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"Be Sure Your Sin Will Find You Out"

"But if you do not do so, then take note, you have sinned against the Lord; and be sure your sin will find you out" (Numbers 32:23).

In 2003, Las Vegas tourism started using the slogan, "What happens in Vegas stays in Vegas." The sentiment of the commercial is what many think about the sins of their lives. They believe that what they do in their own privacy is their business, and no one should say or do anything about it. The statement conveys the exact opposite of the instruction in Numbers 32:23, "be sure your sin will find you out."

In Numbers 32, the tribes of Reuben and Gad requested the land on the east side of the river Jordan. Moses granted them the request, but they were to help the other tribes in the conquest of the land, then return to their families in the land they had been given. Moses reminded them that if they did not do as they had agreed, they would be guilty of sin and "be sure your sin will find you out" (Number 32:23). In thinking about this, it would do us well to think of a couple of lessons we should get clear in our minds from what Moses said.

It does not say if or when. Many think that sins are only a problem if and when they are known. The fact is that all sins are problems in our relationship with God. Isaiah 59:2 tells us, "But your iniquities have separated you from your God; and your sins have hidden His face from you..." We must understand that sins will cost us an eternity with God unless we deal with and correct them according to God's will. We may hide our sins from men so that they may not know them, but God does. The Hebrew writer said, "there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are naked and open to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account" (Hebrews 4:13).

Your sins will find you out. Every criminal commits a crime thinking that it is a perfect crime. But many criminals will slip, and the crime is detected and proven. However, some crimes may be committed that men may never know of, but there is not a sin that God does not know.

The wise man said, "For God will bring every work into judgment, including every secret thing, whether good or evil" (Ecclesiastes 12:14).

Examples of Sins Hidden But God Knew

The sin Achan committed in Joshua 7. When the children of Israel took the city of Jericho, they were told not to take anything. But Achan took of the spoils of the city and hid it among his things. No one knew about it, but God did! Following the great victory for the children of Israel at Jericho, they were defeated by Ai. God told Joshua that sin was among them because they had taken of the spoils of Jericho.

David's sin with Bathsheba is another example of sin being covered and hidden from men, but that God knew all about. David committed fornication with Bathsheba and hid the sin from those around him. He lied and had Uriah, Bathsheba's husband, killed, trying to cover and hide his sin (2 Samuel 11). David thought the sin was covered and hidden and that no one knew. It was true no man knew, but his sin was found out because God knew. Nathan, the prophet, confronted David and told him of his sin. David confessed, "I have sinned." The point is that we must realize that our sins will find us out, and we must seek God's forgiveness for our sins.

Let us not be deceived in thinking that if we travel far away from home that no one will know, or if we can conceal our sins in the sight of others that everything is all right. The fact is, our sins separate us from God and can cost us an eternal life of bliss. Remember the promise in Revelation 14:13, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord..." When we put on Christ in baptism, we are dead to our sins and are in Christ (Galatians 3:27; Romans 6:3-6). As we put on Christ, then we serve Him and seek to please Him. As we confess our sins, and God will forgive us (1 John 1:9).



Preparing To Die Well

I love to read. I do a lot of reading of all kinds, including things to help me in my work of preaching. However, I also try to set aside some time every day to do some "recreational" reading on a variety of subjects, usually history-related. Several years ago I enjoyed very much reading Robert V. Remini's three-volume biography of Andrew Jackson, our eighth president. The second volume of that set is entitled The Course of American Freedom, 1822-1832, and in it I found the following story.

In June, 1832, a massive cholera epidemic hit the United States, having been transported to this country from Europe. It has been estimated that between June 1st and November 1st, some three-thousand people died from this disease, and one of the hardest hit cities in the U.S. was Washington D.C. Nearing the end of his first term, President Andrew Jackson, already in poor health at age 65, was warned by his family back in Tennessee to get out of Washington and return to the Hermitage, his plantation home near Nashville, to ride out the epidemic. Jackson eventually did return to Tennessee, but not until July. Prior to his departure (June 21st), Jackson wrote a letter to his beloved daughter-in-law, Sarah, to calm her fears for his health. In that letter, he said, in part:

"My Dear Sarah, Knowing that we have to die we ought to live to be prepared to die well, and then, let death come when it may, we will meet it without alarm, and be ready to say, 'The Lord's will be done." (Remini, p. 387).

To be honest, this statement took me by surprise. Jackson spent most of his life a skeptic at best, believing most if not all organized religions were out to take money from the masses, and were harmful to society. He did claim to accept Christ, on the urging of his wife Rachel, just prior to her death in 1828, and he "professed" religion from then until his death in 1845. However, even his admiring biographer Remini refers to the above statement as "pious fatalism," the last hope of an old man who desperately missed his wife and wanted some hope that he might be with her again.

Whatever Jackson's spiritual condition might have been, I believe he expressed poignantly and accurately a Scriptural truth that we all must accept. The author of the book of Hebrews says, "And inasmuch as it is appointed for men to die once and after this comes judgment" (9:27). Jackson was right! We all have to die, and we will all stand before God in judgment. How much calmer, how much more serene, how much more composed could we be approaching our own deaths than knowing that we had "lived well," and that we were prepared to face that judgment of God and hear Him say, "Come, you who are blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (Matthew 25:34).

What about you? Are you striving to "live well" so that you can go to Heaven? If not, then you are, in the words of a wonderful old song, "unprepared to meet your God," and should face the prospect of your own approaching death with alarm! Why not correct that situation while you have opportunity? When you do, you will know what Jackson was talking about, what Paul called that "peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension" (Philippians 4:7).

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Repent: God Is Ready to Forgive

The visions Isaiah the prophet received were messages from God to Judah and Jerusalem. The first chapter reveals that God's people in the south had rebelled against Him (verse 2). The people were weighed down with sin (verse 4). They were guilty of forsaking the Lord (verse 4) and their worship had been corrupted (verses 10-15).

What does God expect of His people when they are no longer following Him? Repentance! God expects one to change. Change their directions, change their thoughts, change their behavior. Notice how this change and return to God (repentance) is described in verses sixteen and seventeen.

 Wash Yourselves, make yourself clean – sin is described as making one unclean so the instruction is to wash it off metaphorically.
