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Looking Beyond the Grave

"Then the dust will return to the earth as it was, And the spirit will return to God who gave it." — (Ecclesiastes 12:7)

Death is not the end. Many seem to struggle with the thought of death. The scriptures are very clear about death and its certainty (Hebrews 9:27). Many questions are often asked, "What happens after death?" Solomon tells us that the earthly body goes back to the earth and the spirit to God. It is this fact that puts life into perspective. Many things that disturb people in this life fade into profound insignificance when we look at life beyond the grave.

Facing God Beyond The Grave

In Hebrews 9:27, we read, "And as it is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment." In Romans 14:12, "So then each of us shall give account of himself to God." In 2 Corinthians 5:10, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive the things done in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad." Beyond the grave, the scriptures teach that each one will face God in judgment. In this judgment, man will not be judged on what people thought of him but on how he lived in accordance with the Lord's will. (Matthew 7:21-24). Jesus said a man will be judged by "the word I have spoken will judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

What Does Judgment Mean?

It means that the praise of men one may have or what one's reputation among men really does not matter, and what really matters is how man is viewed by God. Just before Jesus' statement in John 12:48, John spoke of those that believed in Jesus but would not confess Him "For they loved the praise of men more than the praise of God" (John 12:43). As it was then, some today fail to see beyond the grave and the coming judgment because of the praise, prestige, and position of honor that they hold among men.

But what is the fate of such people? The answer to this is best seen when Jesus pictures the judgment scene and says, "Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Your name, cast out demons and in Your name, and done many wonders in Your name?" (Matthew 7:22). Jesus tells us some have done many wonderful things in the eyes of men. On this side of the grave, they looked exceptional to men. But notice Jesus' response, "And then I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness" (Matthew 7:23). We must learn to look beyond the grave and view our lives as God views them.

How would God view your life? Would God be pleased or not? We must understand that it does matter what we do on this side of the grave, and what we do or do not do will determine where we spend eternity on the other side of the grave. May we learn to live life with the view of looking beyond the grave.

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They Left Their Nets

Why does Mark not give me the background story? When I look for context, there is almost none! But I know from John and Luke the fuller story, but not from Mark.

As He Was Going Along

Mark wrote that Jesus was "preaching the gospel of God, and saying," The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel." As He was going along by the Sea of Galilee, He saw Simon and Andrew, the brother of Simon, casting a net in the sea; for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you become fishers of men." (Mark 1:14-18). If someone approached you on the street, and they wanted you to follow them, would you? No!

I would not follow them, unless I knew more about that person. The apostles knew Jesus weeks before Mark

1:14-18, but Mark does not tell you this.

The First Calling of the Apostles

"One of the two who heard John speak and followed Him, was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He found first his own brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which translated means Christ). He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon the son of John; you shall be called Cephas (which is translated Peter)" (John 1:40-42). This is the first calling.

John In Prison — Time Marker

After the first calling of the apostles, John the Baptist is put into prison. It's like a time stamp in the gospels, and it happen's early on in the ministry of Jesus. (Read it in Matthew 4:12, Mark 1:14, and John 3:24).

- "Now after John had been taken into custody, Jesus came into Galilee" (Mark 1:14)
- "Now when Jesus heard that John had been taken into custody, He withdrew into Galilee (Matthew 4:12)

Second Calling - In Galilee

This is when Jesus calls them from their nets (Mark 1:14-18). So they already had been following Jesus and they had seen him turn water into wine. Also note that Luke, the investigator, tells us that Jesus told them to once again cast their nets into the sea. And instead of no fish, like the night before, they fill two boats full of fish with one cast of their net! (Luke 5:1-11).

Why Does Mark Record It Like It's the First Time?

I'm not sure why Mark doesn't tell us he is recording the second calling of the apostles. But it might be written this way because Mark wants you to see that they dropped whatever they were doing, and followed him. Mark includes the word "immediately." Perhaps it is your turn to drop whatever you are doing, and follow Jesus to his church, every time it assembles, to the glory of God. He is there every time.

Are You Focused On Giving or Getting?

"I didn't get anything out of worship today," is a remark sometimes offered by disappointed church attendees.

These disgruntled "worshipers" soon find themselves relating to anyone who will listen to how awful the sermon was, how the song leader pitched the songs too high, the distractions by noisy children, and the general lack of inspiration they felt from the service.

Joe McKeever said such remarks are "like dry rot in a congregation...Like a termite infestation in the building...Like an epidemic afflicting the people of the Lord." Unchecked, they will spread like a deadly virus.

Such complaints reflect a lack of understanding about what "going to church" really means. Worship is not about you. And me. Worship is about God. Exalting Him. Honoring Him. Giving Him praise.

While those conducting the service ought to do their very best in leading the minds and hearts of the congregation, it's ultimately up to us individually to focus our minds upon the Lord and to worship Him. Neither the preacher, nor the pastors, nor the song leader can worship for me. It's a choice that I make. Even when the service and the circumstances are less than ideal.

Furthermore, worship is a verb. An active verb. Worship is not something that is done to us. It's something that we do. We are not mere spectators, seeking to be entertained. We come to participate. To be involved. And to be engaged.

If we walk away from a worship service feeling, "I didn't get anything out it," are we feeling the same way about our religion? Are we viewing Christianity as mere membership in a church that offers us material, social, or emotional benefits?

Do we come to worship only to get? Or to give?

Dee Bowman was right when he wrote, "The success of Christianity is not measured by what you get out of it, but by what it gets out of you."
