"A Notable Miracle Has Been Done"

"For indeed, that a notable miracle has been done through them" (Acts 4:16).

In Acts 3, Peter and John entered the temple at the hour of prayer, and they encountered a lame man (Acts 3). The lame man asked Peter and John for alms, but Peter gave him more than he had ever hoped. Peter healed him, and all the people saw the man who was lame, leaping and praising God, and they were all amazed. The Jewish leaders and the Sanhedrin council were very concerned at this point. Why? Because "a notable miracle has been done," and they could not deny it (Acts 4:16).

Miracles Worked In New Testament Days

We must clearly understand that the scriptures state that Peter and John did "a notable miracle" on this occasion and on other occasions in the New Testament. We cannot deny them. In Acts 3, we have a man who was lame from his birth. A man who had never walked. All the Jews were familiar with this lame man who had regularly laid at the gate of the temple. There is no doubt his leg muscles were withered. Still, we read as Peter took him by the hand, "and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength. So he, leaping up, stood and walked, and entered into the temple, walking, and leaping and praising God" (Acts 3:7-8). The power of God indeed worked this miracle. No power but divine miraculous power could have caused a man lame from his birth to walk and leap immediately. The miracles that Jesus performed were of the same type. The only one who could do this miracle must have the power of God. Matthew records that Jesus, during His earthly ministry, went about "healing all kinds of sickness and all kinds of diseases among the people" (Matthew 4:23). One example of the many miracles Jesus performed is raising Lazarus from the dead (John 11:23-ff). How many people can be raised from the dead without divine power? None!

These two miracles show us that all would have to understand these are miracles done by the power of God, and there was no need to try and deny them (Acts 4:16; John 11:47). The evidence is plain and straightforward that Jesus and His disciples performed miracles in the first century. When

the question is asked, "Do you believe in miracles?" We must reply, "Yes!"

The Purpose of Miracles

In thinking of miracles, we may think of what many often referred to in this day and age as miracles. But the modern-day claims of miracles are clouded in mystery and suspicion. The miracles claimed to be performed are shadowed in obscurity and unobservable healings such as arthritis, headaches, etc. They are not notable miracles that cannot be denied. The express purpose of modern-day "miracles" are for the easing of pain and suffering. Those who claim to work "miracles" say God does not want his people to suffer; therefore, they claim to perform these "miracles" for this purpose.

What do the scriptures teach about the purpose of miracles? The scriptures' purpose for miracles is quite different than modern-day reasoning. In Mark 16, we have recorded the great commission that Jesus gave to His disciples to go out and preach the word of God. "And they went out, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word through the accompanying signs" (Mark 16:20). Mark records that they went forth preaching, and the signs confirmed the word they preached. Why were signs or miracles worked? To verify that what the apostles were teaching was from God. The purpose of miracles was to confirm the word and then produce faith in the hearers (John 20:30-31). If these signs had not accompanied those who spoke the truth (the word of God), then how would one be convicted to accept what they taught as being the word of God? The hearers could not have done so. They would have been accepting something blindly and without faith (Romans 10:17; Hebrews 11:6).

The need to confirm the word with miracles is no longer needed because the word of God has been completely revealed to us through the work of the apostles (Ephesians 3:3-5). After His death, Jesus told His disciples, they would receive the Comforter to guide them into all truth (John 16:13). Jude said that the "faith was once delivered" (Jude 3), meaning that it was delivered once for all time. There would be no more revelations.

As we think about the miracles performed in the first century, they were indeed notable miracles. Upon these miracles, we profess our faith in Jesus Christ is the Son of God. The miracles testified the preached message, being the truth, confirmed the word of God. Let us not look for signs and miracles to lead us today, but to God's word that was confirmed by the power of God.

Why The Bible Still Matters

Sometime back, I read a blog post by Michael Hyatt entitled "Why Books Still Matter." He interviewed Dr. Ben Carson, "world-renowned Professor of Neurosurgery, Oncology, Plastic Surgery, and Pediatrics at Johns Hopkins University." According to the post, Dr. Carson was raised in Detroit in poverty by a single mother who had divorced her husband when she found out he was a bigamist. As a youngster, Dr. Carson was the worst in his class. He described himself as being the safety net for the other children because they all knew they would never get a worse grade than him. This bothered his mother who was a domestic helper in the homes of some very wealthy people. She began to notice that these wealthy people didn't watch much television, but they seemed to read a lot. So, she got rid of their TV and required her sons to read two library books every week and do a book report on them. That decision changed Dr. Carson's life. As he developed his reading, he began to believe he was smart and could learn anything. Within two years, he had moved from the bottom of his class to the top. Now he is a renowned author, speaker, doctor, and professor.

Mr. Hyatt's conclusion from this is that books still matter. He says, "Books do for people what movies, television, magazines, newspapers, blogs, and social media will never do—fundamentally alter their worldview and inspire them to greatness. I rarely meet a person who says, 'that movie changed my life.' Or, 'your blog post transformed me.' I'm not diminishing either of these.

Both have their place in inspiring, educating, and entertaining others. But there is just something about a book that changes everything. I have met thousands of people through the years who have reported, 'That book changed my life.' I can certainly point to the books that have shaped my own life. In fact, we can point to specific books throughout history that have changed entire civilizations."

I think Hyatt is right. And what I can't help but think is God gave us a book. And not just any book. He gave us the ultimate of books, the book of books, THE BOOK. He did not give us a video. He didn't write out a blog. He didn't provide us with tweets or posts. He did not publish a magazine. He gave us a book. He gave us the one thing throughout history that has changed more lives than anything else.

According to Paul, "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be competent, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). No wonder he also told Timothy to "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:15). We've got to do our best to be in God's Word and rightly handle it. This book can change our lives like no other book does. We must not let it sit on our book shelves collecting dust or simply allow it to be an arm decoration on our way into the church building.

The psalmist shows that God's book is a life-saver, a soul saver. "I have stored up your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you" (Psalm 119:11). Jesus' memory of it saved Him from the tempter in Matthew 4:1-11. Examine more closely the armor of God in Ephesians 6:14-17 and learn that every piece of the armor is connected to God's book in one way or another.

When Paul was talking to the Ephesian elders for what he thought was going to be the last time, he said, "And now I commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all those who are sanctified" (Acts 20:32). I understand that when he said this they didn't have the Scriptures in book form as we do and much of it was still to be written. But that doesn't take away from my point at all. Rather, it demonstrates how fortunate we are. God has taken that Word of His Grace and handed it to us in a book. How powerful. How amazing.

With such a powerhouse handed to us in one volume, what should we do with it? We should read it. Keep reading it. Start reading it, if you must. But read it. The more you read it, the more you will be amazed at how much you learn and can learn. Don't let the preacher or Bible class teacher read it for you. Read it. I'm not saying you have to sell your television as Ms. Carson did. But, wealthy people don't watch as much TV as they read books. I imagine people who are spiritually rich in the Lord don't watch as much TV as they read God's book. Let's remember what can truly change our lives for the better and let's spend more time in it, letting it change us.
