The Danger of Neglect

In Hebrews 2:3 we read, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great a salvation; which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord..." The Hebrew writer brings to mind the seriousness of neglect. It is indeed a serious matter to be negligent in doing things that have serious consequences if left undone. There are many things in life that we might neglect to do, and it is not a real serious matter. For examples, to neglect to eat wholesome, nourishing food may be serious over a period of time, but the immediate danger of such neglect is unapparent. But in spiritual matters neglect are very serious and can determine our eternal standing with God. Let us consider some people in the scriptures that neglected the things of God.

Different Individuals That Neglected

Cain is the first that comes to mind (Genesis 4). He wanted to worship God and had been told what God expected, but failed to offer that. Abel did not neglect God's will, but offered to God a sacrifice that God required, and it pleased God. Cain's neglect lead him into a life of rebellion and separation from God.

Uzzah is an another one that neglected God's will concerning not touching the ark of God. Uzzah is remembered for his neglect and forth his hand to steady the ark as the ark shook as it crossed Nachon's threshing floor and God smote him for his neglect in the case (2 Samuel 6:6-7).

In Luke 12 we read of the rich man was blessed abundantly by God and his ground brought forth plentifully. Rather than remember his soul, and what God required of him, he thought only of himself and sought his happiness here on earth feasting on the riches of God he had blessed. He is referred to as a "fool" for his neglect and not remembering God..

Lastly, we are reminded of Felix who heard Paul preaching to him of righteousness and the judgment to come" who said, "When I have a convenient season I will call for thee" (Acts 24:24-27). Felix neglected the spiritual matter thinking there would be a later time.

It may be that neglect is deliberate and comes as we take the down-

ward road away from God, as in Cain case. Or, it may be neglect that in our minds appear to have a good motive as in Uzzah's case. Or, it may be neglect due to a lack of attention and commitment to pleasing God because of selfishness, as in the case of the rich man. Or, neglect due to thinking there will be a better time later, as in the case of Felix. Regardless of the case the danger of is that it leads to continued neglect and will leave one unprepared to meet God in judgment.

A Very Private War

Throughout History war has plagued mankind. In every generation there are "wars and rumors of wars." Wars are born out of conflicts between people. Sometimes they are national, sometimes civil, always personal. Like it or not, we are all at war. We fight wars against great odds sometimes. Sometimes the wars are more like skirmishes or border disputes. But they, too, are still wars. Internal struggles are some of the most intense forms of warfare.

We fight against ignorance. Not many of us know the true state of things-and even if we did, things change. So we strive to stay up. Ignorance has always been a bane to man's progress. And all of us have some of it. No man knows much, "except as he ought to know." Will Rogers had it right when he said, "We're all ignorant, just in different fields." Study is the offensive weapon against ignorance (1 Timothy 2:15). It's necessary that we know God and His way in order to combat the stratagems of the Devil. We can hardly win a single battle if we are "ignorant of his devices" (2 Corinthians 2:11). And so we arm ourselves with the panoply of God so that we are ready to fight when the times comes (Ephesians 6: 10-18).

Pride is one of man's most pervasive enemies. It sneaks in when we are not looking- and sometimes even when we are. Sin started with it; it has ever been a problem for man. "Pride goeth before destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall" (Proverbs 16:18), said the wise man. And yet we only fight it back; we never really conquer it. Ironically, the recurrence of pride is often worse than what we just fought back.

It's difficult to control pride. Humility is the answer (1 Peter 5:5); but humility is hard- hard to get it, even harder to maintain it.

Spies are part of warfare. They sneak in and gather information to aid in defeat. They work on the inside. Two of the most ubiquitous of these insiders are materialism and indifference. Materialism wears the mask of success. Indifference masquerades as leisure time earned by hard work. In both cases, they spy out ways to defeat you. Materialism occupies you so with what seemingly are legitimate battles- battles like "making a living"- that you have no time to spend on the real war-building character. Indifference, on the other had, lulls you into apathy and thereby promotes inattention to what is really important. Both these actions are so well disguised that they seem appropriate, when in fact, they are eating away at the fibre of your enthusiasm thereby blunting your interest in what should be of greater concern.

We can overcome the battles of life, but only as we trust completely in our leader (Romans 8:34-39); only if we are watchful and earnest (1 Corinthians 16:13; 1 Peter 5:8); and only if we hold out to the end (1 Corinthians 15:58).

One thing is sure, however. You have to get into the thick of the battle if you plan to have the victory. You can't win by just standing around watching.
