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A Mother's Love

"As one whom his mother comforts, so I will comfort you; and you shall be comforted in Jerusalem" (Isaiah 66:13). We are watched over by a God whose love for us is the uniquely tender love of a mother for her children. Within the Trinity of God's divine being there is to be found the perfect summation of all of the qualities that were divided between masculinity and femininity at our creation (Genesis 1:26-27). The complementary nature of men and women in our world is a reflection of the perfect communion that exists within the triune personality of God's own being. Thus none of the unique endowments of men and women are insignificant. Each has its counterpart in God's character, and each needs to be taken seriously in our own character and in our own interactions with others.

Nowhere is this more apparent than in the matter of love. The familiar texts that speak of God as having a father's love are complemented by those that describe the divine love in motherly terms. The fatherliness of God's love is perfected by its motherliness.

If God loves us with a mother's love, this is more than a theoretical point. In day-to-day practice, we should not fail to have the same kind of love for one another. Even Paul, the strong soldier of the faith, understood the need for **tender** love. To the church in Thessalonica, he wrote, "But we were gentle among you, just as a nursing mother cherishes her own children. So, affectionately longing for you, we were well pleased to impart to you not only the gospel of God, but also our own lives, because you had become dear to us" (1 Thessalonians 2:7-8).

A mother is able to touch her children with a special tenderness because she **understands** them in a special way. God's perfect love for us, of course, is possible because of an infallible understanding of our hearts, and we shall not be able to reach that level of empathy for one another. What we certainly can do, however, is to make a more conscious **effort** to understand the kinds of things a mother understands – and to love accordingly. If we seek God, we will seek to love as God loves. In our love and in our dealings with God's children, we will include not only the productiveness of a father, but the tenderness and insight of a mother. "A

mother understands what a child does not say" (Jewish Proverb).

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Are We Outdated?

The idea that the "Church of Christ" is shrinking in our present society is a common thought. One writer focused on the poor model of churches today that seek to continue in the same methods and practices that they have always focused on. He points out that churches are continuing in a pattern that not only fails to attract the lost but loses the young church members as well.

It is true that research shows the "churches of Christ" are declining in their attendance rather than growing. (Research also shows that the number of Christians who attend any congregation are declining). The author blames the shrinking church on such things as classes that seek to prove points rather than transform disciples, the refusal to leave a print media based mindset, focusing on traditional sermons, etc. It is suggested that a younger digital generation fails to be attracted by the traditional approach (1880s based according to the the author).

The suggestion is made to change the climate of the church in order to attract more members and keep the next generation—a generation attracted to YouTube and gaming. Those suggestions included using videos throughout the assembly, using a three projection screen setup with only one featuring the message and the other two screens rotating images and video, dimming the lights to brighten the stage area, using testimonials and interviews, and using pre-worship and post-worship recorded music similar to that in a movie theatre.

Is there anything wrong with changing the number of screens, the lighting, or other parts of our assembly? No. There is nothing inherently wrong or sinful with those actions. **But** (you knew there was one coming) there is something disturbing about this approach. The problem is that all of these changes are intended to appeal to the senses—man's senses or things of the flesh.

The changes submitted revolved around the popular trend among religious groups to change practices to

satisfy men. What is more important to many than truth is that the spirit is invoked and inspired. A high priority is placed on making sure the assembly is entertaining and enjoyable.

Before we point fingers at other religious groups as being the guilty parties, the reality is we can be just as tempted to adapt and change our patterns to attract more attendees. We must be careful we are not lured in by this temptation—many have been.

Those seeking to change the church want to emphasize the religious experience more important than the spiritual fellowship—specifically of the flesh and eyes. Oh sure, no one wants to admit that. This is all done in the name of being "more spiritual." But if our religious experience is patterned after appealing to people in the same way that XBox, YouTube, and television, then I wonder what Paul might say... Perhaps, "What! Do you not have houses to play, watch, and be entertained in?" (1 Corinthians 11:22).

Let's be careful that we aren't offering "strange fire" to God in an effort to attract people to the church (Leviticus 10).
