Too Little Too Late

Why is it we get interested in the right things when it's just too late?

A young couple marries, but they take one another for granted. He abuses his position as husband, and she resists everything he says or does. Years pass with such neglect, abuse, and mistreatment. They end up in a divorce court. In the process of working out a settlement, the husband decides he wishes to repent and reconcile with his wife. Why now? Where was this penitent disposition when it would have saved the marriage? She may resist his offer, deciding that it's no use trying anymore. For her, it's a case of "too little, too late."

A foolish and immature son becomes estranged from his parents. He never calls, never visits, never shares his life with them. The parents agonize, but there is little they can do to have a relationship with a child who wants nothing to do with them. Years pass. Age takes its toll on the parents. One day the son receives a call. His mother is dead. He attends the funeral, weeps loudly and uncontrollably – but for what? The opportunity to love his mother and develop a relationship with her is gone forever. He may now see his immaturity, his selfishness, his ungodly character. He may repent and do better in the future, even caring for his widowed and aged father. But as far as his mother is concerned, it's "too little, too late."

A man lives an immoral and profligate life. He has no time for spiritual things, and has never made preparation for eternity. God is in none of his thoughts. He disdains the "holy Joes" that do their best to serve God. The Day of Judgment comes, and he knows it is "too late." He never prepared himself to meet God. Now he confesses Christ (as all will do, Philippians 2:11) but it is too late. Why didn't he do it in life when he had time and opportunity? He now receives the consequences of choices he made, and his penitent spirit is just a little bit "too little, too late."

Perhaps some personal offense was never corrected and the person to whom you needed to apologize has since died. It's too late to right a past wrong under such circumstances, but does it have to be a "forever failure"? No! Pray to God for His forgiveness, and make whatever restitution you can for the wrong you committed. As long as the world stands and life is in your body, it is never too late to do the right thing, whether that is little or much.

As a youth, serious mistakes may have been made and sins committed which have followed you into adulthood. Don't let the past keep you from repentance immediately. God will accept you, even now. "Today" is the day of salvation (Hebrew 3:15). Let's use it before it is "too little, too late."

A Nation of Reform

Josiah became a king when he was just 8 years old, a seeker of God at 16, one who purged Idolatry at 20, and a humble servant of God at age 26. His great spiritual growth and leadership resulted from listening to God's Word and obeying what he heard.

While the temple in Jerusalem was being repaired and purified, the Book of the Law was found and read aloud to young King Josiah. It had been lost! When he heard it, he humbled himself, tore his robes, and wept in the presence of God (2 Chronicles 34:19, 27).

vs19 - "Thus it happened, when the king heard the words of the Law, that he tore his clothes."

vs27 - "because your heart was tender, and you humbled yourself before God when you heard His words against this place and against its inhabitants, and you humbled yourself before Me, and you tore your clothes and wept before Me, I also have heard you," says the Lord."

Josiah realized the great sin of those who had ruled the nation before him. He decided if there would be lasting change, it had to begin with him. This renewal of the covenant and His commitment to follow the Lord and keep His commands ignited an entire nation to serve God and not turn from Him (vss. 31-33). "The king stood by his pillar and renewed the covenant in the presence of the Lord - to follow the Lord and keep his commands, regulations and decrees with all his heart and all his soul, and to obey the words of the covenant written in this book. Then he had everyone in Jerusalem and Benjamin pledge themselves to it; the people of Jerusalem did this in accordance with the covenant of God, the God of their fathers. Josiah removed all the detestable idols from all the territory belonging to the Israelites, and he had all who were present in Israel serve the Lord their God. As long as he lived, they did not fail to follow the Lord, the God of their fathers."

I know there is a lot wrong with our nation today. Greed? Violence? Corruption? Indifference toward God? How long has it been sinking into moral and spiritual decay? Although we would love to see our leaders do something similar as Josiah, we can still do our part to change what is within our capabilities. We do not need to feel too young, too old, or too powerless to serve God with all our strength. If there are to be changes made, it will begin with us.

Josiah - a seeker of God, reformer, God's servant, a king in his 20's who wept for his people - has shown us a powerful example.
