## Living Life at the Highest Level

"We are born crying, live complaining and die disappointed," wrote Thomas Fuller in 1732. The writer, O'Henry penned, "Life is made up of sobs, sniffles and smiles, with sniffles predominating." And Janis Joplin, a rock and blues singer of my teen years, once said, "Life is something you do while waiting to die."

All of these are pretty pessimistic views of life. They contrast sharply with Jesus' promise, "I am come that they might have life, and that they have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Your view of life, however, depends upon the level in which you choose to live. Consider these three levels.

- 1. **Survival:** This is the lowest level. But it is the level that most people live at. At this level people just eek out an existence. They are just trying to survive. Survive to the next pay check. Survive for the week-end. Survive for the next vacation. There's not a lot of hope in living at this level.
- 2. **Success:** This is a higher level. It is where many people live today. It is living a comfortable life style. It is having possessions, some degree of prestige and enjoying pleasure. By the world's standards, this person has made it. While there are varying degrees of success, we live in a country and enjoy an economy that affords success to many Americans. But the question comes, "If I am so successful, why don't I feel more fulfilled?" This leads us to the next level.
- 3. **Significance**: Success alone doesn't satisfy. Bob Buford in his excellent book Halftime points out that many people reach middle age with a lot of material success but little inner satisfaction. As one CEO put it, "I was always finding out that beyond the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, there's a sort of emptiness." Significance has to do with our purpose. Why and I here? What am I to be doing? How can I make a difference in life?

One of the great epithets of the Bible says of Israel's King David, "For when David had served God's purpose in his own generation, he fell asleep; he was buried with his father's..." (Acts 13:36, NIV). What

a wonderful thing to live life in serving our generation and doing it according to God's will.

God has shaped you for a purpose. God told the prophet Jeremiah, "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you...for I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (Jeremiah 1:5; 29:11). God knows what's best for your life. He knows what will fulfill your life better than you do. And he promises to reward your commitment to Him.

The wise man said "the whole duty of man is to fear God and keep His commandments" (Ecclesiastes 12:13). Living at this level will raise you above survive mode or even success. It will provide your life with significance, satisfaction and ultimately salvation.

# Pathway To Discernment

As we travel through life we face many spiritual challenges. These challenges generally bring us to a cross road in which we must make decisions. We survey our options and make a choice in how we will react to a challenge or temptation. While the answer may not always appear to be clear cut to a particular situation, decisions must be made. We must exercise spiritual discernment to know what is right and what is best.

"It is my prayer that your love may abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment, so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:9-11).

Discernment is the insight and ability to see through situations and perceive the proper course to take. In our text "knowledge and discernment" is preceded by an abounding love. Interestingly when we think of discernment we do not associate the term being "judgmental" even though judgments are being made. Here is where many find a distinguishing characteristic between foolishly reacting to challenges we face and wisely discerning what is best in a given particular spiritual challenge. Love embodies this sense of optimism that is not overcome by evil. Love is discerning - love is demanding, however, love is also seeking the best in all things. "Love...does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices in truth" (ref. 1 Corinthians 13:4-8a). In this we see spiritual discernment is the seeker and perceiver of truth. As this relates to traveling through life and making choices - truth and light is the path of discernment. But love is not lost as these choices are made.

#### The Effect

When Paul heard of the faith of the saints in Colossae he thanked God because of the hope it brought to their lives and the fruit of righteousness it produced. It was for this reason he prayed that they would be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all "Spiritual discernment." The effect of this is that they would "walk worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing Him, bearing fruit in every good work" (ref. Colossians 1:3-10).

Discernment is applying the precepts and principles of God's word in all walks of life. It is also the insight that will enable us to overcome prejudicial judgment and help to avoid bitterness.

Additionally, discernment is the thought process that enlightens us so we can avoid pitfalls that either are sinful or will lead us to sin. Therefore, the effect of spiritual discernment is the pathway of walking in the light.

#### Conclusion

We do not know what challenges each day may hold for us, but we know the course we will take will be based upon what is best for the spiritual well-being of everyone involved. When we examine the context of Hebrews chapters four and five this is what we learn. For this reason the writer admonishes us, "by this time you ought to be teachers,..." stating spiritual maturity is predicted on our "powers of discernment (are) trained by constant practice to distinguish good and evil" (ref. Hebrews 5:12-14).
