If It Ain't Broke, Don't Fix It

The title is indeed a very common expression in the southern part of the United States. It has been time-tested to the extent that it dominates every part of many an individual's life. Even the church of our Lord has been the recipient of this philosophy. While this thinking is useful and saves time and energy which can be directed toward things that really do need fixing, we would do well to ask ourselves if it helps the Lord's body in all situations.

First, we must decide at what point something or somebody is "broken" in the church. To many people, an engine is broken only when it quits and will not start. To others, however, that little "knock" means trouble and should be attended to as soon as possible. In the same way, many in the church think people aren't in any trouble until they quit attending services. Then their name is added to the "list" and they are contacted and asked why they weren't at church services.. If this doesn't work, in a number of months one or more of the elders show up at their doorstep wondering why they have quit attending worship with their brethren. You know the rest of the story.

Others in the church understand that outward troubles don't spring up as suddenly as they sometimes seem to; that there is a "progression" (actually a regression) as a Christian goes from being faithful to being lost. Paul described this progression thusly, "Now we exhort you, brethren, warn them that are unruly, comfort the discouraged, support the weak, be patient toward all" (1 Thessalonians 5:14). Some Christians know that if we wait until the member is unruly, there is little hope of saving his soul. The best chance to really reach someone, thus effecting their thinking as well as their actions, is to begin with patience, support and comfort. Warnings and rebukes might come in time, but even then, because of the patience, support and comfort you have extended, the warnings are much more likely to be received in the love they are extended. Your good intentions will not be questioned because you have proven your love already!

Brethren, it might be true that "you don't fix something unless it's broken", but we need to be closer

attuned to one another to hear that "knock" that suggests something deep inside our brother or sister might be amiss and use the love of God to aright it before the problems multiply and the heart is hardened. "Stop acting from motives of selfish strife or petty ambition, but in humility, practice treating one another as your superiors. Stop looking after your own interests only but practice looking out for the interests of others too" (Philippians 2:3-4, Williams).

Elders of the Lord's body especially need to do their best to keep in tune with the congregation. They are only a few, and have a difficult time chasing after and pleading with wayward brethren. Their job, however, will be infinitely easier when they can spot and tend to a problem before it becomes outward unfaithfulness. Again, as members of the Lord's body we are commanded to make their job joyous, not grievous (Hebrews 13:17). This we can do when we help one another early on.

All of us need "fixing" from time to time. It is a wonderful blessing to have our Lord there always and in all ways to be our Helper, Succor and Savior. But we need each other too. Whether or not others are there for us, we have a responsibility to be brethren to our brethren. There is no greater earthly blessing than the true family of God, who love us, care for us and is there for us when we need them. Are you fixing what's broken?

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Comfort Zone Christians

It is said that "He who aims at nothing will hit it," and "He who has no goal in mind will get there fast." I wonder, in the realm of Christianity, how many of us go through our lives as Christians with no goals, no objectives, and no plans? "Comfort Zone Christians" is a term that is growing in popularity which describes this behavior, and I believe that many of us fit into this category. Why do I believe this? For the simple fact that it's easy to just do as you please if you have

no objectives, goals, or plans in life. No plans means no failures! What an easy life! This with this attitude everything is nice and safe with our "Comfort Zone." But is that where Jesus wants us to be? Oh yes, He did say in Matthew 11:28, "Come unto me...and I will give you rest." But I really don't think He meant for us to just "kick back and get comfortable" (cf. 2 Timothy 3:12). Rest assured my brethren, one is not going to suffer any form of persecution while in their "Comfort Zone." I believe that God expects us to reach out beyond our private domain.

Let me illustrate with the following example: When a baby eagle is left in its nest, it is in its "Comfort zone." In order for it to learn to fly, it **must** leave its "Comfort Zone." Often, the mother eagle will begin to pull the feathers from the bottom of the nest, leaving the baby eagle sitting on the hard, sharp sticks that make up the next. Get the picture? Many of us are like that baby eagle. We snuggle down into padded pew; we get comfortable and don't want to go out into the real world. What would happen to that eagle if it never left its nest? It would live and die never knowing the thrill of flight, never reaching its potential (cf. Revelation 3:1). It's sad to say, but it's worth repeating, many of us are like that baby eagle. We'll never know the thrill of flight because we never leave the nest. We'll never reach our potential, or even know what it is, because we won't leave our "Comfort Zone."

When Peter left the boat and walked to Jesus on the sea (Matthew 14:22-31), he had to leave his "Comfort Zone." How many of us would get out of the boat and go to Jesus if He would bid us to come? Now, before you answer that too quickly, consider the fact that He commanded us to "Go out into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled" (Luke 14:23). Jesus didn't ask us to walk on water, just to go out and invite them to come in. But when going out of is our "Comfort Zone"; the water we must walk on is the unsure ground of a new experience. This may be a hard road for some to conquer, and some of you may be thinking, "Ill never be able to conquer that road." If this is your thinking, let me remind you of something. A long, long time ago, this same Jesus had to conquer the road that led to Golgotha, "that is to say, a place of a skull" (Matthew 27:33). In conquering that road, He has afforded you and me the hope of conquering the road that leads to heaven. But in order to conquer that road we must

leave our "Comfort Zone." If this means out of our seats and into the streets, then let's go! Remember, **Heaven** Will Surely Be Worth It All!
