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Two Men with Different Attitudes

"God, be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:13)

In Luke 18, Jesus taught a parable of two men who had gone to the temple to pray. The two men were completely different in their attitude and perhaps in the lives that they had lived before that day. One man was a Pharisee; the text describes them as those who trusted in themselves as being righteous and despising others. The second man was a tax collector. Let us learn about God's mercy and grace in this parable.

The Pharisee. There is no doubt from the text that the Pharisee is filled with great pride and accomplishment in his life. The prayer he prays in the House of God is to inform God of all the good works he was doing and had done. He is thankful for not being an extortioner, unjust, or an adulterer. Indeed, we ought to be thankful for God's grace and His word that we can know how to live a life that pleases God. The Pharisee then points out that he is thankful not to be like the tax collector who was there to pray to God. The Pharisee continues to extol the great virtues in his life to God. God knew the life that he was living. There was no need to pray in such a way, but for others to hear the things he said.

After reading the Pharisee's prayer, it is evident that the Pharisee sees salvation based solely upon his works. There is a need to boast about himself and how deserving he is. There is no room for God's grace in the Pharisee's life. The Pharisee's confidence is misplaced. Yes, we ought to have confidence toward God, but the Pharisee had long past confidence and boasted in his service to God. The sad thing is that he like all men need God's grace, but he thinks God needs him.

The Tax Collector. The tax collector comes to God's House, knowing that mercy can be found there. He knows that he desperately needs God's grace. There is no boasting about his life and the things he had done. He understood that God knew the good and the bad, and his desire was to repent and find forgiveness. The text tells us that he stood "afar off, would not so much as raise his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying

'God be merciful to me a sinner'" (Luke 8:13). The tax collector came to God to receive the forgiveness of sin. He was not interested in justifying his life to God, or anyone else. He knew that his life had not been lived in the way that God would have him to live it. What he was interested in was the justification from God, and that is what he received.

Lessons for Us. From these two starkly, different attitudes are three things we can learn.

- 1. God Honors Humility. There is no doubt that we see the tax collector's humility and the arrogance of the Pharisee. Jesus tells us that the humble man is the one that left the temple justified. Indeed, we need to remember "God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble" (1 Peter 5:5).
- 2. The Problem of Satisfaction. The Pharisee's attitude shows one who was completely satisfied. There were no changes, and he really did not need to do anything else. God has never been pleased with such an attitude. The church at Laodicea in Revelation 3 possessed such a view. Their thought was we "have need of nothing" (Revelation 3:17). Satisfaction can be a real hindrance in our being what God desires. It was for the Pharisee.
- 3. The Great Message of Encouragement. The hope that is seen in this parable cannot be missed. For the one who understands the deep sense of sin and what it has done to the relationship God desires for us, there is great hope to have it restored. God's abundant mercy is available to all who come to Him and change their lives to please Him. The humble, contrite confession and repentance were essential to the tax collector going home justified. God's mercy and grace are plentiful, and He desires for all to be saved. What a great encouragement for us when we fail.

May we truly learn from the attitudes of these two men. When man will love mercy and humbly seek to do God's will, he will receive from God what he needs.

We can just get ready to close the doors. Nobody wants to be a part of a church where the preachers preach the same old thing all the time and are constantly being arrested.

Did you say something, Simon? What did you say? The number is what? The number of men is up to... to... 5,000?!"

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To Be Faithful

"Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" — Revelation 2:10

What exactly does "be faithful" mean? The Greek word for "faithful" is pistos — a person who shows themselves faithful in the transaction of business or execution of commands; can be relied on. When I think of that definition, I immediately think of God. Every day, God is good and faithful to us. Every day, we have God's unfailing love. He can be trusted.

So, how can I be faithful and remain faithful to God? It must be of genuine concern. It's a question those contemplating obedience ask, and even after obedience, the question is still asked. We recognize that the decision to become a Christian is the single most important decision a person can make. But obeying the gospel is only the beginning of a lifelong commitment to God; a launching pad, not a landing pad. When we put God first in our lives, every aspect of our lives will fit in with the goal of obtaining a crown of life when this life is over.

Here are five questions to consider:

- What is the most important thing in your life? If you say God, that's the right answer. But do your actions confirm what you say? Do the two match (Matthew 7:20)?
- What do you think about? What occupies your mind most (Colossians 3:2)? When activities and obligations are not pressing in your life, where do your thoughts gravitate to easily? Spiritual things, or do you have to force yourself to think about God's Word?
- What gives when you face conflicting priorities?

Conflicts are going to happen. What makes the cut when there's a conflict in scheduling? Life is a series of decisions and trade-offs. We want to believe we can do it all, but we can't. We make time for things that are really important to us (Ephesians 5:15-16).

- Where would others say your priorities lie? We don't live life in a vacuum or in a bubble. We all have a circle of influence (Matthew 5:13-16). Other people give us real insight as to where our priorities lie.
- Is there something in your life that keeps you from following Jesus completely? Don't walk away sorrowful like the rich young ruler did (Matthew 19:22). Heaven will be worth any sacrifice we make along the way, I guarantee it.. Trust me, you will never be at peace with God, or yourself, until you do.


