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Wait On The Lord

The phrase in the Old Testament for dealing with the complexities and challenges of life is to "wait on the Lord." The Psalmist spoke to his own soul in the face of life's injustices saying, "My soul, wait silently for God alone, for my expectation is from Him" (Psalm 62:1,5). We cannot grow tired or weary of doing right nor can we grow impatient with the world and decide to run ahead of God to accomplish something for Him — we must learn to wait on the Lord.

The impatience of Israel is seen as they turned their heart from depending on God; to worshipping the golden calf (Exodus 32); to complaining about food and water (Exodus 15:22-25; 16:1-17); or to consuming the quail without proper preparation (Numbers 11). Recalling such events, the Psalmist declared, "They soon forgot His works; they did not wait for His counsel, but lusted exceedingly in the wilderness, and tested God in the desert. And he gave them their request..." (Psalm 106:13). Yes, God gave them the cravings of their impatient heart but it ended in sickness, premature death and greater disappointment.

Life is difficult at times for all of us. At times it would be easier to "give up" or "give in" to the pressures of life. However, in the end the immediate relief we sought would not work for our good. Waiting on God is being able to see the end from the beginning (Hebrews 11:23-27).

Even in the New Testament we are encouraged not to grow weary but to wait on God. Yet, such instructions come to us with greater assurance for our salvation. Namely, Christ, who bore our sorrows and griefs, is in heaven making intercession for us, as we draw near to God's throne in prayer. "Therefore He is also able to save to the utter most those who come to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them" (Hebrews 7:25). Remember Jesus encourages us to pray and not grow weary. It is through earnest prayer that we learn to wait on God and consider the end of all (Luke 18:1-7).

To wait on God takes faith and courage. We must remember in His time. God will right the wrongs and punish the evil (Ecclesiastes 3:11). As we live by faith, we have this blessed assurance that "those who wait

on the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up on wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint" (Isaiah 40:31).

What does Satan use to draw us away from serving the Everlasting God? He may use possessions or something entirely different, but in the end is it really a good deal?

In Mark 8:36 Jesus reminds his followers never to sell out: "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" He reminds us that to give in to Satan is to forfeit our eternal souls for temporary pleasures. Don't let Satan fool you into thinking he has a good deal. Don't sell out for so little! Place your trust, your hope, and your very soul in the hands of our loving Father in heaven who has promised and proven that He will richly reward His servants.!

Life Is Not Fair!

Sitting on a grassy hillside with his long hair pulled back and tied in a ponytail, a nineteen-year-old thinker munched on his organically grown fruit and contemplated life. This same ritual had been going on for three days, a ritual initiated by the sudden departure of the girl he loved. He thought about the lower middleclass family to which he had been born, putting him at a distant economic disadvantage as compared to his peers. He thought about the low grade he received in his marketing class, and he had struggled for that. The guy who sat behind him in class never passed a test, but somehow pulled a "B" in the course. At the beginning of the semester, he was fortunate enough to receive one of the more desirable student employment positions on campus. Just two days earlier, his supervisor told him that he would lose the job the next semester because "somebody's nephew" wanted it.

On the third day, late in the afternoon, this young man finally spoke. He had arrived at his conclusion on life, and he was prepared to state his profound observation. "Life is not fair."

Which is the greater wonder? That a nineteen-yearold would arrive at such a conclusion on life? Or that this young man had lived nineteen years without ever realizing this truth?

Life is not fair. God never said it would be. In a sin-cursed world, it cannot be. The preacher said, "There is something else meaningless that occurs on earth: righteous men who get what the wicked deserve, and wicked men who get what the righteous deserve" (Ecclesiastes 8:14). Jesus made His own comment of life's unfairness when he observed, "He causes His sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous" (Matthew 5:45). While living in opposition to the gospel, Saul of Tarsus had a fairly comfortable life. After he committed his life to preaching the gospel of Jesus, he suffered beatings, imprisonment, stoning, shipwreck, hunger and other severities of life. And so it has been with many other Christians through the centuries. It may not be fair -but it's life. God's promise is, "in the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Life is not fair. But keep in mind, that's not all bad. When this life is over, and I stand before the judgment seat of Christ, I do not want what is fair, I want grace.
