"To Whom Shall We Go?"

In His teachings, Jesus had been using some words in a spiritual way about Himself (John 6:48-59). Many of His disciples said, "This is a hard saying; who can understand it?" (v.60).

Then Jesus said, "Does this offend you?" (v.61). Jesus explained, "It is the Spirit who gives life; the flesh profits nothing. The words that I speak of you are spirit, and they are life" (v. 63).

"From that time many of His disciples went back and walked with Him no more. Then Jesus said to the twelve, 'Do you also want to go away?' But Simon Peter answered Him, 'Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life'" (v. 66-68).

Surely it grieved Jesus when so many left Him, to never return, but also it was refreshing to Jesus to hear one of His twelve apostles show his great faith in Him.

If those disciples forsook Jesus as their example and guide, would they turn to any of the rabbis or to the scribes, to the Pharisees, or maybe to the high priest? Would any of these people be a sinless leader, as Jesus is? Could they truly say follow me and I will give you eternal life? No, they were sinners too. Jesus had no sin (1 Peter 2:21-24). He is the only perfect example for us. Jesus died for us (1 Corinthians 15:3-4). Jesus said, "I am He who lives, and was dead, and behold, I am alive forevermore. Amen. And I have the keys of Hades and of Death" (Revelation 1:18).

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Still A Threat

The world and our society have changed markedly in the last forty years. The challenges that face disciples of Jesus now were not unknown when I was a child. Yet, the degree of sexual immorality, divorce, violence, dishonesty, profanity, selfishness, and materialism in the year 2006 far exceeds the degree of those problems in 1966.

I grew up in a time not far removed from Mayberry. I could ride my bike all over Slaton, Texas with no fear of being abducted. I doubt that my folks worried about my teachers making sexual advances toward my sister or me. I never participated in "Drug Prevention Week" in elementary school. But now, I think about all of those things in regard to my daughters, and I'm frankly hesitant to let them play outside of our own fenced yard.

Accordingly, the sermons I heard growing up dealt with issues that are seldom discussed presently. Please don't misunderstand – I heard many lessons on the home, immorality, materialism, dishonesty, divorce, etc. Yet, society in general seemed more religiously inclined and less immoral than it is currently. Many people had strong religious ties. Denominational loyalty was fierce, and people actually debated doctrinal differences between various religious organizations. The lines that separated assorted "churches" were often distinct, and people defended their convictions. There was less emphasis upon the ecumenical philosophy of our day – the "it doesn't matter what you believe, let's forget our differences, what's doctrine have to do with it" battle cry of the modern "all faiths" mega-churches.

Most of the sermons of my youth revolved around authority, doctrinal error, and Biblical accuracy. Christians were confronted with abuses involving the work, organization, and nature of Christ's church. Many churches were funding secular organizations such as colleges and children' homes. Others were forming networks in order to do missionary work or establish preaching schools. And still others were pursuing the denominational trend toward social emphasis and reaction as tools to attract visitors. Institutionalism, doctrinal perversion, and the social gospel were among the greatest threats of the day. Yet few people appear concerned about those matters anymore. Many Christians today - and particularly those under thirty years old – have little understanding of institutionalism. Doctrinal issues are rarely considered by most "religious" people in our day, as there is little emphasis upon God's instructions concerning worship or the home or godliness in many modern religious organizations. Everything seems to revolve around "praise," entertainment, "community," and temporal concerns. The mantra of our religious age is simple - "God Loves You. Feel good about yourself. Let's just praise the Lord!" And so, Christians who are serious about discipleship have focused our attention upon the increasingly wicked culture in which we must live, work, raise our children, and uphold the truth.

I will be the first to admit that our concerns about immorality, dishonesty, divorce, materialism, etc., are well founded. We need Christians with the courage to stand as lights in this darkening world. We need strong preaching. We must teach our children God's standard, regardless of the political incorrectness of what He deems as sin. But there remains another consideration that must not be overlooked. Matters of previous concern, such as institutionalism, doctrinal perversion, and the social gospel, remain serious threats. This is particularly true for young people who have not been exposed to such perversions and who probably have not been adequately instructed concerning the dangers. Young Christians are being solicited by social activities, "progressive" worship, campus ministries, and institutional programs. They seem unconcerned that churches are participating in activities for which have no Biblical authority. They appear unafraid that such congregations are funding and supporting secular organizations, or institutions other than the local congregation that are ostensibly performing "spiritual" work. They seem to have disregarded the truth about the work of the local church, congregational autonomy, or scriptural worship. And they are, as a result, being led to a simple compromise of God's truth and their own faith.

We must not forget that Satan is quite effective in his efforts to tempt those who would be godly. We must not become tunnel – visioned concerning the threats to our faith and to the spiritual well being of our children. We cannot neglect to teach about authority, the nature of God's truth, the need for doctrinal accuracy, the nature of God's truth, the error of institutional allegiance, the nature and work of the church, and the fallacy of a social gospel.

In Matthew 23:23, Jesus rebuked the Pharisees for majoring in minors – "You pay tithe of mint and anise and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith." A church is not necessarily sound simply because they do not support a human institution. We must still uphold "the weightier matters." But Jesus continues, "These ought you to have done, without leaving the others undone." Such issues that are so often considered "nit-picking, little, and unimportant" cannot be left "undone." They have not ceased to be a threat.
