# The Preaching of the Gospel

In Mark 16:15, Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Among the last instructions Jesus gave His disciples was this commission to preach the gospel. It is evident that Jesus considered the preaching of the gospel very crucial for Him to impress the urgency of preaching to His disciples before ascending back to heaven. Yes, the preaching of the gospel was important then and is still very important today.

Jesus alluded to why preaching the gospel was so important in Mark 16:16 when he said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Jesus makes very clear that salvation requires the gospel being preached to the lost, the lost believing the gospel and then obeying the commands. Paul stressed the same importance of preaching the gospel to the Corinthians as he wrote, "...it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe" (1 Corinthians 1:21). Paul is not saying that the preaching of the gospel is foolishness, but that those who claimed to be the wise viewed preaching of the gospel as foolishness. Paul declared that regardless of how men may consider the preaching of the gospel, it still will save men when preached, believed, and obeyed. Paul wrote to the Romans, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." The importance of the gospel is in its power to save the lost.

One might ask who are the lost? The lost are those separated from God by sin (Isaiah 59:1-2). In Romans 3:9, 23 we learn that all, both Jew and Gentile, are under sin, "for all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." But through our belief and obedience of the gospel, our sins are washed away and forgiven.

Another question that may come is, "What is the gospel?" The gospel includes the death, burial and resurrection of Christ (1 Corinthians 15:1-4). However, it includes the teaching that the inspired men did in

the first century. The Holy Spirit guided them into all truth, and the gospel being preached by them, not apart from them (John 16:13; 1 Peter 1:12). Paul referred to their preaching the gospel as a "treasure in vessels." Therefore, the gospel includes the teachings of Christ, as well as the life, death, burial, resurrection of Christ and the teachings throughout the New Testament written by inspired men.

Today, when we preach the same gospel preached by those in the first century, we are preaching the gospel that will save those that believe it and obey it. Share the good news of the gospel with others. It is the power to save. The gospel is powerful!

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# Cause and Concern

What do you do when you are concerned about something? What do you do when something scares you? I'm not talking about spiders, snakes, storms or anything like that. I mean what kinds of situations or people cause you to be concerned and alter your decision. For example, when I am driving and notice a person that seems to be distracted, I'm concerned. They swerve a little while looking down and then continue to look down maybe. Well, I stay away from that car. When possible, I go past them quickly. Why? I'm afraid of what might happen because of their actions. The things they are doing give me a reason to alter what I do.

People have a way of determining what the rest of us do in life. Total strangers can shift my thoughts and actions because of fear and concern. A boss will worry how an employee will respond to firing them. The boss should still fire them though. A student will be concerned about the reaction of a teacher when they don't do their schoolwork. The student still needs to talk to the teacher. It's understandable, but it shouldn't determine what we do or don't do.

"And they discussed it with one another, saying If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say, 'Why then did you not believe

him?' But shall we say, 'From man'?" – they were afraid of the people, for they all held that John really was a prophet. So they answered Jesus, 'We do not know.'" Mark 11:31-33

"It was now two days before the Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread. And the chief priests and the scribes were seeking how to arrest him by stealth and kill him, for they said, 'Not during the feast, lest there be an uproar from the people." Mark 14: 1-2

The priests and scribes were terrified of people! They wanted to take Jesus and kill Him, but they were afraid of the people. They wanted to respond to a question Jesus asked, but were worried what people's reaction would be. Obviously, their motives were wrong, but, the point remains, they were a bunch of scared men. They knew what they wanted, how to get what they wanted and were unwilling to take the necessary steps because of the people. Jesus even spoke a parable directed right at them and they did nothing because "they feared the people" (Luke 20:19). Granted, there could have been a mob that arose and they would have been outnumbered, but it doesn't matter. It shouldn't matter to us.

We can be exactly like these scribes and priests. The difference is that we don't want to trap or harm Jesus, we want to follow Him and lift Him up. No matter what people think and no matter who those people are, we should never allow them to stop us from doing what we know needs to be done. What makes it even worse for us is that it might only be one or a few voices that could speak out against us and we sit back and do nothing. Even if you are outnumbered, don't fear the people.

Teachers (preachers especially) can never allow fear get in the way of teaching what is right. Leaders (in the home and in the church) ought to be strong enough to lead no matter what people might think or say. All Christians should ignore any fear of people that might cause them to not live how Christ wants us to live. God is our judge and we ought to let that fear direct us in all we do.

It's not just about right and wrong either. Sometimes it's just what needs to be done. Unlike the priest and scribes, we can be sure of what needs to be done and do it. Will you let people's feelings and wishes be a cause for concern for you? Will you be afraid of people? Or will you do what needs to be done out of fear for our Lord?

# Scarely Saves?

It has well been said, "Hardly any verses in the New Testament have been misunderstood any more than" (James Burton Coffman, Commentary on James, 1 & 2 Peter, 1, 2, & 3 John, & Jude, Page 239). 1 Peter 4:17-18. Sometimes reads, "And if the righteous is scarcely saved, where shall the ungodly and sinner appear?" (1 Peter 4:18), without any thought as to the context, or one glibly renders a free quotation of 1 Peter 4:18, and leaves the totally false impression that the Apostle Peter is saying that the righteous will just barely make it to heaven. False teachers come in many varieties. There are those who intentionally teach error for worldly gain ("...teaching things which they ought not, for filthy lucre's sake" – Titus 1:11), and there are those who are simply ignorant of what is actually being taught.

Question: Peter, is it true that in the final day of judgment, the righteous will scarcely be saved? Answer: "Wherefore, brethren, give the more diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never stumble: for thus shall be richly supplied unto you the entrance into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 1:10-11). Well, which is it? Is it "scarcely saved" or "richly supplied"? Is it possible that Peter forgot what he wrote in 1 Peter and contradicted himself in his second letter? No, the apostles, Peter included, were guided into all the truth (John 14:26; 16:13). If Peter was not correcting a mistake he made, nor had he contradicted himself, what is the answer? How are these two verses reconciled?

Peter was writing about two totally different things, two different judgments, two different salvations'. In 1 Peter, written just five or six years before the destruction of Jerusalem by the armies of Rome, he wrote of the trials and tribulations that were shortly to befall the saints in Jerusalem. Our beloved brethren in Jerusalem had been warned, by Jesus Himself, to flee from the city when her destruction was imminent (see Matthew 24:15-28), and these were "scarcely saved" from physical death, or of being sent to Rome as slaves. In 2 Peter he writes of the entrance "into the eternal kingdom" (i.e. heaven), and comforts his readers (including you and me) by assuring us that if our life is characterized by the doing of God's will our "entrance into the eternal kingdom"
