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Renouncing The Hidden Things of Shame

How do you say "Thank You" to God? How do you maintain perspective and the heart to go on when assaulted by the unfounded accusations of your enemies? How do you stay motivated to serve today and tomorrow when the failures of yesterday continue to haunt your memory? How do you do right in a world that makes it so easy to do wrong? Those questions plagued the apostle Paul till the day he died. Listen to his answer: "Therefore since we have this ministry, as we have received mercy, we do not lose heart. But we have renounced the hidden things of shame, not walking in craftiness not handling the word of God deceitfully, but by manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God" (2 Corinthians 4:1-2).

"We have renounced the hidden things of shame." That was true generally and specifically in relation to Paul's dealing with brethren and the Word. The question, of course, is whether we can, with clear conscience, make the same assertion.

We are not a society known for renouncing much of anything. We have come to believe the lie that everything moral and ethical is relative. That there are no absolutes anymore. As a result, we live in a society not unlike Jeremiahs, wherein blushing is a rarity. After all, we are too "enlightened" for such an antiquated concept. And so in our supposed "Christian nation," pornography is thought to be a harmless adult diversion, alcohol is considered just one of a thousand libations one may drink without harm, divorce carries with it virtually no stigma, illicit sexual activity is considered a natural part of the maturation process, and homosexuality is now out of the closet and marching in the streets. We are a society without shame. The grossest of immoralities are paraded about without any effort to hide them.

Have Christians been affected? Absolutely! You and I both know that illustration after illustration of just aberrant behavior among the people of God could be cited. Why? Perhaps because, unlike Paul, we haven't "renounced," i.e., disowned, "scorned with aversion" (Barnes), these things but have tended to flirt with them. We often try to see just how close to

the fire we can get without being burned. And when we are burned, rationalization rather than repentance is often the order of the day. Quite simply, there comes a time when we must say "no" to the flesh, crucify the flesh, and replace the works of the flesh with the fruit of the spirit, (cf., Galatians 5:17ff).

But Paul also makes two specific applications. First, he declares that he has not walked in "craftiness." And rightfully so. After all, brethren are not here for us to exploit, manipulate or misrepresent. Tricky tactics, cunning deception, underhanded methods have no place in the life of a genuine disciple. That is true of our dealings, preacher with preacher, preacher with brethren, brethren with brethren, and brethren with fellow man. That is true whether we happen to like them as well as we do others or whether they have been fair in dealing with us. Our relationship with our brethren should be one that encourages, strengthens, and refreshes; not one that endangers our soul.

Second, he had not adulterated the word of God. And neither should we. The cutting edge of truth must never be blunted by an appeal to past tradition or present societal norms. But, admittedly, there is risk involved in preaching the "whole counsel of God," (Acts 20:27). Paul realized this and having said some harsh things to the Galatians, asked, "Am I therefore become your enemy because i tell you the truth?" (Acts 4:16). And yet, God demands that if we truly "renounce the hidden things of shame," we'll teach unadulterated truth on any and every issue without respect of persons.

Does this mean that it is our prerogative to be either crafty or arrogant in teaching that truth? Of course not. Our obligation is to "speak the truth in love," (Ephesians 4:15). Both sides of that equation are of equal importance. There is nothing noble, nothing Christlike, in holding truth with a bad attitude or standing for truth through underhanded, carnal methods. We have an obligation to be sure that we model the truth we teach "commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God." After all, the greatest damage to the cause of Christ is not done by an ungodly media or perverse entertainment industry, but by men and women who come together and worship, pray, commune, teach, and preach but have never "renounced the hidden things of shame."

The Desire To Escape

And I said, "Oh, that I had wings like a dove! For then I would fly away and be at rest. Indeed, I would wander far off, and remain in the wilderness. I would hasten my escape from the windy storm and tempest" (Psalm 55:6-7).

No less a man than King David had moments when he wished to withdraw from the stress and strains of life—to "fly away and be at rest." David had more power to control his life than most ever will. He was a reigning monarch for forty years. He had ultimate authority over all government operations, social projects, the economy, national defense, etc. He was wealthy and could indulge in every luxury his culture could provide. He had a large family and loyal friends. Above all, he was a man who loved God and truly sought to do His will. What could possibly make him yearn so deeply for solitude that seemed beyond his reach?

David's lamentation reveals a troubling truth: Utopia is not to be found on this earth. It couldn't be found in the palace of David. He could not compel it by royal fiat or the edge of a sword. In fact, his very position invited a high degree mental distress because of its complex dynamics. Enemies repeatedly encroached; rivals aspired to supplant; even subordinates (like Joab) couldn't be controlled. Further, David's family is a textbook example of the folly of polygamy and lack of parental discipline. David's only peace seemed to be in his communion with God:

One thing I have desired of the Lord, that I will seek: That I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in His temple. For in the time of trouble He shall hide me in His pavilion; in the secret place of His tabernacle He shall hide me; He shall set me high upon a rock (Psalm 27:4-5).

Those intoxicated with worldly ambition and pleasure think that life is theirs for the taking. They thrive on the challenge of conquering; they sate themselves with sensuality. but carnal hunger is never satisfied, and many turn to more selfish acquisitions and perverted forms of enjoyment while running roughshod over those who get in their way.

But the very things that thrill the carnal man vex the spiritual man. The excesses, the treachery, the profound foolishness of the wicked drive the godly to despair. He sees how much better the world could be but knows from history that significant improvement without God is unlikely. This makes him long for a future in a place devoid of evil.

This world will forever bear the residue of sin. It is permanently broken and hard and lonely. Disease mars and cripples. Death, the most unwelcome of all intruders, occasionally barges in and departs with someone we love. Eden is only a misty memory in our collective consciousness. We long to be where weeds don't grow, paint doesn't peel and our back doesn't hurt in the morning. David's hope for wings of a dove never materializes, but after due meditation the great prophet and king concludes that true refuge can only be found in God's house:

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever (Psalm 23:6).

This requires repentance, prayer, watchfulness, self-denial, detachment from the world, humility, obedience, and cross carrying. Let us pick up our cross today and every day that we live. Then, we will quickly discover that Christ's love has the power to change anybody and everything, including us.
