"Do Not Fear nor Be Afraid"

"Be strong and of courage, do not fear nor be afraid of them; for the Lord your God, He is the One who goes with you. He will not leave you nor forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6)

Are there things that you fear? Many things in this life cause men to fear or be afraid. Perhaps you are afraid of being alone. Afraid of losing your job. Afraid of failure of some kind in work or a task you set out to do that you cannot control. Afraid of economic collapse. As the people of God, we need to keep things in the context. The children of Israel were reminded by Moses of the promise of God and to "not fear nor be afraid." Why did Moses do this? He did it to remind the people of God not to allow the fears of what is happening around them to mature or develop fear and strangle their relationship with God. There are three things Moses tells them to do.

Be Strong and of Good Courage. The children of Israel had been told this by Moses earlier "... that you may be strong, and go in and possess the land which you cross over to possess" (Deuteronomy 11:8). Moses gives the reminder again in inaugurating Joshua to be the leader, "Be strong." As the children of Israel are preparing to enter the land, God tells Joshua, "Be strong and very courageous" (Joshua 1:6), and "Be strong and of good courage" (Joshua 1:9). We need to remind ourselves of the great confidence and courage we can have as we serve God and keep our relationship with Him strong. God will provide us with strength and courage, but we must build our faith to be strong. David said, "The Lord is my light and my salvation; Whom shall I fear? The Lord is the strength of my life; Of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1). May we find through prayer, the study of God's word, and meditation of the things we learn to help us to grow in our strength and courage.

The Lord is with You. We need to let this thought sink in deep into our hearts. God is with you. God has declared this in the scriptures time and time again. A few of the scriptures that teach us this:

- "Am I a God near at hand, says the Lord, And not a God afar off?" (Jeremiah 23:23).
- "The Lord is near to all who call upon Him; To all who call upon Him in truth" (Psalm 145:18).
- "...and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).
- "...so that they should seek the Lord, in the hope that they might grope for Him and find Him, though He is not far from each one of us" (Acts 17:27).
- "Let your conduct be without covetousness; be content with such things as you have. For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you.' So we may boldly say: 'The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" (Hebrews 13:5-6).
- "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (James 4:8).

Remember the statements from the word of God. When someone opposes you, when life challenges us, and when we feel fear coming upon us, remember God is there with us.

God Will Be Faithful and Uphold Us. Moses reminds the people of God about His faithfulness and what God had said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." There are times in life when friends and family will let us down. There may be times when a brother or a sister does not stand with us, difficult situations show the character of a man, but God is always there. Remember, the Hebrew writer said, "The Lord is my helper, I will not fear" (13:6). Paul experienced this while in prison with a death sentence said, "At my first defense no one stood with me, but all forsook me...But the Lord stood with me and strengthened me" (2 Timothy 4:16-17a). The scriptures are filled with examples of God's help to His people in all aspects of their lives. God is indeed faithful. God will guide us, lead us, uphold us when we are weak, and will pick us up when we fall.

Many things in life will cause us to doubt and fear, but let us remember these three admonitions that Moses gave the children of Israel. Let's focus on Him as our Savior; Jesus Christ gave us an example. Let us serve God with all the confidence and assurance we can have in Him.

Just Look Around

Mark 9:14-29 tells of an encounter Jesus had with a man whose son was possessed by a terribly violent spirit. This spirit would seize him, throw him down, even into fires, make him foam at the mouth, gnash his teeth, and become rigid (18, 22). Jesus bore witness to this very thing in verse 20. This father begs Jesus to do whatever He can. "Jesus said to him, 'If you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes.' Immediately the father of the child cried out and said with tears, 'Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!" (23-25).

How often have we felt just as this man did? We are reasonably sure there is a God in Heaven, but still wrestle with nagging doubts. Even the staunchest Christian may find himself in need of reassurance when he is surrounded by an abundance of immorality, violence, and humanistic ways. In these moments we must review why we can have an unwavering confidence in God. Just as this father did, we must also ask for help in our unbelief. What can help our unbelief in such circumstances?

Consider the intricacies of the world we live in. This spectacular universe works in perfect harmony. This design declares plainly that there is a designer. It is not logical to consider all these things as being circumstantial and happenstance. Even the earliest and most primitive of mankind looked around and knew there was one higher and mightier than they. They felt compelled to worship and seek this being, though He may have been unknown to them. "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament shows His handiwork. Day unto day utters speech, and night unto night reveals knowledge. There is no speech nor language where their voice is not heard. Their line has gone out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world" (Psalm 19:1-4).

What requires more faith, really? To believe that there is a Supreme Architect who brought these things into reality, or to believe in a cosmic accident that assembled each and every aspect of the universe into perfect order? Friend, "the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness, because what may be known of God is manifest in them, for God has shown it to them. For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead, so that they are without excuse" (Romans 1:18-20).

We can have complete confidence in those things we believe. We need never doubt the existence of God, the accuracy of His holy scriptures, its application to our lives, or the certainty of the judgment to come. All we have to do is look around!

Endure

In December, a group of six men rowed across the Drake Passage—a 500-mile stretch of ocean from the southern tip of South America to the closest point in Antarctica. For 13 days straight, three men would row for 90 minutes while the others tried to rest in the cold and wet, and then they switched for the next 90 minutes. Forty-foot waves continually threatened to capsize the boat, the water temperature was only barely above freezing, and the men were delirious from sleep deprivation when they arrived. And yet, through all of the adversity, they endured. And they are the first men that anyone knows of to cross this particular portion of the world's oceans with only human power.

It is a remarkable story of endurance—one that shows what the human will and body are capable of when trained properly and pushed to their limits. And while it probably sounds utterly impossible [not to mention catastrophically miserable and nearly pointless] to most of us, the simple-sounding concept of endurance is one that is familiar to Bible believers.

Pages upon pages of the New Testament encourage Christians to endure through difficult passages of
