Seeking for...Recognition

"Take heed that you do not do your charitable deeds before men, to be seen by them. Otherwise you have no reward from your Father in heaven" (Matthew 6:1).

Nothing tests our character more than having to choose between motives. When there is a good deed to be done, for example, our character is tested: will we do it simply to glorify God or will we do it "to be seen by men"? That is a hard choice — much harder than most of us are willing to admit.

Praise itself is not evil, of course, but there's no denying that it has the potential to hurt us. Indeed, it's a rare person who can receive more than a moderate amount of recognition and not have his or her attitude marred by it. That doesn't stop us from wanting it, however. As Norman Vincent Peale once said, "Most of us would rather be ruined by praise than saved by criticism."

As for our motives, it's hard to be honest as to what they really are. The desire to be noticed and recognized as having done something good can be so subtle that it can be our real motive at times when we would say that it isn't. In a given situation, it's difficult to see when the thing that we really want is to be praised.

Perhaps it is stating it too strongly to say that we want "to be seen by men." But what about that word "recognized"? A little appreciative attention is an intoxicating thing. Once we've experienced it, even as children, it's easy for that to become the payoff that we seek (be truthful now!) in every transaction thereafter.

The needs of self, including the need to be appreciated, are not unimportant, of course. But God has set up reality such that self's needs are satisfied most fully when we put out priorities elsewhere. Jesus said, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33).

So let's be very honest. Why do we do what we do for God? Do we serve Him as faithfully in private as in public? If no one ever noticed or

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thanked us, would we be content simply to know that God had been glorified? And if so, would we then avoid the opposite sin: being privately smug, knowing that we are "big" enough to do what's right even though nobody appreciates us?

"I cannot say 'Thine is the glory' if I am seeking my own glory first" (Anonymous).

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Swearing

"Again you have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform your oaths to the Lord. But I say to you, do not swear at all: neither by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by the earth, for it is His footstool; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Nor shall you swear by your head, because you cannot make one hair white or black. But let your 'Yes' be 'Yes,' and your 'No,' 'No.' For whatever is more than these is from the evil one" (Matthew 5:33-37).

God says that to take an oath is a serious matter. For example in Leviticus 19, sometimes called the Holiness Code, the Lord said: "And you shall not swear by My name falsely, nor shall you profane the name of your God: I am the LORD" (Leviticus 19:12). Twin themes, holiness and love, were to define God's people as HIS people-people who acted toward their Creator and toward each other in honorable ways. Israelite society would be disrupted if its members did not tell the truth. If God is indeed LORD, then His people, in the Old Testament and now, must be people of honesty. Scribal and Pharisaical distortions of the Law allowed for swearing or the taking of an oath as long as one did not invoke the name of God; since God was not a party to the oath, it was not too serious if the oath was broken. Is that, though, how kingdom citizens act?

Jesus says: Don't swear at all! Why? Kingdom citizens are those who always tell the truth. When they say yes, they mean yes. When they say no, they mean no. An oath or invoking the name of God as witness to one's words is not necessary. Neither is it necessarily wrong. But if you invoke the name of the Lord, you need to make doubly sure as to what you are saying or vowing. "Do not be rash with your mouth, And let not your heart utter anything hastily before God. For God is in heaven, and you on earth; Therefore let your words be few" (Ecclesiastes 5:2).

Let us remember that Jesus expects kingdom citizens to be beyond the norm of the day. "For I say to you, that unless your righteousness exceeds the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:20). Pharisees particularly, and others, might be known for their "righteousness" but kingdom citizens rise to a higher ethic. True values of the kingdom do not seek to circumvent any aspect of God's law. Rather we need the true desire to obey not only the letter of the law as we imbibe the intent of God's will.

Philo, an early Jewish writer, spoke about the "evil habits of swearing incessantly and thoughtlessly about ordinary matters where there is nothing at all in dispute" (Decalogue, 92). Evidently, using God's name in vain, swearing (invoking the name of the Lord in light or frivolous ways), or just downright vulgarity is nothing new. OMG is on the lips of people constantly. In this kind of world—a world of filth—as kingdom citizens we have the responsibility and the opportunity to let our lights shine. As this world becomes darker, more than ever, do we need to let our lights shine. Don't dim your light by your yeas and nays.
