God Led Me

Ever heard that claim before? It is common to hear talk of the Lord leading a person in a direct way in every action. Whatever thoughts some have or business dealings they make, the Lord is given credit for causing it.

While this writer deeply believes in the providence of God and the ever present help He has promised (Hebrews 13:5-6), it seems to me we should balance the scales a little by asserting that God is not responsible for *every* action or thought of a Christian. If He were, God would be guilty of causing us to sin (1 John 1:8-10). In fact, the backlash of such current claims will be an undermining of faith when tragedy occurs. "Why did God let this happen?" is frequently asked now by agnostics and atheists. But let the uninformed Christian begin to think of God as though He is the great Puppeteer who holds us at the end of strings and orders our every movement, and when trouble does come, he too will become bitter toward God and blame Him.

Laws of nature (originally set in order by God) are the cause of much that is occurring today. A child born blind is not a direct punishment of God for sin (John 9:1-3), but may be the result of some birth malfunction or hereditary disorder. Job knew that his troubles were not due to sin. Even though his friends kept pointing an accusing finger, God had not directly caused any of Job's problems.

The point is that we must guard against making God in *our image*! It is possible to wish for something so much that we convince ourselves, "God wanted it that way," when in fact He had no direct part at all in our decision.

The prophet Jeremiah wrote against the religious leaders of his day who made wild claims about the Lord. They became so intolerable the Lord warned them not to use the expression, "the burden of the Lord," i.e., "this is the Lord's word" (Jeremiah 23:33-40). Though they said, "I have dreamed," they prophesied lies (Jeremiah 23:25) and spoke a vision of their own heart and not the Lord's (Jeremiah 23:16). Their message was devised out of the imagination of their own mind, and consequently, they were cursed for leading God's people astray.

God Must Lead Us

Lest we be misunderstood, if we walk by faith it is certain that *God must lead us*. But the question before us is "how does God lead us today?" The answer is found in understanding the basis of faith. Just as "faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17), it is through the inspired word of God that He leads us.

It is imperative therefore that Christians make time for Bible study! We must "give attention to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine" (1 Timothy 4:13). In Paul's charge to Timothy he urged, "Remind them of these things, charging them before the Lord not to strive about words to no profit, to the ruin of the hearers. Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Timothy 2:14-15).

When one fills his heart with the word of God he has inspired direction for every facet of life: social, economic, physical, and spiritual. Through learning God's Will we can know whether or not the Lord approves of our marriage, of the kind of friends with whom we associate, or even the type of work we do. We also learn to abstain from sexual immorality, dishonesty, or enslaving habits like drugs and alcohol. Therefore in this broadest sense, God leads us in paths of righteousness.

But what about specific decisions we make that are within the scope of righteousness? Does the Lord lead us directly in those? The answer is found in 1 John 5:14-15: "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us, whatever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we have asked of Him."

While there will not be a miraculous "voice" that answers our prayers, God does respond to those who keep His commandments (1 John 3:22). Pray for wisdom, and often a way that is best is opened and easily accessed; or else a way we had thought was best, but wasn't, will be cast with difficulty and closed doors. Always be asking as Jesus did, "Thy will be done."

Is God leading you? If so, it is because you make

time for Bible study and have filled your heart with His word!

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Worship's Emotional Component

Every element of true worship involves some emotional component. The emotional component is not driven by a direct operation of the Holy Spirit (as in Calvinism) or "getting the Holy Spirit" (as in Charismatic practice). The emotional component of true worship is the result of relationship with Deity.

The faithful disciple will go into every assembly with the emotion of joy, reverence for Deity and the anticipated interests in praising Deity and being edified (Psalm 122:11; Eccesiastes 5:1; 1 Corinthians 11:17). The true worshipper will leave the assembly with the emotional satisfaction of participating in all that God has directed, unto His glory (1 Corinthians 14:12; 10:31). The emotional component is not contrived, advertised and enforced by men. It is the result of relationship with God! Emotions in collective worship are appropriate and profitable, depending upon one's relationship with Deity. One's relationship with Deity must be governed by the revealed will of Deity.

No campaign to stamp out emotion can bring us closer to God, nor answer the error and emptiness of popular "charismatic" practices. The proper response is to foster healthy and scriptural concepts of emotion, as determined by divine purpose and revealed. (There is nothing as empty as pretended emotion. See Matthew 6:1-18).

When the Word is faithfully preached, there should be a range of emotions in the hearts of faithful listeners (remorse, assurance, joy, the satisfaction of knowledge gained). In partaking of he Lord's Supper and remembering His death, the emotions of both sorrow and gratitude should combine in our reflection. Singing has a strong emotional component (James 5:13). But this emotional result is directly tied to lyrical content. What do the lyrics mean to the worshipper? Some love music and are moved by what they believe is good music, but without any thought to lyrical content or self-examination. The scriptural emotional connection derives from content, not from (harmony, meter, structure, sound). Likewise, praying is not simply a formal, mechanical exercise. It has great emotional potential, but not due to voice or poetic structure, but content and direction (praying to Deity fervently, James 5:16). Giving should also have an emotional component (a cheerful giver. 2 Corinthians 9:7).

Perspective is to be discovered by our contact with the Word of God, our response to Jesus Christ and our continuing steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine.

Even in the most uncertain of times, Christians have a joyous expectation about what, or better yet, "Who is to come."

In the family of our Living Savior, we have many panaceas when facing the uncertainties of the future. From the simplicity of "living for the weekend" to the complexity of the Divine plan of human redemption that gives assurance even beyond the grave, there is the genuine expectation that somehow, someway everything will be alright. For the Christian, wishful hoping about the future is a thing of the past. It is replaced by the joyous expectation of being with and like the Lord Jesus Christ when He comes again.
