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# The Choice of Moses

God made man and gave him free will, the power to choose. From the garden of Eden, and throughout the scriptures we see various people making choices, some good and some bad. As we live on earth, we too will be faced with making decisions concerning things that are right and wrong. At the end of time, we will all give account for the choices we have made. It is important that we learn to make the right choices, which we choose that which pleases God. In learning to do this, we would do well to consider the choice that Moses made (Hebrews 11:24-25). Let us notice some lessons we can learn from the choice that Moses made.

#### Moses Refused Earthly Power and Prestige

From the text, we learn that Moses' choice involved his giving up the earthly power and prestige he had being "the son of Pharoah's daughter." Power and prestige are driving forces behind many decisions that we make. Often decisions are based not on what is right, but rather one what it will make me. John said, "among the chief rulers also many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess him, lest they should be put out of the synagogue: For they loved the praise of men more than the praise of God" (John 12:42-43). When Moses made his decision, his concern was not for what power or prestige he would lose for doing right, but his concern was for what was right.

#### Moses Refused The Pleases of Sin

In Hebrews 11:25, we are told that Moses chose "to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season." Sin is deceptive. It will allure one to think that something sinful is not that bad. In Genesis 3, when Eve was tempted by the serpent to eat the forbidden fruit, she was enticed by its pleasantness. Many times people will commit sins by fooling themselves into thinking that it is pleasant and not so bad. Many have given themselves over to actions that they would have never thought of being involved in at one time. But they failed to see the deception of sin and the way in which it leads one into sin with terrible consequences. David was an example of such when he failed to see the danger in lusting after a woman he saw bathing. It led

him to commit fornication, lying, getting a man drunk, murder. All of this occurred because he did not see the deception of sin.

#### Moses Refused Earthly Possessions

In verse 26 of Hebrews 11, we are told "esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt: for he had respect unto the recompense of reward." We learn that the decision Moses made involved him leaving the riches or treasures that we for him as the son of Pharoah's daughter to stand with God and to lead His people. Many decisions in life involve the choice of things or riches. The rich young ruler was one that wanted to be acceptable to God, but when faced with the choice of pleasing God or keeping his wealth, he chose his earthly wealth (Mark 10:17-22). Jesus warned early in His personal ministry about the improper value placed on things of this earth. Notice he said, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt and where thieves break through and steal; but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven..." (Matthew 6:19-20). When Moses was confronted with his choice, he made a choice for heaven and not earth.

In this, we see Moses made a choice that pleased God. "How did he do it" one may ask? It was because of his deep abiding faith in God and His promises. So then, if we are going to make the right choice as Moses did then let us develop a strong faith, which comes from God's word (Romans 10:17). Let us read, study and live each day as God directs us through His word, then, we will be prepared as Moses was to make the right choice.

But, knowing Jerry, we are quite sure that he will distinguish the girl who will make a great date from the one who will make a great wife, and will choose the later.

Two vital questions remain to be asked. Girls, which one of the two girls correctly depicts you? Boys, which would you choose for a date? Young people who love the Lord choose mates that will help them to go to heaven.

#### God's Invitation

Is it overstating the case to say that we have all made excuses at one time or another for not doing what the Lord expects us to do? Students are good at making excuses. Efforts to relieve oneself of culpability run the gamut from "the dog ate my homework" to "I overslept" to "I didn't know we were having a test," etc. You get the picture. The excuses brethren make are as varied and as ingenious as those made by unprepared scholars. "I couldn't come to services; I had a bowling tournament." "I couldn't come to the gospel meeting; I was on vacation." "I couldn't come to midweek Bible study; my dog died." On it goes.

In the parable of the great supper the Lord invites all who will to come to Him and feast of the spiritual food of the kingdom (Luke 14:15- 24). Those invited quickly began to make excuses as to why they would not accept the gracious invitation.

"And they all with one consent began to make excuse. The first said unto him, I have bought a piece of ground, and I must needs go and see it: I pray thee have me excused. And another said, I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I go to prove them: I pray thee have me excused. And another said, I have married a wife, and therefore I cannot come" (vv.18-20).

One excuse appealed to business first. Did this man buy the field sight unseen? Was it an absolute necessity to go right then and see the field? The second appealed to things—in this case, oxen. He didn't plead any necessity; he simply wanted to go see his animals. Or, was that his real reason? The third made an appeal to his wife; he makes no excuse other than saying: I am not coming.

Jesus teaches us that some who needed to come were simply delaying their actual journey toward the great kingdom feast. Would it be true that after these three men took care of their "pressing obligations" they would then begin to follow Jesus? Most people who have thought just a little about the Lord do not reject Him outright; they simply put off doing what is right; they delay their coming. The danger is that one day the invitation will be withdrawn. That is one danger of earthly concentrations. Pursuit of this world to its ultimate end will result in the revocation of the invitation.

Do we reason that God is lucky to have us at His table and our coming to Him must be on our terms? Clearly,

those who made the excuses were the Jews (Luke 14:1ff). They were the very ones who so desperately needed the Savior but didn't realize their need. Their refusal to bow before God indicated a problem with pride.

Their refusal to come and dine indicated a lack of understanding about their real need. Their belief was that the banquet was beneath them; they were self-seeking rather than God-seeking.

Note the use of "their" in the words above. Change "their" to "me" or "you." Do you and I stubbornly refuse to come to the table? If so, Jesus is speaking to us. When God says: "I'm giving you a party," we must get up and go.
