"What Do You Do More Than Others?"

""For if you love those who love you, what reward have you? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet your brethren only, what do you do more than others? Do not even tax collectors do so?" — (Matthew 5:46-47).

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus is impressing the hearers that the citizens of His kingdom will be radically different from the life they had been accustomed to living. Earlier Jesus said, "unless your righteousness exceeds the righteousness of scribes and Pharisees, you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:20). As Jesus concludes this section asked, "What do more than others?" Let us consider some lessons we can learn from this question.

What We Learn in the Question...

- 1. We Are To "Do." The word "do" indicates that Christians are not lazy, do nothing people, and the word suggests action. Many like to think of Christianity as a people who do not have to be active in service. This question shows that Jesus knows that to be the kind of citizen God expects in the kingdom will be a people of action. Later in the sermon, Jesus says the one who will enter the kingdom of heaven will do the will of the Father. The one who hears the will of God and does it is the one who is wise and will be saved (Matthew 7:21-27).
- 2. We Are To Do "More." The word "more" suggests the quantity or amount. The things done by the scribes and Pharisees were not much. As a matter of fact, it seems that how the religious leaders dealt with the law was to make the law mean less (Matthew 5:21-45). Jesus teaches them that it is not less but more. Jesus teaches much about doing more with our abilities. In Matthew 25:1-13, the foolish virgins made some preparation, but the wise virgins made more. In Matthew 25:14-30, the parable of the talents teaches us the work we are to do is within our ability to accomplish. In Matthew 25:31-46, those told, "Come you blessed of my Father..." are the ones who have done more. They served when they saw the opportunity. Those who heard

3. We Are To Be Different "Than Others." The question Jesus asked insinuates that the followers of Christ should be different and do more than those who do not follow God. The disciples of Christ should be more: loving (Matthew 5:43-46); forgiving (Matthew 6:14-15); more neighborly (Matthew 22:39); more benevolent (Matthew 25:34-46); more honest (Romans 12:17); and more congenial (Romans 14:19). If as disciples we are not "more than others" the righteousness falls short of what God expects. We must remember that we are to be different from the world around us.

Are we living a life of more? Do we live a life of radical love that Jesus taught, or do we only love those that are likable and friendly to us? May we all be determined to accept the challenge to live the life God expects from us.

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"Mirror, Mirror on the Wall"

"For if any one is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a mirror: for he beholdeth himself, and goeth away, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was" – (James 1:23,24)

The mirror the wicked witch in the movie Snow White had was a self-esteem booster or an ego deflator. The wicked witch liked it when the mirror told her she was the fairest of them all. When it told her she was not, she got very angry and very jealous.

The good thing about mirrors is they always tell us the truth. You can always trust it to give you a true picture, whether you like it or not, of what you look like. If you do not like what we see, it is not the mirror's fault. There is no defect in the mirror, it is showing you reality, not make believe. It is a reflection from which you will make changes or leave everything as it is.

Some people have their parents as their mirror. Many

of us become like our parents because this is the mirror through which we live, because they lived a certain way before us. We often refuse to question what it looks like, because they are our parents. Would the image they cast be faulty? Our parents may be a reflection of what they received from their parents. Notice what the mirror of God says about our parents, "Children, obey your parents *in the Lord for this is right*" (Ephesians 6:1). Think about reflecting in your life what is right, not an attitude or action just because your parents did.

Friends can also become a mirror. We are with our friends at school, church, teams, or shopping. If not with them somewhere, we are talking to them on the phone or through a social media of some kind. We enjoy friends off which we "bounce" ideas. Their words we repeat, style of clothes, what they love, like, hate, buy, hear, or taste, we imitate as well. We may never check on whether their reflection is right or not. We just enjoy doing things with them. We need to pay attention to the values they are leading us to duplicate. The mirror of God says "Be not deceived, evil companionships corrupt good morals" (1 Corinthians 15:33).

God and His word is the superior mirror. This mirror is the earnest petition made by God to duplicate what we hear, see, and read from Him. 1 Peter 1:16 says, "Ye shall be holy; for I am holy". God insists we be hearers and doers of the word. Our understanding of His word leads us to know of His goodness, justice, truth, and righteousness. As a result, this will be a mirror of the type people He wants us to be. When we understand who we are (Romans 3:23), we will know changes will need to be made. God desires we admit what we see as who we are in His word. He does not want us to go away. God desires all men repent and be saved (1 Timothy 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9). Let us look in the mirror and dress ourselves to be the new man He created "in righteousness and holiness of truth" (Ephesians 4:24).

The Hardest (and Highest) Kind of Honesty

All of us want to view ourselves in a positive light. As a result, we often tell ourselves what we'd like to hear rather than what we need to hear. The human heart is exceedingly "deceitful," as Jeremiah 17:9 says, and it takes an uncommon measure of honesty for us to see when we are lying to ourselves. Think about three areas where honesty is important and very hard.

What does God's word teach? Especially when a text calls for a change that would be difficult to make, we may be tempted to reason our way around it, convincing ourselves of the meaning we prefer the text to have. We might tell ourselves we're "explaining" the passage when all we're really doing is draining the inconvenience out of obeying it.

What kind of relationship do I have with God? Ideally, we should see our relationship with God exactly as it is, neither overestimating nor underestimating it. But rather than look at the facts honestly (2 Cor 13:5), we often allow our hearts to lie to us. We define reality in terms of whatever makes us feel good.

What are my true motives, desires, and intentions? Here is the hardest area of all. If the question is, "What is the real reason why I want to do this?" that can be a painful question to answer. It takes peeling off many successive layers of the "onion" in our hearts to get down to the real, true desires that are driving our decisions.

Edward Benson remarked, "How desperately difficult it is to be honest with oneself. It is much easier to be honest with other people." And yet, this harder kind of honesty is also more important than the easier kind. If we're not willing to see what God teaches us in the Scriptures, the true status of our relationship with God, and the true motives behind the decisions we make, then no amount of external honesty with other people is going to amount to much. It is God who is our Judge, and He knows "the thoughts and intentions of the heart" (Heb 4:12). We ought to embrace all of what He knows to be true — even about ourselves. After all, is it not the truth that will set us free?
