The Challenges of Love

<u>You can love someone</u>, *even if you don't approve of their conduct*. Challenging? Yes. But if you have really taken the attitude of Christ to heart, you can love someone even if you don't approve of their actions. There is no higher model of this than God himself, who loved people who were ruining their lives by their sin. "While we were still sinners," God's love for us took redemptive direction. Yes, we can love those who are living in sin. (And, we will never reach them and help them without love.)

You can love someone, even if they hate you. Now, we go beyond just generic sin. When you are hated by someone, the devil wants to use that conflict – to pull you down into the pit of bitterness. When you discover someone hates you, the devil also discovers it and the devil will seek to pull you down into the pit of bitterness. In that pit, there is nothing good for you. There is no real satisfaction. There is no sweet revenge. There is only the ruin of bitterness and malice. Read Matthew 5:43-47. Jesus makes it clear, and all of Scripture makes it clear: hating people doesn't change people, but it certainly changes us. Hate is the plaque of the brain. And the only surgery to remove it is repentance. Hate doesn't really make you feel better. It doesn't help anyone. It brings no benefit. Jesus said – just don't do it.

You can love someone, even if they are better than you. There is something called Envy. Now, look back on that familiar page (1 Corinthians 13). Love does not envy. Socrates said, "Envy is the daughter of pride, the author of murder and revenge, the begetter of secret sedition, the perpetual tormenter of virtue. Envy is the filthy slime of the soul; a venom, a poison, a quick-silver, which consumeth the flesh and drieth up the marrow of the bones."Webster says that envy is "chagrin or discontent at the excellence or good fortune of another; resentful, begrudging."The Bible says, "A sound heart is the life of the flesh: but envy the rottenness of the bones" (Proverbs 14:30). The writer of Proverbs also said envy is worse than wrath and anger (Proverbs 27:4). You cannot have envy in you, alongside the love, the agape, of 1 Corinthians 13.

You can love someone, even if they are different from you. A different

color, different culture, different background, different economic status, different education, different looks, habits and interests. The earlier we learn this, the better – as Christians, together in the body of Christ – we are not all the same! Same faith. Same hope. Same allegiance to the same Savior. God wants us to love each other anyway. Read the chapter that comes right before 1 Corinthians 13 (see 1 Corinthians 12:12-26).

You can love someone, even if you are better. Now, comparing yourself to someone, with a competitive spirit – *is not a recommended mode of thought*.

If you look at people, and immediately think comparatively – and focus on how much better you are ... that isn't a spiritually healthy mode of thinking. I can't recommend you develop that habit of thought - where you compare yourself to others, and then think highly of yourself, because you are better. In the New Testament - that kind of immature perspective is described and condemned (Romans 12:3-8, 16). This is written to instill in us, humility and patience and - to see ourselves, not in comparison to others. But rather, in proportion to our faith. "Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly. Never be wise in your own sight." The challenge here is – even if you think you are better than someone, don't be haughty and let that thought keep you from loving "the inferior." The self-interests of comparative and competitive view of people can hinder your capacity to love people.

If I'm actually better than someone, hate will only make me worse, not better. 1 Corinthians 13 tells me, love is not arrogant; is not rude; is patient. When I apply 1 Corinthians 13 to my heart – and when I imitate my Father – I'm able to love people, even if, in fact, I am better.

"Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hope all things, endures all things." (1 Corinthians 13:4-7).

God Is Everywhere

Only twelve people have been able to successfully travel to the moon. Only three people have been able to reach the bottom of the Mariana Trench, the deepest spot on the ocean floor. There have been more people on the moon than on the bottom of the ocean!

From this we see that there are limitations in what we are able to do and where we are able to go. For us to be able to travel to the moon and reach the bottom of the ocean takes huge effort and resources. But with God that is not the case! There are no limitations to where God is able to be. He is omni-present. He is able to be everywhere all the time. He is able to see and keep record of all we do!

Consider several verses that announce this truth: "Where can I go from Your Spirit? Or where can Iflee from Your presence? If I ascend into heaven, You are there; If I make my bed in hell, behold, You are there. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there Your hand shall lead me, and Your right hand shall hold me."

- Psalm 139:7-10

"The eyes of the LORD are in every place, keeping watch on the evil and the good."

- Proverbs 15:3

"And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are open and laid bare to the eyes of Him with whom we have to do."

- Hebrews 4:13

The omni-presence of God should impact us in two ways:

First, this reality should comfort us. The fact that God is able to be everywhere all the time means that there is never a moment when He is not with us (Matthew 28:20). There may be times when people leave us and forsake us, but God never will (2Timothy 4:16-17). Even though we can't see God with the naked eye (because He is spirit according to John 4:24), He is there. Even though He dwells in heaven (John 14:2), His presence is always with us. He sees what we are doing; He hears our prayers; He is fully capable of helping us in our lives.

Second, this reality should also put some godly fear in our hearts. Since God is capable of being everywhere and is watching all we do, that means there is nothing we can hide from Him. He knows the words we speak, the things we are watching, and how we are treating others. God is aware of all we do and He will hold us accountable for our actions (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). This is something Joseph understood while living as a slave in Egypt (Genesis 39:9). Unfortunately, Ananias and Sapphira had to learn this the hard way (Acts 5:1-11).

The fact that God is able to be everywhere and see all is just another quality He possesses that makes Him so great! The challenge for us is to be mindful of this all the time. If we are constantly aware of the presence of God, we will be lifted up in our dark moments and ever mindful of how our actions impact our relationship with Him.
