Submit To One Another

Several years ago at a meeting of the American Psychological Association, Jack Lipton, a psychologist at Union College, and R. Scott Builione, a graduate student at Columbia University, presented their findings on how members of the various sections of 11 major symphony orchestras perceived each other.

The percussionists were viewed as insensitive, unintelligent, and hard-of-hearing, yet fun-loving. String players were seen as arrogant, stuffy, and unathletic. The orchestra members overwhelmingly chose "loud" as the primary adjective to describe the brass players. Woodwind players seemed to be held in the highest esteem, described as quiet and meticulous, though a bit egotistical.

Interesting findings, to say the least! One wonders, especially one with no musical ability, how fifty or so divergent personalities and perceptions, with over twenty different musical instruments, could ever come together to make such wonderful music!?

Yet the answer is simple: regardless of how those musicians view each other, they subordinate their feelings and biases to the leadership of the conductor. Under his guidance, they play beautiful music.

Success in a group effort always requires mutual submission of each individual for the good of the group. This is true in business, in sports and in the Lord's family. The Bible teaches that in our spiritual relationships we must learn to submit to one to another according to the will of God.

"Likewise you younger people, submit yourselves to your elders. Yes, all of you be submissive to one another, and be clothed with humility, for "God resists the proud, But gives grace to the humble." (1 Pet 5:5)

"Obey those who rule over you, and be submissive, for they watch out for your souls, as those who must give account. Let them do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you" (Heb 13:17)

"Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ" (Ephesians 5:21).

The word "submit" according to Thayer means: 1) to arrange under,

to subordinate 2) to subject, to put in subjection 3) to subject oneself, to obey 4) to submit to one's control 5) to yield to one's admonition or advice 6) to obey, to be subject." He goes on to point out that it was "a Greek military term meaning "to arrange [troop divisions] in a military fashion under the command of a leader." In non-military use, it was "a voluntary attitude of giving in, cooperating, assuming responsibility, and carrying a burden".

It is interesting that the admonition to "submit to one another" in Ephesians 5:21 precedes Paul's command for wives to submit to their husbands, which is followed by children obeying the parents and slaves being in submission to their Masters. It is obvious in those cases there is a God given role in terms of authority.

But how do we submit to one another, especially a husband to a wife, or a parent to a child, or a master to a slave?

Submission has to do with meeting the needs of another. Of serving others. Of engaging in mutual ministry. It makes no difference where the authority is vested, nor does it lessen the responsibility to respect authority in a specific relationship.

Jesus has been given all authority. Yet He came to serve the needs of others. And ultimately gave Himself to die for our sins. God gave Pastors the role of authority in the local church to "feed the flock. However, they are servant-leaders, meeting the needs of those entrusted to their care. God ordained the husband to be the head of the home. Yet, he lovingly serves the needs of his wife and children. In the same way, Christians must be willing to subordinate their own feelings and desires for the greater good within the Body of Christ.

Colly Caldwell put this way "We must submit to our fellow Christians," We can all learn from any fellow Christian. We can be corrected by any Christian. It is the selfish, insecure follower of Christ who cannot recognize God's arrangements for peace and well being and who insists upon his own will."

In a "me first" culture, this command seems outdated. Yet, when properly followed, it would solve many of our relationship conflicts in the 21st century.

Why Stop The Chariot?

Acts 8:26-39 records the conversion of the Ethiopian treasurer. Verse 38 makes some things stand out: "And he commanded the chariot to stand still..." Has it occurred to you that if some things men today say are true, it would have been entirely unnecessary for this man to stop the chariot? Explore this with me.

If just being a good, honest person is all that it takes. The man must have been a good, honest man to have the job that he did - "...under Candace queen of the Ethiopians, who had the charge of all her treasure..." (Acts 8:27). No need to stop the chariot if just being a person of integrity is all that it takes to please God and go to Heaven.

If just being religious is enough. The Ethiopian was a religious man. He "...had come to Jerusalem for to worship" (Acts 8:27), a distance of nearly 1,000 miles one way! Most people would think a fellow like that would already be saved. Why stop the chariot?

If just reading the Scriptures is all that is required. The man was a Scripture-reading man. He was reading Isaiah 53 out loud (Acts 8:28-34). Some think they read the Bible and no more is really necessary. If that be true, why stop the chariot?

If just hearing preaching saves. True, "...it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save..." (1 Corinthians1:21). The Ethiopian heard preaching as "Philip...preached unto him Jesus" (Acts 8:35). Some hear a lot of preaching, but do no more. Not this man!

If justified by faith only. The Ethiopian had faith. He confessed, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 8:37). If justified by faith only, why not keep the chariot wheels rolling down the Gaza road

If baptism is not necessary for salvation. Most have been made to believe baptism is not essential to salvation. Please tell us why then did the man of Ethiopia command the chariot to stand still and be baptized, if that be true?

If saved by praying "the sinner's prayer." Many have been made to think that to be saved they just need to pray a prayer like this: "Lord, I confess to You my sins. I accept You into my heart as my personal Lord and Savior." Why stop the chariot, if saved this way?

If sprinkling or pouring are sufficient. If sprinkling or pouring of a little water upon the person will substitute for immersion of the whole person in water, why do we read, "...he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him. And when they were come up out of the water..." (Acts 8:38-39)?

Let me suggest to you that due to the shortness and uncertainty of life (Proverbs 27:1; Luke 12:16-20; James 4:13-15), the value of your soul (Matthew 16:26), the fact that judgment is coming (Acts 24:25), and you must obey the Lord to be saved (Matthew 7:21; Hebrews 5:9) that you need to stop the chariot. Did you observe who stopped the chariot? It wasn't the preacher. It was the man who needed to obey the Lord. You are the one who must stop the chariot. There is an urgency about obeying the gospel as this record shows. Now is the time to stop the chariot. "...behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2).


VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL: The date for our Vacation Bible School has been set for **July 17-20** for this year. Mark your calendars and begin planning for this week.
