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"Those Who Wait on the Lord"

"But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint."—(Isaiah 40:31)

Waiting is just hard to do. It is contrary to the way life is lived. We live in a world that is always on the fast-track. We train ourselves to hate to wait on anything, but waiting is inevitable. When we look at the Scriptures, we see the great men of faith: Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, and the list could go on, waiting was a part of their lives. Jesus waited thirty years before He began His public ministry. We must learn in our life that there are times we must wait. There is no question that today there is much frustration and impatience due to the virus. However, there is great value in learning to wait.

Why Do We Have To Wait?

To Learn Patience. While we are waiting does not mean that the circumstances will change. However, while we are waiting, we can take time to focus our attention on the One who can help us. There are many things in life that we simply cannot control. At these times, we need to have the patience to wait. David said, "Rest in Lord and wait patiently for Him: do not fret because of him who prospers in his way, because of the man who brings wicked schemes to pass" (Psalm 37:7). God is in control, and we must learn to be patient while He is working. We must remember the Lord's kindness toward us. "Therefore, the Lord will wait, that He may be gracious to you; And therefore He will be exalted, that He may have mercy on you. For the Lord is a God of justice, Blessed are all those who wait for Him" (Isaiah 30:18). Let us learn to be patient to wait.


To Develop Endurance. The life of a Christian is referred to in scripture as a race. In Hebrews 12, "let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:2). In the eleventh chapter, the Hebrew writer recalls those who lived their lives enduring the trials and difficulties as examples for Christians to remember as they live their lives.

To Realize Our Insufficiency. Perhaps one of the most challenging things

for a man to do is to realize his insufficiency. We live our lives, and we may do many things. We are blessed with knowledge and abilities, but we must remember our insufficiency. Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think of anything as being from ourselves, but our sufficiency is from God" (2 Corinthians 3:5). God created us and made us. Isaiah makes this point just before our text as he says, "behold who hath created these things" (Isaiah 40:26). Paul speaking to the men of Athens about God, our Creator said, "for in Him we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). Yes, our sufficiency is of God. "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). Let us wait on the Lord and realize that our sufficiency is in Him.

To Renew Our Strength. Isaiah tells us that those who wait on the Lord will have their strength renewed. The strength from the Lord is that which enables those that wait to not faint. It is those who are humble and recognize their dependence on God, who will be revived in their spiritual lives. They will find the sustaining power for the life they are living for God. Jesus speaks of those that "hunger and thirst after righteousness" being filled (Matthew 5:6). The strengthening comes to those who wait on the Lord. They are given the power to soar in their spiritual life. Let us have faith to wait and receive the strength from God.

Let us wait on the Lord so that we can have a life that soars as the eagles' soar. A life where we shall ever be able to run, and not grow weary and faint. It is dependent on us learning patience, developing endurance, realizing our insufficiency, and receiving the strength from God.



Nip It in the Bud

A close friend recently shared that he spoke to his daughters about their school "nipping" some bad behavior "in the bud." They were puzzled and confused. Apparently, my friend has been slack on his parenting skills and has not shared "The Andy Griffith Show" with his children.

The phrase has its origin in the debudding of plants. The phrase "nip in the bloom" was cited in Henry Chettle's romance Piers Plainnes Seaven Yeres Prentiship in 1595. But most know the phrase "nip it in the bud" because of everyone's favorite deputy, Barney Fife. He famously ranted, "Nip it in the bud! You got to nip it in the bud! … Nip it! You go read any book you want on the subject of child discipline, and you'll find that every one of 'em is in favor of bud-nippin'... Only one way to take care of it."

The reality is that Barney's advice is fantastic for the disciples' approach to sin. Sin should be nipped in the bud. It should be stopped before it ever begins.

James wrote, "But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death" (James 1:14–15). There are several different stages of the process of temptation. At each stage one has the opportunity to avoid sin.

First, there is the lust, or desire, stage. James says people are tempted by their own desires. Those desires were described by John as the lust of the eyes, the lust of the flesh, and the pride of life (1 John 2:15–17). Each person is constantly being bombarded by Satan with desires. Desires that feed the flesh. Desires for things that can be seen. Desires that boost one's confidence and reputation. Sin can be stopped when that person remembers that serving God is a greater desire than their own lusts.

Second, the desire is conceived. Because the person fails to control his desire, he begins to seek ways to fulfill the lust. If his desire is immorality, he will seek ways to find privacy in order to fulfill the desire. If his desire is fame and reputation, he will seek ways to fulfill that desire even at the expense of others. Paul describes this process as making provisions for the flesh (Romans

13:14). The solution was to put on Jesus Christ. Rather than making plans to fulfill one's lusts, they should seek to serve Christ.

The third step is when the individual gives in to sin. They've thought about it. They've made plans. It is finally time to commit the sinful act. It's still not too late to say "No!" To stop it before it becomes sin. It can still be nipped in the bud.

The problem is that too many take sin too lightly. Rather than stop it at its earliest stages, they play with the idea. They let the lust linger around for a while. And eventually, they give in. It could all be prevented if they simply followed Barney's advice of nipping it in the bud.

Don't play with sin. Stop it when it is no more than a desire or a thought. Nip it in the bud.

This is a question on the minds of some people today. In I Corinthians 10:11, we read "Now these things (like the miracle of Israel and Moses crossing the Red Sea) happened to them as an example, and were written for our instruction ... " Paul wrote these words to help Christians know what they were to make of Bible miracles. Miracles were very special events which happened by the hand of Almighty God. They happened because God was showing His might and was trying to get people to believe in Him and His power. Some miracles involved healing sick people, while some restored life to people who had died. Some miracles had God sending fire from Heaven. No one ever had to wonder whether or not they had seen a miracle (Acts 4:16). Miracles were not ordinary things. We call these things "supernatural" because they don't occur naturally.

Because miracles were worked before the Scriptures were completed, God used miracles to confirm
