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Jesus Our Redeemer

Job probably figured things couldn't get any worse after he lost his possessions and children, after his wife's consolation was limited to "curse God and die." And then his "friends" showed up. Not knowing Job's situation any better than they knew the mind of God, they assumed Job's difficulties must have been a curse from God for some wrongdoing on Job's part. Job's refusal to acknowledge any such wrongdoing only convinced them further that he was rebelling against God.

As frustrated as Job was at his friends' superficial explanation, he was even more so at God's failure to provide an accurate one. For chapter after chapter he beseeched God for the method to all the madness in his life. But throughout the ordeal he never questioned that God was in control or that God would eventually come to his defense (as eventually He did, Job 42:7-8). Perhaps the most eloquent statement of faith in all of Job's speeches is in Job 19:25. - "And as for me, I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last He will take His stand on the earth." Since the New Testament nowhere applies this text to Jesus, we must accept the possibility that Job is simply speaking figuratively of the Father here, that God would make His justice known in the presence of Job and his detractors "on the earth". However, since the Father never literally came to earth (and the Son did), we can't rule out the possibility that Job spoke here prophetically of the coming of Jesus, who would "bring forth justice to the nations" and not break the bruised reed or extinguish the dimly burning wick (Isaiah 42:1-3).

The Greek words "lutroo" and "exagorazo," rendered "redeem" in the New Testament, each have reference to financial transactions, where money or goods are exchanged for an item (or more frequently, a person) of value. The second of the two is used metaphorically for taking advantage of opportunities ("redeeming the time" or "making the most of the opportunity") in Ephesians 5:16 and Colossians 4:5. The point is this: Satan is in possession of something God wants – a human – soul; the price necessary to "redeem" the soul is the blood of His Son on the cross; God willingly pays that price so that anyone who wishes can be freed from Satan's rule.

As despicable as Job's physical state may have been, it pales when we consider the spiritual state of a soul separated from his God. We were slaves of sin, laboring day-in and day-out with only our inevitable wages waiting for us (Romans 6:18-23). But much as a man could purchase the freedom of a slave during Bible times, so Jesus "redeemed" us, paying with His own blood (1 Peter 1:18-19). We have a new Master now, and a new wage to look forward to – eternal life.

The New Testament particularly refers to the redemption process in reference to the Law of Moses. Prior to the gospel, the only remedy available for sin for the people of God was the perfect keeping of ordinances. The system itself guaranteed our disaster – not through any fault of the Law itself, but rather through our own fault as imperfect law keepers. Paul writes for us in Galatians 3:13, "Christ redeemed us from the curse for us" (see Galatians 4:4-5). His point is that such teaching returns its followers to a system that was ultimately ineffective in reconciling them to their God, a system Jesus gave His life on the cross to replace.

We are not left to do the best we can under a system of reconciliation that depends wholly and futilely on ourselves. We have been redeemed. Jesus' blood gives people of faith (like Job) the confidence that our toil is not in vain in the Lord (1 Corinthains 15:58) – the confidence that He recognizes and appreciates our efforts in His cause. The missteps that previously would have merely added fetter to fetter in Satan's dungeon now can be forgiven when we confess our sins and rededicate ourselves to a life worthy of the sacrifice made on our behalf.

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Trapped But Not Bound

Several years ago I had the opportunity to go to a nursing home every Saturday morning with a group of Christians and sing, pray, and teach God's Word with a number of the residents. One week, we were studying Acts 16 and our particular focus was upon Paul and Silas being imprisoned in Philippi. I read vss. 22-25, "And the multitude rose up together against them and the magistrates rent off their clothes, and commanded to beat them. And when they had laid many stripes upon them, they cast them into prison, charging the jailor to keep them safely who, having received such a charge, thrust them into the inner prison, and made their feet fast in the stocks. And at midnight Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God and the prisoners heard them."

As we examined the passage and the situation in which Paul and Silas found themselves, I made the point that their actions served to illustrate that, as children of God, we can have joy no matter our circumstances.

Looking at the crowd gathered to study with us, I noticed one older woman. She was bent over, obviously unable to straighten her body. She could barely lift her head. Yet when I mentioned that circumstances do not control the true joy of a Christian, she smiled and nodded her head as best as she could.

As I looked at her, I could not help but compare her with Paul and Silas. Here was an older woman, trapped in a wheelchair by a body that would no longer function as it used to. I thought of her childhood and imagined the way she used to run and play as the wind blew through her hair. I thought of her as a young woman, beautiful and so full of promise. Perhaps she was married and raised children. But now, her time was drawing near and her body would not permit her to engage in the physical things she used to do. She was trapped but not bound.

Nursing homes are paradoxical. I have spent much time in them over the years and have witnessed some of the saddest scenes I could ever imagine. At the same time, I have learned wonderful lessons about what it means to have our citizenship in heaven and our souls anchored there. So many older brothers and sisters in Christ, trapped in bodies that just would not function properly, have held my hand, smiled, and helped me to understand just exactly what Paul meant when he wrote, "For I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us" (Romans 8:18).

Whatever happens to our bodies—accident, sickness, or just the cumulative effects of age—may entrap us physically but the spirit of the faithful Christian cannot be bound.

When Nothing Else Matters

It was not the obligation or duty of Jesus to die for us. His sacrifice was wholly a matter of love. It is His incomprehensive willingness to love the unlovable that staggers the mind. A love publicly manifested by His giving up heaven's glory to enter a hostile and sinful world as a man rejected and condemned to die unjustly. The innocent for the guilty, to set them free, forever declares His humiliation and voluntary sacrifice on our behalf.

There are only two reasons that love motivated Jesus to sacrifice Himself on our behalf. Namely, His love for God and His love for God's creation – nothing else mattered (Hebrews 10:5-7). We must understand this, without that sacrifice it is impossible! Nothing else mattered in His love but God and people – not His physical comforts (Luke 9:58); not His personal preferences (Matthew 26:42); not even His intense longing to be with His Father in Heaven, apart from going to the cross (Luke 5:16).

Only when nothing else matters but God and people will God's people come to know the true meaning of sacrifice. Until then, the work of the local church will suffer want at the hands of physical comforts, personal preferences and longing to be elsewhere. We are not called to duty or convenience but to conviction and sacrifice that willingly serves through love. "And He said to all, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me...No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:23,62). If we learn to sacrifice because nothing else matters but God and people, then our light will always shine.


NURSING HOME SINGING: Remember the singings on Tuesday evening at 5:30 at Athens Health & Rehabilation.
