When We Make It, I Make It

Can you imagine what it must have been like to be busy building a wall and then hear that the inhabitants of the land around you are about to attack? The whole purpose of having a wall is to be more ready to withstand an attack, but they are coming before the wall is completed. You've been working hard. You're tired, exhausted even. You and your family are sitting ducks. If the enemy comes, the wall won't be ready and they will overrun you.

But Nehemiah arose and said to the people: "Do not be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, who is great and awesome, and fight for your brothers, your sons, your daughters, your wives, and your homes" (Nehemiah 4:14, ESV). In Nehemiah 4:13, Nehemiah stationed people by their clans, with swords, spears, and bows. The enemy heard of it and left off the attack. Following that, Nehemiah divided the workers in half. Half worked on the wall, the other half stood guard. Those who were working, bore their work load with one hand and their weapon in the other.

Do you notice the subtle point of how the victory was achieved here? It took everyone. They had to work together. They were already working together on building the wall, now they are working together on defending the wall, the city, and especially their families.

What teamwork!

First, let's think about building the wall. Each family was dealing with their own section of wall. Do you think any family wanted to be the family that built the weak part of the wall that got breached? Of course not. They all wanted to do their best in order to keep that wall intact and protect their city and their own families. Second, let's think about the potential battle. Each man was defending not only the city, but his own family. They would have to work together to protect each other.

What a great illustration here. There is a wonderful mix of family and city here. Each family was building their section of the wall, but together they were building the city wall. Each man was protecting his family, but together they were protecting the city.

But here is the key I hope we can recognize. When the people pulled together to rebuild and protect the city, who received the benefit of protection? Each family. This makes me think of mantra I want each and every church to make its own.

When we make it, I make it. If every individual and family in a local congregation pulls together to protect, preserve, and grow the local congregation, who gets the benefit? Every individual of the family. Amazingly enough, too many times individuals think only of themselves and never think of the church. Attending assemblies is something they do because they think it is an arbitrary requirement to get themselves to heaven. That is not it at all. The reason God encourages congregations and the gathering of such (Hebrews 10:25) is this very reason. When we make it, I make it.

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Work We All Can Do

The Bible is about people. As God unfolds His great plan of redemption for man, He weaves in the stories of different men and women used to accomplish that very purpose. And while we may not be told everything we would like to know about them, we have enough information that we can not only learn from their lives, we can relate to them. Just think about how many chapters are devoted to the telling about Joseph, David, Hannah, and Peter. We know them. We see ourselves in them. We name our children after them. They are our heroes.

But the same book boasts of a supporting cast. They

are the characters whose names do not appear in a great chapter on faith. They are the people whose stories are not as familiar, even among the children of God. They are the ones who quietly enter the stage, play their part, and then just as quietly exit back into obscurity. But they are people known to God and used by God, just as He used Abraham, Moses, and Mary. In His kingdom, everyone can be a hero.

There is work that we all can do. Some people seem to suffer from the misconception that since they can't do very much they might as well not do anything at all. They think to themselves, "I'll never teach like he can" or "I'm not as talented as she is." Yet God has never said He would hold us accountable for someone else's abilities and gifts. He expects us to work with what we've been given, to do what we can do, not what he can do.

The work is for all of us, every laborer in the vineyard. God still uses people to bring about His plans and purposes. He has a place for you. I offer these three questions to help us determine if we are doing all that we can do.

How much do you give? That is, how much do you give of yourself? Everyone has something to put in. There's no gift too small, no act of service that goes unnoticed. What did Jesus recognize about the woman who broke the costly bottle of perfume and anointed His head? "She has done what she could" (Mark 14:8). And because of that, the Lord said, "wherever the gospel is preached in the whole world, what this woman has done will be spoken of in memory of her." When you give your all, you'll be amazed at what you get out of it.

Do you have room for the kingdom? We sing all the time that there is room in the kingdom for you, but do you have room for the kingdom in your life? We bend over backwards to make accommodations for everything else in our busy schedules, and the Lord usually ends up with the leftovers or is left out altogether. That's not right. Most Christians would tell you that their relationship to God is the most important thing in their life. But what would their calendar tell you? What would their checkbook tell you? What would their lives tell you? There is work that we all can do. Let's make certain to make room for it.

Is your family first? God is our Father. We are His children. That makes us brethren. That makes us family. But we are not family in name alone. There is a body of work that accompanies this body of believers, a responsibility to be born by all. And we need every part doing its part. Jesus teaches in Matthew 25:31-46 that when we serve our brethren, we serve our Brother Himself. And even the smallest deeds of kindness, things like feeding the hungry and visiting the sick, are of first importance to our Father.

Let's not wait too late to labor. There is work that we all can do right now. And when we spend ourselves in His service, we can rest assured that our names are written in the Lamb's book of life.

Caution is one thing; faithlessness is quite another. With God, nothing is too good to be true.
