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The Key to Kingdom Growth

The Lord scarcely taught about the kingdom without either explicitly or implicitly referring to growth. The apostles were to wait in Jerusalem for the coming of the Spirit, and then the Word was to be proclaimed in Jerusalem, and in Judea and Samaria, even to the "uttermost part" of the world. Parables reflected the growth factor in the kingdom (e.g., the Parable of the Sower). Prior to ascending to the Father, the Lord commissioned His apostles to go into all the world and preach the gospel. The Lord gave every indication of His intention that the kingdom of God should grow.

But how? What would be the key to the strength and expansion of the church? How would a small band of Jews in Jerusalem ever accomplish the enormous objective of converting immoral pagans and ritualistic Jews to a religion founded on a resurrected Christ? These disciples were, for the most part, common folks. They were not known for their wealth or their oratorical skill. How could they do it? What would they do?

The New Testament emphasizes that the strength of the church is in its Christ-centered message. We are prone to place far too much emphasis on the men involved, or the method used, or the tools and equipment. Man's ego is stoked when emphasis is focused in the wrong place. Simply stated, Jesus sent His disciples out into the world to tell the story of the cross to anyone who would listen.

The preaching of the gospel in the first century accomplished exactly what God intended for it to accomplish. Concerning the Word, God said through the prophet Isaiah, "My word shall not return unto me void. It shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in that purpose whereunto I have sent it" (Isaiah 55:11). Later, the apostle Paul would write, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel; for it is the power of God unto salvation..." (Romans 16:16). To the Corinthians he noted, "It was God's good pleasure through the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe," (1 Corinthians 1:21).

The early church experienced strength and growth because of the gospel. That same gospel will produce the same results today when the

seed is sown into good and honest hearts. Honestly, when was the last time you seriously attempted to talk about Jesus Christ with someone who was not already a Christian? We would do well to concentrate on planning the seed. God will give the increase.

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Seeking The Truth

Nothing is as important to man as truth. We speak not of political, mathematical, or historical truth, but of the truth that was searched out of the mind of God and revealed unto apostles and prophets by the Holy Spirit (see 1 Corinthians 2:10-11; Ephesians 3:3-5). This truth is God's word, the good news of salvation, that promises to free man of sin and deliver him from God's eternal wrath (John 17:17; John 8:32; Ephesians 1:12-13; 2 Thessalonians 1:7-9). This truth is found in the "scriptures"—or in what today is called the "Bible" (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

Other pursuits may be more exciting, but none of them is as spiritually noble and eternally rewarding. Becoming the wealthiest man in the world, best golfer, most popular entertainer, or best liked person, may be glamorous, but none of them fulfills the deepest need of man and prepares him for the joy of eternal life that awaits mankind beyond the grave. Only truth, believed and practiced, sanctifies man and equips him for life with God (see John 17:17; Eph 5:26-27). It is a challenging pursuit that calls for diligence, love of truth, and honesty.

Diligence. The search for truth is not for the indolent and lazy. It demands diligence. The ancient Bereans learned this when the apostle Paul came to their city and alleged from the Old Testament scriptures that Jesus of Nazareth is the anointed Savior. They did not have Bibles with chapters and verses, yet they daily examined scroll after scroll to study the prophecies cited by Paul to determine if Jesus was the Messiah these writings anticipated. Luke called them "noble" because they ea-

gerly and studiously searched for the truth (Acts 17:11).

The challenge today is just as daunting for sincere Bible students who must search the scriptures day by day to flesh out the context of God's teaching, define relevant words, trace many uses of special terms, and research the background of ideas and concepts. All of this must be done amidst a jumble of theologies and false doctrines that bombard students of the word.

Love of Truth. Whether students in search of truth have the diligence to complete the task depends on their love of truth. When men and women approach the scriptures with "personal tastes" and "preconceived notions," truth is not their objective. These kinds of students find what they are looking for. God warns any person who has no "love of the truth" that God Himself will send them a delusion, a working of error, that they may believe a lie and be damned (2 Thess 2:8-12).

Amazingly, visitors to our services and students in home Bible studies have openly said, "that's not what we are looking for." They have a viewpoint before they open the Bible and it is not to learn the truth. This is true of women who seek to be evangelists, of homosexuals who seek approval, and of those looking for sports programs or musical entertainment, etc. They lack a love of the truth.

Honesty. When Jesus illustrated the nature of His kingdom as a man sowing seed in a field, He portrayed the seed as the "word of God" and the field as the "honest and good heart" (Luke 8:11-15). Jesus' kingdom is not of this world; it is His rule in the hearts of men by the word of truth (see John 18:36; Luke 17:20-21). To receive this truth and submit to this rule, men and women must be honest. They must have open and receptive hearts.

The rejection of God's kingdom by the Jews resulted from "closed" eyes that could not see the truth, "dull" ears that would not hear the truth, and "hardened" hearts that refused to receive the truth (see Matt 13:13-15).

Diligent study, love of truth, and honest hearts are prerequisites for any student who seeks the truth. To fail in these is to fail in the search for eternal life.

Take your mind back 2,000 years to a hazy, foggy garden. The scene unfolds in the darkness of night... the night when all of creation focused on this solitary setting outside of Jerusalem. The scripture simply says, "When Jesus had spoken these words, He went forth with His disciples over the brook Cedron, where was a garden, into the which He entered, and His disciples," (John 18:1). It was in this garden, on this night, that momentous decisions had to be made. Particularly was this true for Jesus. Before His was the awesome shadow and horrid specter of the cross. Would He go to the tree or would He accept the help of the angels who stood poised to rush to His aid and rescue Him from death?

And though we don't often consider it, the apostles faced a decision that night as well. And just what was the nature of their decision? Was it like the decision facing a man who is about to lose the business of his dreams, sweat, and labor? Was it like the decision facing a husband who is struggling to decide whether to leave his wife and children though he knows he should not? Was it like the decision of the woman who has decided that life is not worth living and has her hand on a bottle of pills with which she can extinguish her life? Was their decision of this magnitude? No, they were faced with the monumental decision as to whether or not they would take a nap!

Jesus had said, "Watch with Me," (Matthew26:38). And yet, while He agonized over what was to transpire in the forthcoming hours, they slept. And although Luke offers a word in their defense, nothing that they were "sleeping for sorrow," (Luke 22:45), the fact remains that Jesus said, "What could you not watch with me one hour?" (Matthew 26:40).

What's the point to all of this? Simply that we are faced with identical choices yet today. "Watch with Me," Jesus says. With Him there is forgiveness, fellowship and a future. No one else can offer you these precious possessions. But on the other hand, there are the "one hour" diversions and indulgences which draw us away from the Lord. Every act of dishonesty, every act of immorality, every lie, every word of gossip, every gratification of every illicit lust, is but for an "hour." Sin, all sin, and its accompanying "pleasure" is but for a "season," (Hebrews 11:25).

"Watch with Me." Is that really too much to ask? After all, He has healed us, taught us, forgiven us, blessed us, and died for us. Is there any "one hour" distraction or indulgence that offers more?
