Want Real Happiness?

Helen Keller once observed, "Many persons have a wrong idea of what constitutes real happiness. It is not obtained through selfgratification, but through fidelity to a worthy purpose." If Helen Keller were alive today, what would she think?

Modern-day advertising offers us happiness simply by buying the right car, soft drink or deodorant. Our society is saturated with promises for immediate happiness and instant gratification. In fact, we are infatuated with it. People believe that they have the "right" to be happy. One mental health expert, Dr. Darold Treffert, cited many teen problems on what he calls "The American Fairy Tale." Two of the five tenets of this theme are (1) More possessions mean more happiness and (2) A person is abnormal unless constantly happy.

The unrealistic image of life often portrayed in movies, on TV and, ironically, in "reality shows," only reinforce this popular myth. Too many of our young people have bought into the message and think something is wrong with them if they are not happy all the time.

What people often fail to realize is that the real happiness that Helen Keller referred to is based on responsibility. Dee Bowman once wrote, "I see a lot of people who are unhappy and don't know why. I am convinced that oftentimes it's because they aren't doing what they know they ought. You can't be fulfilled and derelict at the same time."

Actually "real happiness" is what the Bible calls joy. The happiness of the world is based on externals and depends on circumstances. Joy is based on internals and found in Christ. Paul calls it the "joy of faith" (Philippians 1:25) and exhorts Christians to "rejoice in the Lord" (Philippians 3:1). Jesus promised the apostles "true happiness" when He said, "these things I have spoken to you that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full" (John 15:11).

King David, a man after God's own heart, spoke often of this "true

happiness" in the Psalms. He wrote about the "joy of salvation" (Psalm 51:12), joy in the presence of God (Psalm 16:11) and joy in worship (Psalm 27:6). He rejoiced in righteousness, God's goodness and in going into the house of the Lord. He was happy because he greeted each day with this spirit. "This is the day the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalm 118:24). We would be happier by developing this attitude.

It is no accident that Luke would write David's epithet this way. "For when David had served God's purpose in his own generation, he fell asleep; he was buried with his fathers..." (Acts 13:36). David's life was about fidelity to God and a worthy purpose.

"Real happiness" is found in Christ and fulfilled in following His purpose for you, which was decreed before the foundation of the world. Want real happiness? Find your purpose and fulfill your duty.

The Time For Teaching

A farmer removed an old beech tree which grew on his land. The woodcutter noticed on the bark some curious marks which looked like the letters J.L, roughly cut and below them some ornamental design. After the tree was cut and was being divided into lengths, he was startled to find on the hard dry wood at the core of the tree, the clearly cut letters J.L. on a dark background, and below them an anchor. Upon inquires, it was found that the letters were the initials of a sailor named John Leland. There were 37 rings between the letters and the bark of the tree. He inferred that the letters must have been cut in 1653, and his belief was confirmed when he learned that it was in that year that the sailor had spent some time in the area. The inscription had not only remained in the place where It was cut at the first, but as each year added to the growth of the tree, the letters still appeared on the surface, scarcely legible there, it is true, but perfectly clear at the core.

The same thing is true with human character. Many an old man, in spite of the rough usage of the world and the scar of time and trouble, bears upon his walk and manner of life marks which were put there in childhood.

When you read the second chapter of Exodus it is apparent that someone taught Moses to: have sympathy with the slave; despise injustice; know the folly of anger; and to defend the weak. I think I can see the loving influence of his mother behind all these acts.

When I look at Timothy, the companion of the apostle Paul, and see the faith and dedication, I am reminded of the teaching which had been done early in Timothy's life by his mother and grandmother.

The training we receive in early life we will carry with us to the grave. It's important, therefore, that our children are taught the right things now. We must not neglect golden opportunities.
