seeks forgiveness, and makes a change in his life.
