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# Why Should I Be Patient?

"Be still and know that I am God: I will be exalted among the heathen, I will be exalted in the earth" (Psalm 46:10).

The psalmist writes to console the hearts of those that are troubled. At a time when trouble is all around, we need to be patient and trust in the Lord. God tells us that in such times, we need to "Be still and know that I am God." There are times in life that we must be patient and wait on the Lord. Why is this? In James 5:7-11, James gives us three reasons why we need to be patient and wait on the Lord.

- 1. Because God Is In Control. James writes, "Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh" (James 5:8). Three times in James 5:7-11, James mentions the Lord is coming back. First, we may wonder why this would be mentioned in connection with patience? But as we consider this, it must be quickly recognized that the second coming of Christ is the ultimate proof that God is in control. Jesus said of the second coming, "of that day and hour knoweth no man, not the angels of heaven, but my Father" (Matthew 24:36). It matters not about the headlines and what is happening on Wall Street, because God is in control. We are moving toward a climax; the return of Christ. When? No one knows, but God is in control. So in my personal life, when it seems that everything is coming unraveled at the seams, remember God is in control.
- 2. Because God Rewards Patience. James reminds us that patience pays. Notice "Behold, we count them happy which endure" (James 5:11a). It is much more profitable to be patient than impatient. Patience will bring you honor in the eyes of others, your personal relationships will be stronger if patience is built into the character of your life. Jesus, in the sermon on the mount, states that there are eternal blessings as you exhibit patience when people mistreat you, or falsely accuses you and misrepresents you (Matthew 5:13-14). Remember, every time you are patient, you are building eternal rewards.
- **3. Because God Is Working It Out.** In James 5:11b, James reminds us of the patience of Job. While Job was patiently waiting, God was working things out. We need to remember this point, as we face an uncontrollable

circumstance, or an unchanging person, or those unexplainable problems, that God is working. Remember what Paul wrote, "All things work together for good, to them that love the Lord and are the called according to His good purpose" (Romans 8:28).

Waiting may be hard and challenging at times, but let us then strive for a deeper and more intense faith. Patience and waiting are a part of faith. Do you believe that God is working while you wait? How can we face problems and calamities of life? Trust in God and do His will in all things, recognizing that God is for us and is working.

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# God Keeps His Promises

"And the Lord visited Sarah as He had said, and the Lord did for Sarah as He had spoken. For Sarah conceived and bore Abraham a son in his old age, at the set time of which God had spoken to him. And Abraham called the name of his son who was born to him—whom Sarah bore to him—Isaac." (Genesis 22:1-3)

Despite all the odds, God came through. Sarah was about 90 years old and Abraham 100 when they heard the refreshing sound of their newborn son crying. They had doubted, wondered, likely wept and schemed for some 25 years waiting for this moment. With each passing day, the promise seemed more and more impossible. And yet, now they had a child.

What promises have been made to you by God? To keep you if you are His (Psalm 37:17)? To forgive you (1 John 1:9)? To give you a home in heaven (1 Peter 1:3-9)? To be there for you in your darkest hours (Psalm 23; Hebrews 13:5)? To provide for you (Matthew 6:33)? To love you (1 Peter 5:7; Psalm 139:10)?

God keeps His word. We are not observers of this story; we are also participants. We have all doubted, wondered, wept and even schemed as well. We've asked, "Does He care?"—to which the Bible responds, "Oh, yes, He cares!" (1 Peter 5:7). We questioned, "Can He do this?" to which His word responds, "With God,

nothing is impossible!" (Luke 1:37). We wonder, "Has He forgotten me?" to which divine scriptures says, "He never forgets!" (1 John 5:14). God may sometimes say, "No, what you ask is not best for you, but I will be with you" to our requests; He may sometimes say, "Wait, this isn't the right time" to our request; He may say, "I've got something better in store for you" to our request; He may say, "You've got to trust Me" to our request. But, God never will say, "Oh, I forgot" or "I'm sorry, that's beyond My power or love for you."

In those hours, days, months or even years when it seems God has forgotten us, our requests or His promises, follow the example of Abraham and Sarah—question, cry, or even stumble from time to time. But, hold on. God always comes through.

"Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6).

Let's apply this to our lives.

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# Weightless

I have been backpacking several times in my life. If you don't know, backpacking is like car camping, only without the car. You carry everything you need on your back several miles into the wilderness to get the full experience of solitude and adventure. I enjoy almost everything about backpacking—except for when you begin to feel like you're lugging bags of concrete up the mountainside. Like the time my brother and I hiked 4 miles straight uphill one evening on empty stomachs, not knowing if we would make it to the campsite before nightfall—after already having hiked 10 miles that day. Not fun.

Sometimes life feels like that. You're carrying around so much heavy baggage that you feel it would be easier to just sit down and give up. It could be the pressure of daily life that weighs down on you. Maybe it's concern for a sick loved one whose physical, emotional, or spiritual needs you've been caring for. Perhaps it's financial

worry or the stress of working in a spiritually taxing environment that burdens you. Or it could be that you're dragging the guilt of your past sins behind you. Over time, this weight can pile up to create a feeling of helplessness and despair.

Thankfully, our God cares so much that he offers to lift that burden off our shoulders. David wrote: "Cast your burden upon the LORD and He will sustain you; He will never allow the righteous to be shaken" (Psalm 55:22). Scripture assures you He will hear your prayers when you "cast all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7).

If you should question how much God really does care, and how much of your load He is willing to bear for you, think about the cross. Peter says, "And He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed" (1 Peter 2:24). There is no greater burden than sin, but because of His immeasurable love Jesus willingly took it to the cross with him. Not because we deserve it, or that we asked him to. He just did, because He loves you.

This should equip us to likewise "bear one another's burdens, and thereby fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). Anytime we see a brother or sister struggling under a load, we have the strength to help them carry that because God has lifted our own load off.

Do you know what weightless feels like? After laboriously hiking uphill with a 40-pound pack, and after reaching the top you take that weight off—what a relief! Indeed, what a greater relief to cast our burdens onto the Lord!

"Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30).
