Counting The Cost

"And whoever does not bear his cross and come after Me cannot be My disciple. For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not sit down first and count the cost, whether he has enough to finish it — lest, after he has laid the foundation, and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, This man began to build and was not able to finish!" – Luke 14:27-30

Jesus once asked the multitudes who followed Him about the need to count the cost. Jesus wants the people following Him to give serious consideration to both sides of their spiritual life. The commitment needed to follow Him and the loss that will be suffered by not following Him. Let us consider these costs that Jesus asks the multitude to consider.

The Value of the Soul.

We must think about the value of the soul. Jesus asks, "For what is it to a man if he gains the whole world and loses his soul? Or, what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Matthew 16:26). The question Jesus asks is rhetorical. There is no profit to the man who has everything the world offers but is void of any spiritual value. Jesus says that man's worth is great. In Matthew 6, Jesus points out that man is the crowning glory of God's creation. Man has far more value than any other thing that God created. When God created man, He "breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7). The man was given the eternal side, a soul that would exist for eternity. God valued man's soul so much that He did not want to see man's soul be lost in hell forever. The value is seen in God sending His Son to die on the cross so that man could be saved (John 3:16). The soul is precious, and we need to see it for the value God has for it.

The Value of the Inheritance.

Peter speaks of the "inheritance incorruptible and undefiled that does not fade away, reserved in heaven for you" (1 Peter 1:4). It is the value of the inheritance that Jesus says, "Lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven" (Matthew 6:20). Suppose we count the cost of our inheritance. We will see that the greatest value is the opportunity to dwell together with God in heaven forever.

The Cost of Our Soul Being Lost.

There is an old song we sing that asks the question, "Have you counted the cost if your soul should be lost?" What is the cost if one is lost? (1) His soul is cast into hell (Matthew 25:41; 10:28). (2)A loss of great joy; life has frustrations, but to be saved will give us the greatest joy (2 Corinthians 4:16-18; Romans 8:18). (3) No hope of heaven as our eternal home. As we live as Christians doing the Lord's will, we look with hope to a better and eternal day (Revelation 2:10; Hebrews 6:18-20). But this hope is lost for the soul that is lost eternally (Luke 16:19-31).

Let us all count the cost should our soul be lost. Then, understanding the tragic loss of our lost soul, let each determine to seek after the Lord with all of our heart, soul, and mind (Matthew 22:37). Truly giving ourselves daily as a living sacrifice to God. Whatever we do in the Lord, we can do it knowing that it will accomplish something worthwhile. It is the Lord, not we ourselves, who will take it and turn it into something good. It doesn't depend on us or the "importance" of what we've done. So Paul said, "Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 15:58). No matter what the job is, it's not in vain if it's in the Lord.

"When you are invited by anyone to a wedding feast," Jesus said, "do not sit down in the best place, lest one more honorable than you be invited by him; and he who invited you and him come and say to you, 'Give place to this man,' and then you begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down in the lowest place, so that when he who invited you comes he may say to you, 'Friend, go up higher.' Then you will have glory in the presence of those who sit at the table with you. For whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted" (Luke 14:8-11). So in heaven, there may be some surprises. The most exalted places of honor may be filled by simple souls whose work in this world was hardly ever noticed.

Speech Recognition

Most computers and even smartphones now have speech recognition software, allowing you to enter commands with your voice instead of using a keyboard. When creating documents, you can speak instead of typing. What was once the stuff of science fiction has now become an everyday tool.

But these high-tech apps do have some challenges. I find that most of them have a bit of trouble with my slight southern drawl, so I have to speak with an affected northern accent on certain words. Sometimes I say a big word, but the computer hears a train of small ones instead; if I talk too slowly, "factuality" may type as "fax you Al a tea." Obviously, the results can be pretty funny. And that creates another problem: if I laugh out loud, the computer just types more gibberish.

The result? When I use speech recognition software, I sometimes have to speak in such a way that I barely recognize myself. It's sort of like talking to a foreigner who knows English but has some trouble understanding the way it is often spoken. In order to communicate, you may need to speak differently than usual.

Perhaps there's a lesson here on teaching. As you and I grow in our knowledge of God's word, we get comfortable with various Biblical terms and concepts. Because we've studied them, they make perfect sense to us. But to someone else, those same terms and concepts may be unfamiliar and confusing. They may sound like gibberish. If we're going to teach such a person, we may need to speak a little differently so that we can be understood. Many people, for instance, have no idea what fornication is, or what it means to repent, or what is denoted by inspiration. We need to be ready to carefully explain such things. We can't effectively teach people if they don't understand what we're saying.

We will find, of course, that this takes time and effort. But it's worth it. In our teaching, let's imitate Solomon, who "searched to find just the right words" in order to teach "what was upright and true" (Ecclesiastes 12:10, NIV).
