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The Second Coming of Jesus Christ

Bible teaching often reflects the times in which it is presented. The messages of God's prophets in the Old Testament were tied to the events and struggles through which God's people were passing. Likewise, the New Testament Apostles and other evangelists preached Jesus within the context of the lives people were living. Always Old Testament and New Testament proclaimers of the word pointed people toward the future. New Testament hearers after Pentecost were often reminded of Christ's second coming, judgment, heaven and hell.

The Holy Spirit revealed to these proclaimers of the word that God had already appointed a day of judgment "Because He hath appointed a day, in which He will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom He hath ordained: Whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead." Our Lord plainly said "I will come again" (John 14:1-3), in reference to His second coming to receive those who were His unto Himself. At Christ's ascension (Acts 1:9-11), the angels declared that "This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven."

Paul the apostle taught the brethren at Thessalonica that the Christian's hope is based upon the second coming of Jesus, (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18). Our belief in the resurrection is tied to our faith in the events to occur when Jesus returns, including the fact that "the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord." Paul adds additional details in 2 Thessalonians 1:7-10, especially in regard to the wicked.

Hebrew Christians were taught to look for His return in Heb 9:28: "So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time without sin unto salvation."

How will the Lord come again? It will be a personal coming (Acts 1:11) "This same Jesus" as the person who ascended will, in that day, descend from heaven. It will be a sudden coming (1 Thessalonians 5:2), like a "thief in the night," unexpectedly (2 Peter 3:10). His coming will not be in secret, however, because John wrote "behold, He cometh with clouds; and every eye shall see Him..."

The second coming will be audible, even to the extent that "all that are in the graves shall hear His voice" (John 5:28). His coming and judgment will be the most public event imaginable, because "then shall He sit upon the throne of His glory; and before Him shall be gathered all nations." You and I will be present for His coming, either then alive, or having been raised from the dead. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad" (2 Corinthians 510).

When Jesus returns, He will be accompanied by His holy angels (Matthew 25:31), whose power and might will be expressed in the certain vengeance on the wicked, who "Know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ; Who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of His power" (2 Thess. 1:8-9).

We do not know, and should not speculate, as to the imminence of His coming. Peter, writing of these events, points out that "one day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day" (2 Peter 3:8). God will not be affected by out attempts to set a date or timeline for these events. All such efforts have been a failure throughout all the centuries since New Testament times.

The greatest concern we should have is that we are ready for His return. In an old song, Fanny J. Crosby has asked: "When Jesus comes to reward His servants, Whether it be noon or night, Faithful to Him will He find us watching, With our Lamps all trimmed and bright?"

Our View of People

There is much talk these days about the racial divisions around us. We hear of wars, riots, murders, and various other crimes and offenses which all have one thing in common: a disrespect for people who are created by God. God made man (male and female) in His image (Genesis 1:26-27). From these original parents, all of the people of the earth have come. Paul stated that God "made from one, every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth" (Acts 17:26). Those who respect God will respect people. It doesn't matter what color the skin is, the shape of the body or eyes, or the country of origin. People are still people; and it is the height of arrogance and conceit to think that one is better than another. Racism, in any form, is not tolerable for Christians.

Jews and Gentiles were racially divided. it was difficult for Peter to put aside his feelings for Gentiles and go preach the Gospel to them. However, he went and proclaimed: "I most certainly understand now that God is not one to show partiality, but in every nation the man who fears Him and does what is right is, welcome to Him" (Acts 10:34-35). The Jews needed to overcome their racial feelings for Gentiles.

When Saul was rejected as king, and Samuel was told to anoint David, the Lord said to Samuel: "Do not look at his appearance or at the height or his stature, because I have rejected him; for God sees not as man sees, for man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7). If only we could learn to view people the way God does. viewing people based upon outward appearance is so shallow and superficial. So what that someone is taller or shorted, bigger or smaller, light-skinned or dark-skinned, blue eyed or brown eyed. None of these things tell us about a person's heart. These things so not define the soul of a human being; and it s the soul that is most important.

Our view of people must be built upon a proper view of God, who made us in His own image. If our view of God is faulty, then our view of man-kind will be faulty. For this reason, a theory such as evolution can only increase racial problems and harm society. If there is no God, and we are only the products of nature – time and chance mutations – then how can we place upon

people the value and honor that belong to us because we have been created in the image of God? We would be nothing more than brute beasts who trample over whatever gets in our way of "survival." Just remember: ideas have consequences.

When we listen to the word of God and understand both who He is and who we are, we can begin to view each other in the proper light. We all belong to the brotherhood of humanity.
