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Crucified With Christ

"I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

This statement from Paul is a most interesting statement. How is it that Paul could say that Christ now lives in him? It was because Paul had molded himself into the image of Christ. How did this happen?

Paul began this process when he went to Damascus, and Ananias told him to "Arise, and be baptized and wash away thy sins" (Acts 22:16). Paul had lived in the flesh as a Jew and as a Jew could glory in who he was (Philippians 3:7-14). But at Paul's conversion, that changed. He no longer lived doing what he previously thought was right or what would give him a lofty reputation among the religious and political leaders. He crucified self to live for Christ.

Paul wrote to the Romans concerning the crucifying of the old man. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore, we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we should walk in newness of life...Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (Romans 6:3-4,6). Notice Paul said Christians are buried in baptism and rise to walk a new life. Why? Because the old man of sin had been crucified; he had put to death the affections and lusts of the flesh (Galatians 5:24).

Our new life will focus on the things above, and not on things on the earth. We will have our minds set on Christ for He is now our life (Colossians 3:1-4). Yes, we continue to live in the flesh, but now that Christ is enthroned in our lives, our actions will be pleasing to Him. Our lives will be lives of faith. Trusting Him and looking to His word to find the direction for our lives (Romans 10:17; Proverbs 3:5).

What is the motive of the Christian's life? One motive may be heaven, the prepared home for the faithful, and that is a great motive. But another motive Paul mentions here is the sacrifice of Christ for us upon the cross, "He loved me and gave himself for me." As we walk in life thinking of how much Christ valued us by giving His life for us, we should be motivated to live to please Him and to do the work He has left for us to do.

May God help us to be "crucified with Christ" and to mold our life into the image of His dear Son. May our hearts and minds say as the song says:

"Mold me, make me, as you'd have me be, Take me, use me, that the lost may see, Guard me, guide me, thru this pilgrim land, Make me as clay in the potter's hand."

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"Except You Repent"

A basic truth regarding man's relationship with God is repentance. In Luke 13:1-5, Jesus teaches about repentance – what hinders it, why we need it, the consequences if we don't repent. Consider His teachings.


1) Hindrance To Repentance (vs. 1). History is replete with mistaken notions about sin, which hinder repentance. Genuine repentance demands a proper understanding of conviction regarding sin. In this text, Jesus deals with the error that associates one's sinfulness to his degree of suffering, as two catastrophic incidents of that time are considered. While it is true that suffering and death associated with earth life are consequences of sin's entrance into the world (Genesis 3), it does not hold true that suffering is a gauge for sinfulness. Suffering is universal, experienced by the just and unjust alike (Romans 8:20-25; 2 Corinthians 4:16-17). In fact, the righteous often suffer as a consequence of their godliness (2 Timothy 3:12), and, with God's help, it becomes a means for spiritual development (James 1:2-4). Therefore such a view of sin not only unjustly condemns the innocent (cf. Job's friends and the disciples question regarding the blind man, John 9:1-3), it also diverts attention from honest self-examination regarding

one's personal sin, to the observation of others.

- 2) The Need For Repentance (vs. 2, 4). Jesus teaches that all are guilty of sin (cf. Romans 3:23). Scripturally defined, sin is "lawlessness" or acting without God's law as the directive in our lives (1 John 3:4; cf. Matthew 7:21-23). David, recognizing this fact concerning his adultery with Bathsheba, confessed before God, "Against thee, and thee only, have I sinned…" (Psalm 51:4). One's transgressions can be either of "commission" (open violation, transgression of a command, 2 John 9), or "omission" (a failure to do what is commanded, James 4:17). Furthermore, one can sin and be counted guilty before God, even though committed with sincerity and in good conscience. A sin of ignorance is still a sin (1 Timothy 1:12-13). Therefore, the need for all to repent is clear.
- 3) The Urgency Of Repentance (vs. 3, 5). The urgency for repentance is clearly set forth in Jesus' command: "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." "Ye" constitutes individual responsibility. In other words, whatever else others may be guilty of what they're doing or not doing doesn't change your personal duty to repent of your sin. "Except" suggests the conditional nature of repentance and that I must exercise my freedom of choice to do so (Joshua 24:15; Acts 2:37-38; 17:30). There is no neutral ground here; we will all make a choice (Matthew 12:30). "Repent" means a change of heart or mind which is the result of "godly sorrow" working in our hearts, and which will result in a changed life (2 Corinthians 7:10-11).

Jesus presents before man an ultimatum: "repent... or perish." This perishing is eternal. Hell will be filled with all who, in error or neglect, didn't properly consider their sin and repent of them (Revelations 20:15; 21:8). "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered" (Psalm.32:1).

He Who Endures To The End

Jesus said, "Now brother will deliver up brother to death, and father his child; and children will rise up against and cause them to be put to death. And you will be hated by all for My name's sake. But he who endures to the end will be saved" (Matthew 10:21-22).

Hated By All – Did you ever feel like you just could not win? You tried to live right and do what the Lord wanted, but somehow, it just seemed like everyone was on your case. Jesus said there would be days like that and we need to have the faith necessary to deal with it.

Hated By Family – There is nothing which hurts worse than to have those we love turn against us. It is often the case that children who are attracted by the world find it difficult to be submissive and obedient to their parents who are trying to teach them the way of the Lord. Paul said, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother, which is the first commandment with promise" (Ephesians 6:1-2). At other times, family members are turned off because one of them calls for authority in some matter and believes some pet project of the others is unscriptural. Whatever the cause, families are destroyed because some stand with the Lord and others do not. A little later in this chapter, Jesus quotes the prophet Micah (7:6) saying, "A man's foes will be those of his own household" (verse 36).

Hated by All Men – Everyone wants to be liked. However, it is axiomatic that not everyone will be your friend, if for nothing more than just a matter of personality. This is especially true for those who have real convictions. If you stand for nothing, then you can agree with everyone. If, on the other hand, you believe the word of God to be truth and stand for its premises, many will be your enemy. Your very presence will be a constant reminder of their sin. They may try to get you fired from your job. They may threaten your good name. They may make every effort to take what you have. Jesus said, "These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer. I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

He Who Endures – Since Jesus has overcome, it is

possible and necessary for us to overcome with Him. John said, "Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10). It is sad for us when family and friends turn against us. It is necessary, though, for us to continue in our determination to be and do that which the Lord teaches. We may lose for the moment, but we will certainly be victorious in the final outcome. (See Romans 8:18 and 2 Corinthians 4:16-5:8.) May God give us the strength and faith we so desperately need in such an hour.
