# How Does The Holy Spirit Lead?

The Holy Spirit leads the alien sinner to become a child of God (John 16:7-11). He also leads the Christian in living a godly life (Romans 8:14).

The question concerns how he leads. Does he lead individual sinners apart from the gospel by subjective feelings, urgings and experiences? Does He then lead Christians in similar ways apart from the written word? The answer to both questions is no!

In times past the Holy Spirit always spoke to the masses through selected individuals - the Old Testament prophets. In our time, He speaks to the masses through selected individuals - the New Testament apostles and prophets (Ephesians 3:1-5). Today, saints and sinners alike who are lead by the Holy Spirit are lead by the New Testament, God's written words as revealed by the Holy Spirit to the New Testament apostles and prophets (1) Corinthians 2:7-16). To say otherwise is to deny plain passages and to deny the all-sufficiency of the gospel (2 Peter 1:3; Romans 1:16). Such a view also denies Jesus' promise to His apostles that He would guide then into all truth (John 16:13). This false doctrine of personal guidance of the Holy Spirit apart from the written word also denies the apostles' claim that Jesus kept his promise to reveal all truth to them (cf. 2 Timothy 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:3; Jude 3).

Those who claim a personal guidance of the Holy Spirit through their feelings, urges or experience can never find a passage to support their claim. Such people not only contradict the teaching of God's word, they also contradict each other, making the Holy Spirit speak out of both sides of His mouth telling one person one thing and another one something else. While many politicians of our time are skilled in such matters we must remember that it is impossible for God to lie and that he is not the author of division or confusion (1 Corinthians 1:10; 14:33).

The Holy Spirit is a speaking Spirit who always leads by His words (2 Samuel 23:2; Acts 1:16; 1 Timothy 4:1; Revelation 2:7,11,17,29; 3:6,13,22). He always revealed God's word to selected individuals only. It then became their task to make God's will be known to the masses by their speaking and by their writings. In the past through Noah (2 Peter 2:5; 1 Peter 3:18-20). Moses (John 1:17); the Prophets (Hebrews 1:1); Nehemiah 9:30; (2 Peter 1:21); John the Baptist (Luke 1:15; Mark 1:4; Luke 1:26,30). Now through the Apostles (John 14:26; 16:13; Mark 16:1; Matthew 28:19; Acts 2:1-4); in the written word (Ephesians 3:1-5; 1 Corinthians 14:37).

Acts 2 serves as a perfect example of such divine leadership of the Holy Spirit. He guided Peter to speak to the crowd. The Holy Spirit thus led the people through Him to believe and obey the gospel. After becoming God's in Christ, they continue to be lead by the Holy Spirit through the apostles' teaching (Acts 2:42).

# David and the Shewbread

Okay, let's try this one more time and see if we can get it straight. We continue to hear folks, even some Christians, who would like to use Jesus' reference to David and the shewbread as a justification for a kind of 'situation ethics' reasoning.

Do you remember the incident (Matthew 12:1-8)? On a Sabbath day the disciples had passed through a field and gathered some grain to eat. The old law allowed such gathering (it was not stealing). But the Pharisees criticized them as doing that which was "unlawful". Their complaint was about the 'work' involved in gathering the grain. While not forbidden by the law of Moses, the Jews had invented certain traditions which prohibited this.

In response to this criticism by the Pharisees, Jesus said: "Have ye not read what David did, when he was an hungered, and they that were with him; how he entered into the house of God, and did eat the shewbread, which was not lawful for him to eat, neither for them which were with him, but only for the priests?" (vs. 3,4). He went on to rebuke the Pharisees for "condemning the guiltless" (vs. 7).

The point here is clear. The Jews regarded David as their great national hero. In the matter of the shewbread, David sinned. (We must take Jesus at His word; David's deed was "not lawful".) The Pharisees overlooked this clearly sinful act. But, in the case of Jesus' disciples, they criticized something that was not wrong (notice that Jesus said it left them "guiltless"). Jesus was simply pointing out the inconsistency of the Pharisees in this matter.

And so, we have here no justifica-tion for any 'situation ethics' type of reasoning. Jesus was not holding up David as a worthy example. He was not saying that the law can be broken under extreme circumstances. He was not justifying the disciples in a sinful deed. He was pointing out the hypocrisy of the religious leaders of His day. Learn the lesson!
