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Living in the Present

"In an acceptable time I have heard you, And in the day of salvation I have helped you.' Behold, now is the accepted time; behold now is the day of salvation." (2 Corinthians 6:2)

People often procrastinate on things they need to do. They offer many excuses about why now is not the time to do it. It always seems that they look a time as an endless commodity. Felix is an example of this when he tells Paul, "Go away now; when I have a convenient time, I will call for you" (Acts 24:25). The fact is that time is undoubtedly not something that we can have any guarantee. The Bible is clear about this. In the above verse, Paul is making the statement that "now is the time." He is telling the Corinthians to live as Christians and the time to do God's will is now. Christ has come and given His life as a sacrifice for sin, and there will not be another time for salvation. When Christ returns, the time to serve Him and do His will be over. We need to be impressed with living our lives in the present and serving God with all that we have today. Let us consider how to live in the present.

Put The Past Behind Us. The past can be the greatest curse we have as we try to live in the present. It may be failures of the past that cripple us to the point of inactivity, or we may want "rest on our laurels." Either view of the past will not spur us to live life and serve in the present time that we have. So we must learn from the past in both successes and failures and continue to see the day we live. See the opportunities that we have in the present.

Treasure Your Time. The psalmist writes, "The days of our lives are seventy years; And if by reason of strength they are eighty years,...For it is soon cut off, and we fly away" (Psalm 90:10). It may be that it may sound like a long time, but it is very short in comparison to eternity. Each one of us only has a number of days to live—only a period to live and to serve in our lives. The psalmist goes on to point to the value of our days. "So teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12). Living in the present, we will treasure the days we have.

Make the Most of Every Opportunity. In Ephesians 5:16, Paul tells the Ephesians to "redeem the time." Paul is saying to them to live each day to make the best use of the time and opportunities. The reason Paul gives for doing this is "because the days are evil." Satan is continually working to rob us of joy, peace, contentment, etc. In doing this, Satan will get our minds off of the opportunities for good that we can do. He will cause us to live our time in worry, become idle, and simply engage in activities that will even rob us of opportunities. The opportunities are wasted, and our lives are in turmoil. Instead, let us redeem the time by seeing the opportunities before us and making the most of them.

Do the Will of God. Paul continues in Ephesians 5:17, saying, "understand what the will of the Lord is." Let us use our time to read and study to know the will of God. In the time in which we now live, let us know the will of God and do it. Serving God today will keep our hearts focused on the present time.

May each one of us live in the present. May we get the past behind us and reach toward the thing before us. Let us remember that now is the time! Let us learn to treasure the moments we live, learning what God desires in our lives, and use those moments in life, seizing the opportunities to serve God.

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Mutually Bearing Life's Burdens

In 1624 the English author and poet John Donne was confined to his bed with a serious illness. As he [lay] there alone with his thoughts, he heard the ringing funeral bells of an adjoining church house.

As Donne reflected on the transitory nature of life and the reality of death, he responded with these words that would forever cement his place in literary history.

No man is an island entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main; if a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as any manner of thy friends or of thine

own were; any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind.

And therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee.

While Donne speaks of the interconnectedness of humanity, Christians in a unique way experience connection, community, and comradeship. The Bible calls it fellowship. It is highlighted in Scripture with numerous "one another" commands about our mutual relationships.

"Each one of you is a part of the body of Christ, and you were chosen to live together in peace," Paul penned (Colossians 3:15, CEV).

There is an interdependence within the Body of Christ as metaphorically depicted in 1 Corinthians 12 with the analogy of the physical body. All the members, directed by the head depend on each other. We each have a distinct role and responsibility. And we need each other. Help each other. And serve each other. As a result, "if one member suffers, all the members suffer together."

Therefore, we are commanded: "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2).

The word "burden" refers to "a weight, anything that is pressing one down physically or makes demands on one's resources. It is a load that is too heavy for one person to carry and requires assistance. It is used in the New Testament for carrying a coffin, stones, and even a corpse. Figuratively, Christians shoulder together one another's burdens to lighten the load.

We bear the burden of sin by seeking to restore the erring. The text speaks of a brother being "overtaken in a sin" (Galatians 6:1). This does not mean a deliberate sin, but a slip. Like a driver hitting a patch of ice and sliding into the ditch. It's something unintentional. Realize that you too might have slipped under the same conditions. Humbly help him overcome his feelings of guilt, shame, and disgrace. Seek his restoration. Offer forgiveness. And pray for his future faithfulness.

We bear the burden of material want by helping those in need. It's very easy in our land of plenty and prosperity to become calloused and unconcerned by the needs of others, even our own brethren. The Bible commands us to work, not only to provide for our own, but to "have something to share with anyone in need" (Ephesians 4:28). Of course, this involves both our ability and the *opportunity* to do so (Galatians 6:10).

We bear one's another's burdens by offering comfort in times of sorrow. Sorrow may be caused by physical sickness and suffering. It may result from family problems. And death always brings sorrow into our hearts and homes. We can "weep with those who weep" (Romans 12:15). We can pray. Show our concern. Offer encouragement. Give our time. And share our lives with those who are hurting.

Christians are called to care about one another. To be involved in each other's lives. And to offer a helping hand. As George Bernard Shaw correctly observed, "The worst sin toward our fellow creatures is not to hate them, but to be indifferent to them. That's the essence of inhumanity."

So, when we see a brother who's fallen, needy, or suffering, let's respond with compassion, not censorious criticism. And to remember, "There, but for the grace of God, go I."
